Here are some suggestions to farmers:

1 - Most · Sportsman's members are informed on how to conduct themselves when hunt-

2 - Limiting hunters by permission will cut down damage by tramping down crops and fences. 3 - Asking those who do have permission to hunt, to help prevent trespassing by others, will help the farmer.

4 — Those who do commit malicious mischief or damage can be prosecuted by taking the back tag number and, if available, the license number of the car of offenders, and turn it over to the Game Warden.

5 - In cases of willful trespass (trespass on posted land or not leaving properties when requested, or trespass for hunting purposes without permission) will be prosecuted by the Conservation Department, providing witnesses are available.


