

will handle winter traffic across the Straits and will augment the will handle winter traffic across the Straits and will augment the present four State Ferries at other seasons of the year. It will be powered by four huge Diesel engines and will be 360 feet long and 73½ feet wide. It will load and unload at either end, which will cut some 20 minutes per round trip off the time of the four state boats now in service at the Straits. The Vacationland will handle some 150 vehicles and 650 passengers per trip. It will cost approximately \$4,500,000. A new State Ferry dock is being built at St. Ignace and a new slip for the Vacationland at the Mackinaw City docks.



## Scientists attack peach blossom blight

Michigan ranks among the top three states in peach production. To protect this important industry, scientists at Michigan State College's Agricultural Experiment Station are experimenting with methods of controlling blossom blight. Recent experiments tested sprays of wettable sulphur, liquid lime-sulphur, and various new organic fungicides. Though not conclusive, results of these tests have been encouraging. #### Electrical detective tracks down telephone trouble

In a large Michigan Bell dial telephone office, about 2,000,000 switch contacts are "on duty" to carry your calls, 10,000 of them may be needed to clear a path for a single call. So "faults," though infrequent, must be detected quickly. A new automatic detector has been designed for the job. It finds "faults" -a broken wire, specks of dirt causing high resistance - and detours calls around them. Then it automatically punches out a report on the trouble. Maintenance men check these reports regularly, learn what needs attention, see that service flows smoothly. Telephone efficiency like this keeps quality of service high, keeps costs as low as possible.


