Pack the hot beets in glass jars to one-half inch of the top. Then cover them with pickling sirup, leaving the half inch of space at the top. Add a half teaspoon of salt to pints, 1 teaspoon to quarts.

Adjust the jar lids and process in a boiling water bath for 30 minutes. Complete the seals as soon as you take the jars out of the bath if the closures aren't of the self-sealing type.



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
