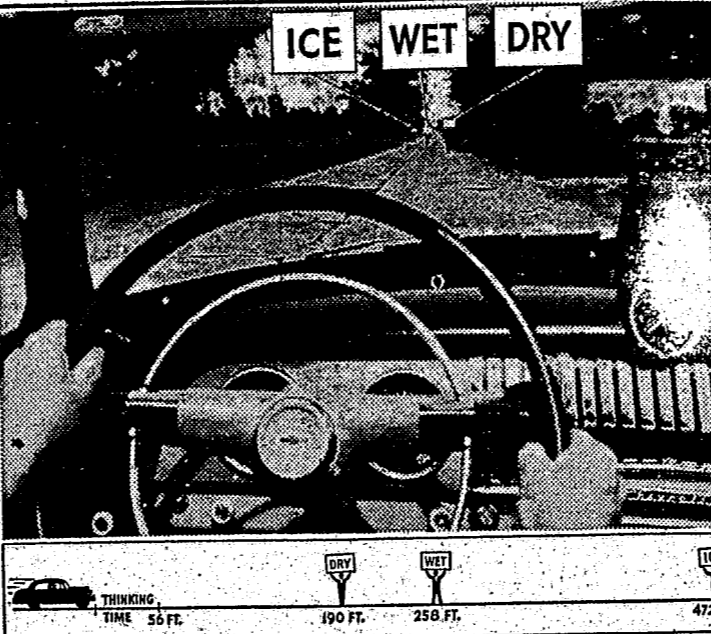

Safe Braking Margin Varies



Importance of driving in accordance with highway conditions is illustrated by this diagrammatic view prepared by Chevrolet in the interest of traffic safety. Standard braking tables reveal 190 feet is required for a stop at 50 miles an hour, allowing three-quarters of a second for a driver's reaction to an emergency. When the pavement is wet, however, the distance increases to 258 feet. On icy pavement 472 feet will be covered before a car brakes to a complete stop.

FRUIT AND GARDEN NOTES

VEGETABLE FIELD DAY

The annual Vegetable Field Day at Michigan State College will be held September 5th. Dr. Wittwer and Mr. Patterson have treated potato and onion plots with Maleic hyraside, an agricultural chemical which inhibits sprouting and prevents storage losses in many vegetable root crops. These plots will be ready for harvesting by September 5th.

Dr. Isbet has extensive variety trials on tomatoes, sweet corn cabbage and other vegetables and vine crops.

They will also have an extensive cantaloupe variety trial involving 51 varieties.

Every Michigan vegetable grower is invited. Free pop will be provided and we hope everyone will bring a picnic lunch.

LATE BLIGHT

Warm days, cool nights, plenty of moisture and heavy dew are ideal for the development of late blight on tomatoes and potatoes. For market tomatoes and those to be handled in the fresh fruit trade Dithane used according to manufacturer's recommendations at five-day intervals is recommended.

Those tomatoes being grown for processing should receive either of the following:

Fixed copper recommendations are to apply 4 lbs. of 45% copper, plus 1 ounce of spreader sticker in 100 gallons of water.

Bordeaux recommendation is to use granulated copper sulfate at the rate of 8 pounds of copper

sulfate to 8 pounds fresh spray lime in 100 gallons of water.

Effort should be made to keep the foliage covered. It is preferable to use the fixed copper solution in preference to bordeaux on plants which are not completely mature, then switch to bordeaux when blight is imminent.

HINTS FOR CUTTING SWEET CORN

A helpful suggestion for homemakers who have exhausted their patience and endurance in cutting sweet corn off the cob for canning or freezing came this week from Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, home demonstration agent of Oakland county.

Lots of the up-coming crop of sweet corn will be headed for the jar or freezer and the strain of one phase of the job can be eased with a small piece of homemade equipment.

A spike, a medium-sized cutting board similar to a bread board,

and something to drill a hole with is all you need. Drill a small hole on a slant through the board and put the spike through it at about a 45 degree angle. Take care not to split the wood.

The spike should extend through the wood about 2 inches. That's all there is to it.

To operate this handy gadget, push one ear of corn at a time down on the spike. The spike keeps the ear from sliding all over the board and holds it at a convenient angle for cutting. As a result, the job of cutting off the kernels goes faster and takes less time and effort.

Mrs. Lawyer suggests that it is best to drive the spike through the board at one end instead of in the center. This leaves more space for the cut corn to collect.

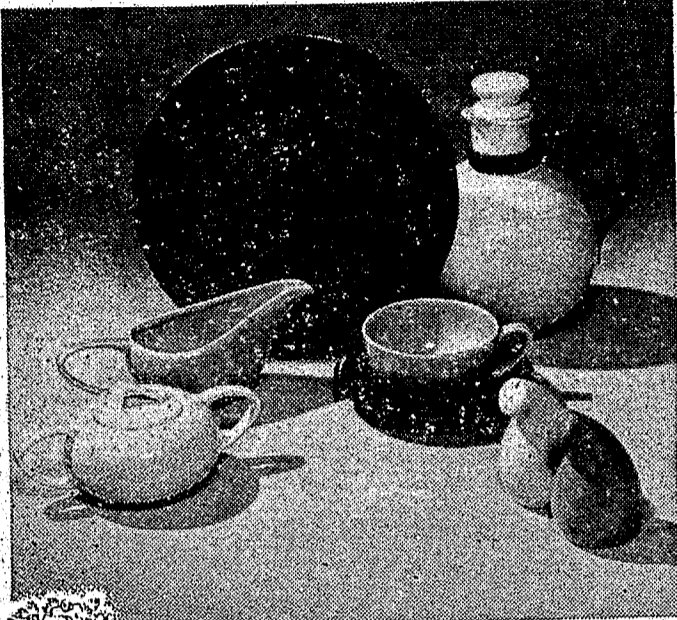

**Gala Plans Set For Opening Of A & P**

A gala Hollywood-type opening will mark the return of A & P Food Stores to Drayton Plains with one of the finest super markets in the area, the company announced today.

Plans are nearly completed for opening of the new super market at 4724 Dixie Highway at Floradale Street Tuesday (Aug. 21) at 9 a. m. A & P has been absent from the local business scene for 15 years.

"Our return to Drayton Plains, after a much-too-long absence, is due to the fact that we are confident Waterford Township housewives will welcome our company's complete, one-stop food department store," said J. A. O'Donnell, vice president in charge of the company's Detroit Unit.

One-stop shopping centers, such as this A & P super market, stock a full food line consisting of more than 3,000 different items and are designed to make "planned menu" shopping easy and convenient, he explained.

A preview of the new store will be offered during an "open house" program Monday night (Aug. 20) from 7 to 9 p. m. Residents of Drayton Plains, Waterford, Clarkston, Ortonville and the lake areas are invited to attend. Ladies attending "open house" at the store will be given orchids. Refreshments such as ice cream and lemonade will be served.

The spacious and brightly-lighted store will be appropriately decorated with pennants and balloons for the gala opening the following day. A number of gifts and demonstrations are planned for consumers who visit the store.

"All the experience of our 92 year history as the nation's pioneer food store chain has gone into the planning of this store," O'Donnell said. "We believe that the arrangement of our food departments and checkout counters will assure speedy and efficient shopping even during peak hours of business."

The store contains 9,000 square feet of space. To preserve the freshness of its meats, produce, fish, poultry and dairy products, refrigerated storage rooms have been built into the store, making the entire plant self-sufficient.

One of the outstanding features of the super market will be its large self-service meat department. A total of 48 feet of open type refrigerated cases will be de-

voted to the self-service meat line.

Commenting on self-service meat, O'Donnell said: "This new type meat department is a convenience which has been enthusiastically endorsed by customers wherever it has been installed in the past few years. Self-service meat eliminates the delays of meat shopping, particularly on week-ends, and it enables the consumer to choose precisely the cut and weight of meat that suits her taste and pocketbook."

Another feature is the installation of 33 feet of refrigerated dry racks in the big produce department. This modern refrigeration system is designed to protect the freshness, crispness and nutritional value of produce and is an important part of A & P's "freshness control" program by which all perishable products are guarded.

The handsome store, with its soft green walls, tile floor and fluorescent lighting, also has complete departments for grocery, dairy, coffee, bakery and frozen food items.

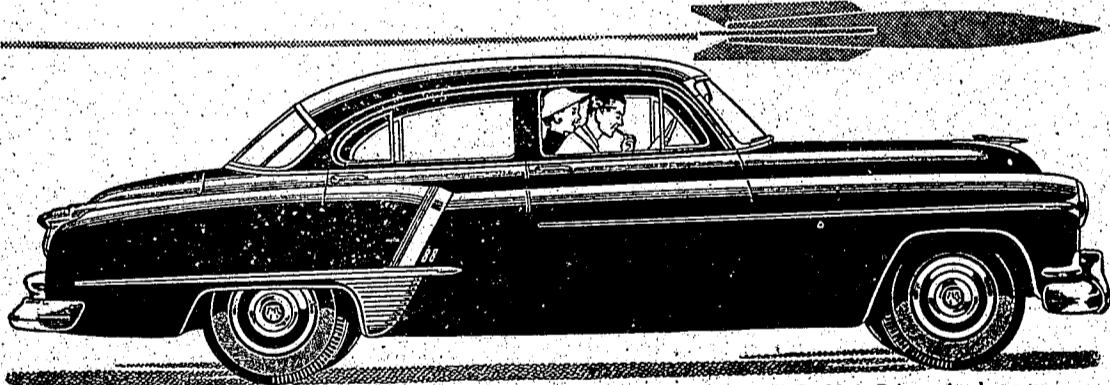

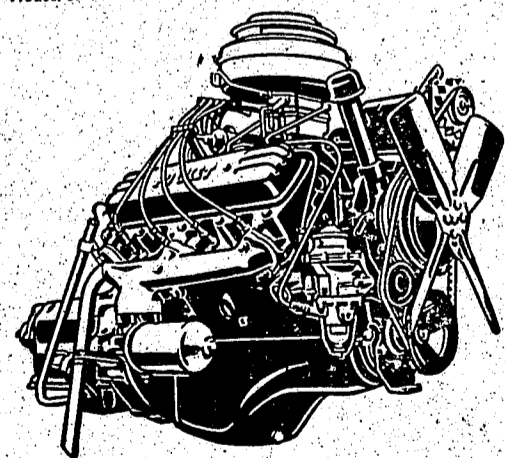

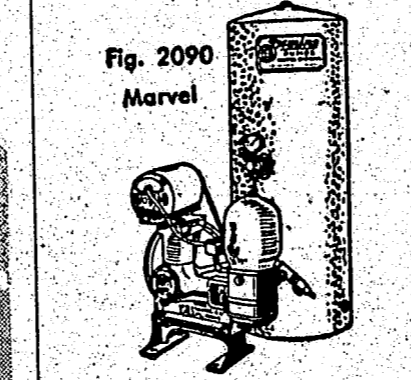
