Conservation News

Fall planting of 50,000 trees and shrubs in 12 southern Michigan state recreation areas will be started by state prisoners in October, the conservation department's parks division reports.

Providing shade and beautification of recreation sites will be some 30 varieties of hardwood seedlings and shrubs. Planting of another 50,000 pieces of stock is planned for next spring.

Supervised prison labor crews will fall plant the Waterloo recreation area, Jackson and Washtenaw counties; Pickney, Livingston and Washtenaw counties; Rochester-Utica, Macomb and Oakland counties; Ortonville, Lapeer and Oakland counties; Metamora, Lapeer county; and Brighton and Island Lake, Livingston county. Others are Bald Mountain, Highland, Holly, Pontiac Lake and Proud Lake, Oakland county.

BEE PICKLES ARE EASY TO PREPARE, WILL STORE WELL

If you have no pressure cooker and you'd like to save that big crop of beets for winter, take the advice of Roberta Hershey, foods and nutrition specialist at Michigan State College, and pickle them. Pickled beets are easy to keep after being processed in a boiling water bath and will retain their beautiful red color without darkening.

Here are step by step directions suggested by Miss Hershey. First

cut off the beet tops, leaving 1 inch of stem. Also leave the root. Wash the beets and cover with boiling water. Cook until tender. Remove skins and slice the beets.

For sirup, use 2 cups of vinegar, or one and a half cups of vinegar and a half cup of water, along with 2 cups of sugar. Heat this sirup to boiling.

Pack the hot beets in glass jars to one-half inch of the top. Then cover them with pickling sirup, leaving the half inch of space at the top. Add a half teaspoon of salt to pints, 1 teaspoon to quarts.

Adjust the jar lids and process in a boiling water bath for 30 minutes. Complete the seals as soon as you take the jars out of the bath if the closures aren't of the self-sealing type.

Next winter serve them to your family as a salad made of alternating crescents of crisp celery and pickled beets - with a dash of chopped onion if they all like onion.

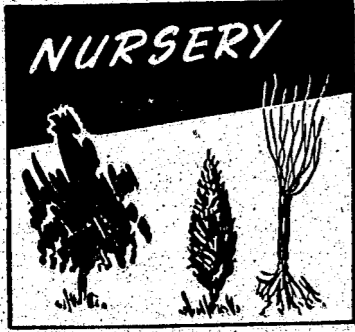

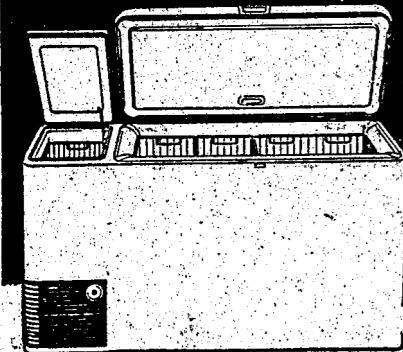

COMMENTS FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.

Congressman George A. Dondoro

Members of the United States Senate currently are debating the new tax bill, designed to put the Korean War and mobilization so far as possible on a pay-as-you-go basis, and at the same time to assist in combatting price inflation.

Before it started on the recess ending September 12, the House of Representatives passed a tax bill providing for about \$7 billion additional income for the Federal Government.

Prior to reporting out the Senate tax bill, the Finance Committee of the Senate out the House figures down to about \$5.8 billion of new government income. Thus the difference between the two bills is approximately \$1.2 billion.

The tax argument in the Senate has consisted of an effort by three Senators, Humphrey of Minnesota, Douglas of Illinois, and Lehman of New York, to get the figures back up to a point in the neighborhood of the \$7 billion approved by the House.

Two of the Senators, Humphrey and Lehman, long have been supporters of every spending program

A record 15,747 hunters or one out of about every 25 stalked whitetails the more difficult bow and arrow method last season. Hunter report card computations show the success ratio of archers improved from seven to 14 percent and gun hunters from 30 to 32 percent. Of the 1,648 deer taken by archers, 1,447 were bagged by 13,012 bowmen working the northern lower peninsula.

At least two bow licenses (Keweenaw) were issued in every county in the state last year. Wayne county led with 2,630 and was followed by Bay with 1,303, Genesee another 1,180 and Oakland with 1,013.

As recently as 1945 a grand total of only 1,800 entered the field with bow and arrow.

**FRUIT AND GARDEN NOTES**  
by Willard E. Bosserman  
Assistant County Agr'l Agent

**PACKAGING FRUITS AND VEGETABLES**  
When you pack your apples, pears or other produce for selling, remember to pack them as though you were going to use them yourself. You can get by the law by putting in a few off-grade fruits, but when your customers find these off-grade fruits they are not likely to come back for a second package.

A uniform package is more attractive and therefore sells much better than one with fruits all different sizes. A package in which either all or most of the fruits can be seen sells better because your customers can see what they are getting.

Poor quality, un-uniform and disorderly displays drives customers away, while orderly displays of quality produce attracts customers.

**SHEEP OUTLOOK GOOD**  
Sheep-raising looks like a good bet right now to Michigan State College animal husbandry specialists. The bright outlook is caused by continuing near-record high prices in prospect for lambs and wool.

And added to that pleasant prospect for sheep raisers is the fact that the number of sheep is low. Sheep require little labor and are tops for converting pasture and hay into money in the bank, the livestock specialists agree.

**SAFETY RULES PAY**  
Most highway accidents can be prevented if drivers will follow five basic safety principles, says David Steinicke, extension safety specialist at Michigan State College.

They are: keep your car in top mechanical condition; obey all

traffic laws and regulations; adjust your speed to road conditions; never take a chance; and always be courteous.

**SOLVE PROBLEM OF FINDING RAM**  
Help for sheep raisers in finding a top quality ram for their flock is on the way from the Michigan Sheep Breeders' Association, the Animal Husbandry Extension Department of Michigan State College and county extension offices, cooperating.

Graydon Blank, extension animal husbandry specialist at MSC announced that purebred rams will be available for farmers of southern Michigan at the Ram Day, scheduled to be held at Michigan State College, October 1.

Northern Michigan sheep raisers can get a ram at any of six stops on the schedule for the Ram Truck. Local county agricultural agents can be contacted for further information and dates of the truck stops for the northern Michigan area.

Selected rams of the Hampshire, Oxford, Shropshire, Corriedale and Suffolk breeds will be represented and will be priced according to quality. Farmers wanting to obtain rams of other breeds should so inform their county agricultural agent, Blank said.

**GIANT WORM REACHES CRANBROOK**  
An Australian earthworm tailored for bigger fish than grow in local waters has just been received and placed on display by the Cranbrook Institute of Science in Bloomfield Hills. The animal seems large enough to suit almost any angler, for it is 52 inches long but, according to Dr. Robert T. Hatt, Institute Director, sometime they grow to a length of 12 feet. They live deep in the soil,

but are so noisy that diggers can locate the bait by the gurglings it makes.

So far as known, the only animal preying on the big worms is a bird called the Laughing King Fisher.
