

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

To conclude our discussion on pruning I would like to touch a little on cherries. Sour Cherry . The sour cherry seldom needs much pruning other than the re-moval of weak, dead and broken branches. The annual or biennial pruning should be a very light thinning out in which no large cuts are made. Trees that grow too tall may need heading back occasionally to good lateral branches. Sweet Cherry — The sweet cherry has a tendency to produce pole-like branches that reach too great a height. 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

RED FLASHERS ON WRECKERS IN MOTION ILLEGAL

Police Commissioner State Donald S. Leonard warns that the use of red flasher signals on wrecker trucks while enroute to or from a call is a violation of the law.

"Use of the red flasher is permissible while a wrecker is at the scene of a call because the vehicle is standing still on the highway and the blinker lights are warning to other traffic," Leonard said. "However, the red lashers are illegal when the wrecker is going to or from the call, even though it may be hauling a car".

The commissioner stated his warning resulted from a number of complaints over use of red flashers on wreckers.

"Other drivers are confused by these lights when in motion, believing the wrecker is a police car, a fire truck or an ambulance which must be given right-of-way. The latter vehicles, of course, are entitled to use the lights on emergency runs. But becoming acustomed to seeing wreckers with the red flashers many drivers then wrongly identify an emergency car as a wrecker and fail to take need accordingly."



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


