Peas Processed For Housewives

Available to the local housewife now are large quantities of fresh, home-grown peas ready for her home freezer at a 50% saving. These peas are shelled and cleaned by a machine called a viner directly following harvesting. The peas are then ready for freezing or canning purposes.

The cut peas are fed into a huge machine, going first into a hexagonal rubber cylinder which contains a smaller wooden cylinder rotating at a faster rate in the same direction. The peas drop through the holes in the rubber screen onto a slowly rotating canvas belt.

This belt separates any remaining leaves from the peas and the vegetable rolls down into the hopper. At this point the peas are ready to be cleaned.

The cleaner operates with blower, In order to maintain a high degree of uniformity and cleanliness in the finished product the cleaner is run slowly and at length.

The peas are now in a form ready to be used by the housewife. Purchasing peas this way saves time, effort and money. The peas are shelled, cleaned and thus cuts out this laborious task that previously had to be performed by

* Things dramatic capture the imagination, sometimes to the point of distorting the perspective. This is as true in medicine as in other fields. The sensational results with sulfa drugs and penicillin are examples.

Less dramatic, but responsible for saving uncounted lives, are the broader public health measures. Sewage disposal; swamp clearance; water, milk, and food inspection are but a few of these

The physician and the pharmacist have always been leaders in the field of preventive medicine. This fact led James Brice to observe, "Medicine is the only profession that labors incessantly to destroy the reason for its own existence."

The fight, however, is far from won. Diagnosis and treatment of disease are still the primary functions of the physician. The accurate filling of prescriptions is our responsibility as pharmacists.


