ultural Agent announces that there will be two district orchard tours this year. One is slated for Tuesday, July 31st at the Ida Orchards, 9 miles west of Monroe. The other is Wednesday, August 1st at the Stevenson Orchards, 3 miles northeast of Lexington.

The program begins at 10:00 A. M. at both stops with soft drinks and ice cream furnished. The afternoon programs will be principally about grading and marketing of the 1951 fruit crop. These programs will include H. Don Hootman, Extension Specialist from Michigan State College; Hunter Hering, State Department of Agriculture; and Ray Higgins, Marketing Specialist of Michigan State College, as well as J. Ed. Duncan, orchard operator.

SWEET CORN EARWORM

Dr. Ray Janes, Extension Specialist says that sweet corn earworm can be controlled with DDT. He suggests using three pounds of 50% wettable DDT, plus 1/2 pound wetting agent per 100 gallons of water per acre. Apply to the silks when the silks are 2, 4, and 8 days old. These three applications will insure coverage at least once to most of the ears of corn. Dr. Janes points out that corn fodder with DDT applied to it should not be fed to dairy animals or animals being finished for slaughter within sixty days.

PRESERVING GREEN BEANS

Those green beans that you will be preserving by freezing will be better eating next winter if packed in brine solution. A two-percent brine will speed up the rate of freezing and give you a less stringy product. It also protects against changing storage temperatures.

You can make the brine by dissolving four teaspoons of salt in one quart of water. Cool it before using and freeze the beans in liquid-light containers.

Like other vegetables, the bean variety you freeze should be one recommended for freezing. Michigan State College specialists advise Fulcrop, Rival, Tendengreen, or Kentucky Wonder.

Green beans are best for harvesting for freezing when the seeds are about the size of wheat grains. Avoid over-mature and small pods. Handle quickly from harvest to locker.

Snip and string the beans if necessary. They will have the best flavor if left whole or cut French style. Green beans should be blanched two to three minutes. Blanch a very small amount at a time — not more than one pound — in a kettle holding at least four quarts of water. Be sure the beans are heated through to the center. Cool quickly in running water or ice water and package for freezing.

Junior Wallace is at Camp Gordon, Ga.

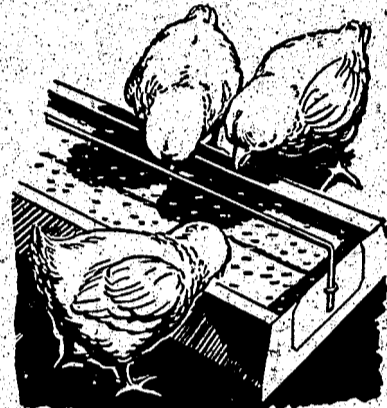

Feeding with antibiotics speeds growth of baby chicks

Aureomycin, a recent antibiotic development, promotes rapid growth in baby chicks; say poultry researchers at Michigan State College Agricultural Experiment Station. Believing that this drug acts on bacteria in the intestine of the baby chick, they fed Aureomycin to one group of chicks, then inoculated another group. They found that while Aureomycin injections had no beneficial effect on growth, including the drug in normal feeding practices substantially improved growth. More recent experiments have added Penicillin, Terramycin and Bacitracin to the list of antibiotics stimulating growth. 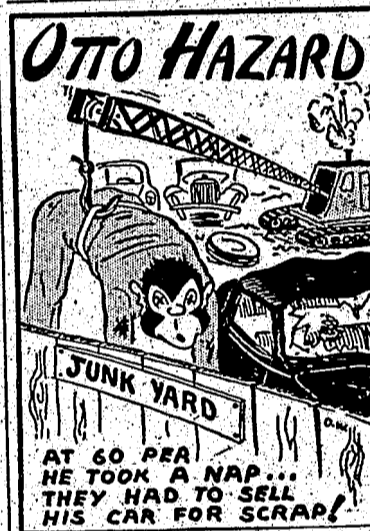

Melt shortening in top of double boiler. Add flour and gradually stir in milk. Add kernel corn. Stir constantly until thickened. Top chipped beef with boiling water and add to cream sauce. Cook over double boiler 10 minutes. Serve hot over split, toasted sandwich buns. Makes 4 servings.

really funny.

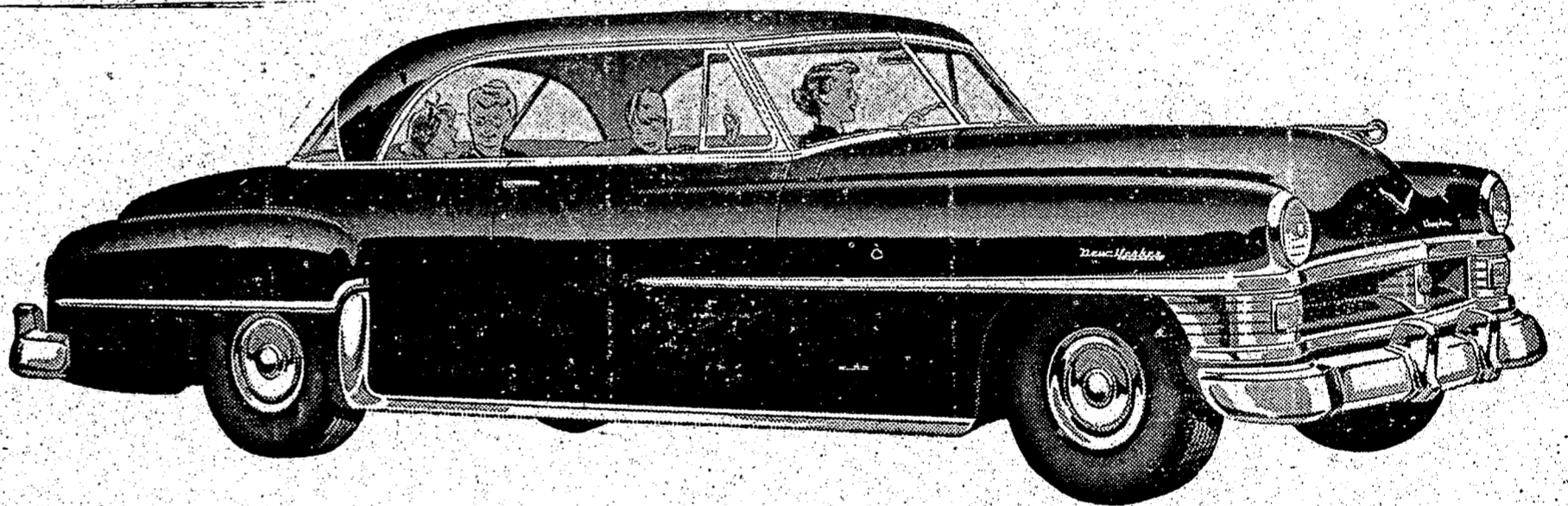
Maybe I'm wrong, but what

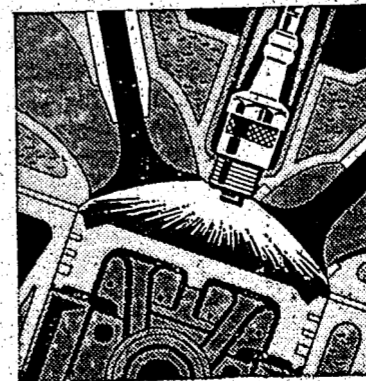
