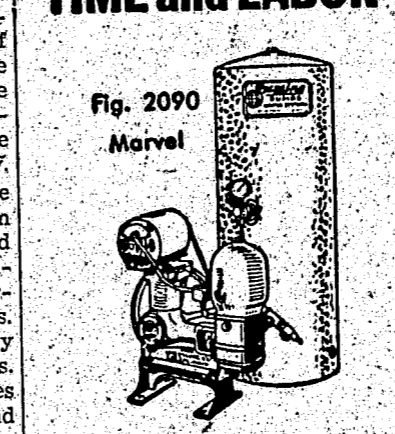

DEBATE NEWS  
Two practice debates were held at Clarkston on Wednesday between Davison and Clarkston students.  
On November 12, Clarkston will be the host for the first League Debate Tournament. Schools competing will be Northville, Holly, Milford, Clarenceville, and Clarkston. Two debates will be held in different high school rooms be-

ginning at 4:00. Then at 7:00 three more debates are scheduled. All of the debates will be on the proposition, "Resolved: That all American citizens should be subject to conscription in time of war." Each debate will last about an hour so that the first round will be over at about 8:00. All of the debates are open to the public and there is no admission. We would like very much to have an audience for each debate.

**FACULTY INTERVIEWS**

This week we interviewed Miss Ruth Sproul, who is Clarkston's new director of vocal music. Miss Sproul was born in Dover, Ohio, where her mother and father still live. Her father is the head book-keeper for the Reeves Steel and Manufacturing Company. Miss Sproul has two sisters. One is now teaching in Ohio, while the other is a trained nurse. This sister is now married, has little twin boys, and lives in Illinois. Miss Sproul also has one younger brother who lives in New Jersey.

Miss Sproul attended the Dover High School and while there played in the school band and the orchestra, and sang in an A Cappella choir. In her junior year Dover's band won the Class B National Championship. After graduating from high school, she studied at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music at Berea, Ohio, where she received her Bachelor's Degree in Music. Her Master's Degree in Music Education was

earned later at the University of Michigan.  
Miss Sproul has taught in three different states: Ohio, Iowa, and Michigan. She likes Michigan the best. Romulus, Milford, Remus, Troy Township, and Onaway High Schools are the places in Michigan where Miss Sproul has taught. In these schools she taught a variety of subjects including band, orchestra, vocal music and English. She enjoys teaching vocal music more than any other subject.

At Clarkston, Miss Sproul has twenty-four different classes in eight different schools. She teaches vocal music from first grade through the twelfth grade. In the high school she directs the glee club and has been working with two trios within the glee club. Says Miss Sproul, "I certainly wish that we had more boys in our glee club. Right now only five are members." Miss Sproul also said that she was hoping to form an A Cappella choir and later to get robes for the choir.

When she isn't busy with school work, Miss Sproul enjoys writing poetry, reading, and doing oil painting. She also is very interested in photography.

In Clarkston she is living with Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Souby, and is enjoying herself very much. You will probably be seeing a great deal of Miss Sproul when the various vocal groups which she directs entertain for the P. T. A. or on other occasions.

**WARNING GIVEN ABOUT CARBON MONOXIDE**

Forty Michigan people will lose their lives to carbon monoxide poisoning in the next few months unless we all give more attention to its danger, the Michigan Department of Health warned today.  
Every year about this time, the colorless, odorless and tasteless gas snuffs out the life of a business man warming his car in a closed garage, of a sleeping family unaware of a defective furnace, of transients in a poorly ventilated tourist cabin or a young couple parked in a car with its motor running.

It takes only ten parts of carbon monoxide in ten thousand parts of air to put a person to sleep in an hour and to kill in four hours. As little as two parts per ten thousand will cause headache, nausea and dizziness. Greater proportions cause unconsciousness and death more rapidly.

These are the precautions which you must observe to protect yourself and your loved ones from the danger of carbon monoxide, the Health Department said:

1. Make sure that all heating appliances in your home are properly vented and that the vents are open and without cracks or leaks. Have the furnace lining inspected to assure that carbon monoxide cannot leak into the jacket and heating ducts, no matter whether you heat with coal, gas or oil. Remember that where there is smoke or smell there is usually carbon monoxide, and there may be carbon monoxide where there is no smoke or smell.

2. Be sure that the carburetor on your car is properly adjusted and that the exhaust system is absolutely tight. Don't warm your car up by running the engine in a closed garage. Keep a window open when you drive long distances. Close the fresh air intake in congested traffic so that exhaust

fumes from the car ahead are not drawn in. If you begin to feel drowsy, dizzy or slightly nauseated while driving or riding, stop the car, get out and open all the doors. Have the car checked before you drive it again.

3. Don't take chances on "parking" in an automobile with the engine running, even with a window open.

4. When you stay in a tourist or hunting cabin, make sure that the space heater is vented and that the vent is open, and for double security, raise the window before retiring. A bird nest or leaves may clog the chimney.

5. Don't use a gas or kerosene oven or the burners on your stove to warm up the kitchen these cool mornings. Remember, too, that the snug, drowsy feeling you get when you sit by the fireplace or over the hot-air register may be due to carbon monoxide.

When fresh parsley or celery leaves get that "tired look"—put them in a pan in a warm oven and dry out. Then store in tightly covered jars for soups, stews and gravies.

Open all the doors of a house, cabin, garage or car thought to have carbon monoxide contaminated air. If a person has been overcome by carbon monoxide remove him at once to open air, keep him warm, and call a doctor, and while waiting, apply artificial respiration, if necessary.


