"Traffis lights do not guarantee safety. In fact, many motorists place too much confidence in traffic lights on the assumption that all other motorists will obey them. When one motorist fails to obey a traffic signal he not only endangers his own life, but also the lives of those motorists who have placed dependence in the lights," State Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler points

out. "All motorists know that a red light means 'Stop', and that a green light means 'Go Commissioner Ziegler said. "However, caution should not be relaxed. Many motorists fail to realize that a yellow light between the green and red stop-and-

go lights means that the light is changing to red and they should stop. A flashing yellow light means proceed with caution as the location requires extra care in crossing. A flashing red light means 'Stop' and proceed only when safe to do so.

"Stop-and-Go lights are installed at an intersection after a thorough study of traffic shows the need. The success of these signals depends entirely on the obeyance of the motorists. If all traffic signs, signals, markings, and regulations were obeyed by you and all other motorists there would be greatly reduced acci-




