ELECTRICITY NOW AVAILABLE TO NEARLY ALL U. S. FARMS

Power Companies Will Celebrate August 26 to Sept. 1 as "FARM ELECTRIFICATION WEEK"

Electricity now is available to over 90 per cent of America's occupied farms. And the nation's electric light and power companies are marking the virtual attainment of farm electrification with special ceremonies during the week of August 26 to September 1.

Evidence of the growth of farm electricity is in the record. In 1923, only about 200,000 American farms had electric service. Today, it is available to 4,900,000 of the country's 5,200,000 occupied farms as a result of the companies and local electric cooperatives working together.

The electric light and power companies pioneered in farm electrification. They

now serve nearly half of America's farms. Almost the entire remaining half are being served by the local electric cooperatives. The electric companies are proud of the privilege of furnishing, at wholesale rates, about half the electricity distributed by these local electric cooperatives to their customers.

As the job of bringing electric service to farms near completion, the electric light and power companies will continue to cooperate with local electric cooperatives and with agricultural colleges and experiment stations to sponsor research to put electricity to work in more ways for more farmers.

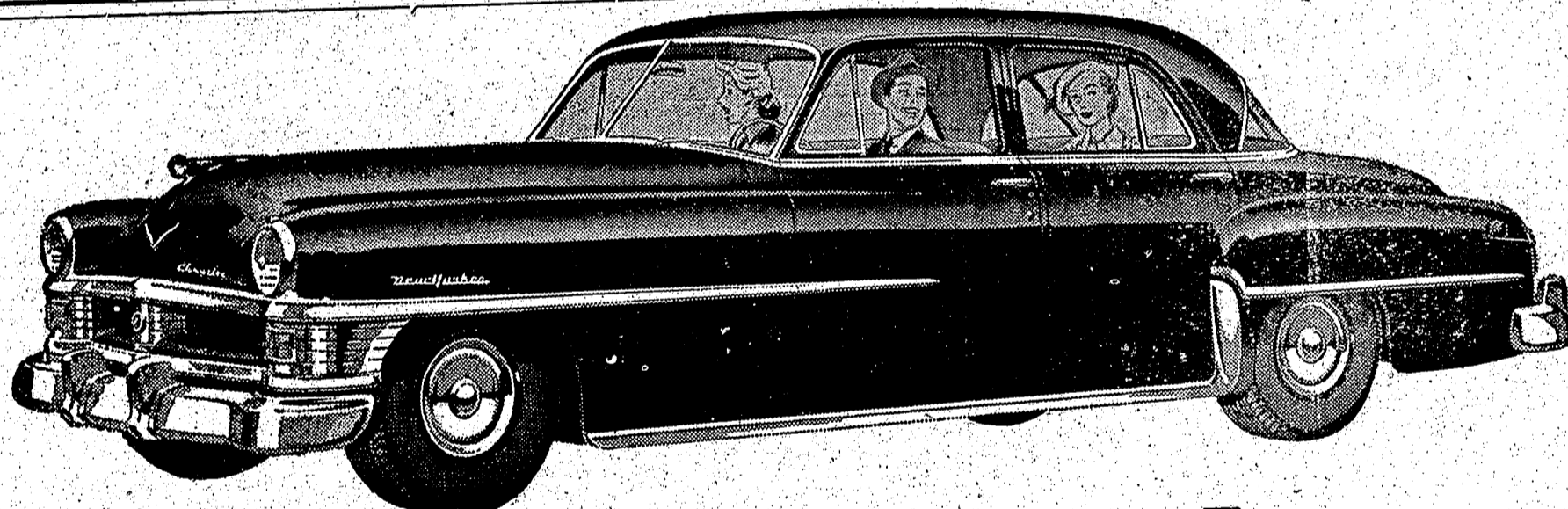
