Touring the historic Arlington National Cemetery grounds we saw many tombstones of famous persons buried there. Approximately twelve miles of avenues and three miles of paved walks, named largely for officers of the Civil War period, provide access to the various sections of the cemetery. Each of these divisions is numbered. If the section number and the grave number are known there should be little difficulty in locating a gravesite. An interesting feature of the cemetery is that regardless of which way you look the tombstones are all in straight rows. We also visited the gigantic emphitheater. On the brow of the hill overlooking the Potomac River, and a few feet from the east portico of Arlington Memorial Amphitheater, is the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Day and night a lone sentry paces back and the single unknown soldier of World War I buried in Arlington National Cemetery. The change of guard, which occurs on the hour starts at the Methodist Church on throughout the day, is a short impressive ceremony which attracts many thousands of visitors each month.
