HERE'S A NOTE TO SANTA CLAUS!

Please be sure the toys you bring to Michigan children are safe for them to use; the Michigan Department of Health wrote today.

Keep the chemistry sets, sharp-pointed darts, swords, arrows and shears, the sharp-cornered and rough-edged things for the older kids.

Bring the little ones sturdy, smooth-edged toys that won't break easily — balls and blocks, rubber animals and dolls and pulling toys. Be sure that eyes, buttons, whistles and small parts won't come off; that pull cords and handles are tightly fastened on, and that paints and dyes are safe.

When you leave skates, a wagon, tricycle or bicycle, be sure the little fellow is big enough to use them, and that there is somebody in the home who will show him how to pilot them safely.

When you leave a gun — pop-gun, air rifle, big rifle or shotgun, be sure that Mom and Dad have told the lad how to use a gun and that they will supervise his shooting until he can handle the gun well. Don't leave a gun, Santa, for any boy who ever shoots without looking or points a gun at anybody.

Leave toy electric stoves, irons, jigsaws and wood-burning outfits only where a parent has time to supervise their use and where there are safe electrical outlets and safe places to play with them. Remember that one of the best presents for any boy or girl is enough room to play in.

Before you leave a lot of toys, Santa, be sure there is a storage shelf or toy box for them. It may be made out of packing or fruit boxes — cloth or plastic covered, painted or papered — but it should have plenty of room and cubby-

holes, and no rough edges, sharp corners or nails, inside or out. Bring "do-with" toys, Santa, to help the child to grow, but let them be safe enough so that he will grow strong and well.

Luke 2:11, "For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior which is Christ the Lord".

It is only because it is one of the basic teachings of Christ that I dare present it, this Christmas time, for the prayers and hopes of the multitudes of the common people, who believe that the wisdom of the Lords and Rulers of mankind is foolishness with God.

Shepherds and wise men, mothers and fathers, soldiers and workers cry out for a new way of life. In answer to their despair and in response to their hope, God placed a little Babe in a manger at Bethlehem. That little Christ Child has become the potential Savior of the human race. This Son of God and Son of man calls to the nations saying "Suffer the little children to come unto me".

Thou shalt not kill little children; Thou shalt love little children — These commands of God will break swords into ploughshares, and atomic bombs into instruments of blessing. These commands are a common denominator of the God of Peace, of the Prince of Peace and of all meek, merciful and peaceful persons who believe Jesus Christ is the Savior of the Race.

HERE'S A NOTE TO SANTA CLAUS!

Please be sure the toys you bring to Michigan children are safe for them to use, the Michigan Department of Health wrote today.

Keep the chemistry sets, sharp-pointed darts, swords, arrows and shears, the sharp-cornered and rough-edged things for the older kids.

Bring the little ones sturdy, smooth-edged toys that won't break easily — balls and blocks, rubber animals and dolls and pulling toys. Be sure that eyes, buttons, whistles and small parts won't come off; that pull cords and handles are tightly fastened on, and that paints and dyes are safe.

When you leave skates, a wagon, tricycle or bicycle, be sure the little fellow is big enough to use them, and that there is somebody in the home who will show him how to pilot them safely.

When you leave a gun — pop-gun, air rifle, big rifle or shotgun, be sure that Mom and Dad have told the lad how to use a gun and that they will supervise his shooting until he can handle the gun well. Don't leave a gun, Santa, for any boy who ever shoots without looking or points a gun at anybody.

Leave toy electric stoves, irons, jig saws and wood-burning outfits only where a parent has time to supervise their use and where there are safe electrical outlets and safe places to play with them. Remember that one of the best presents for any boy or girl is enough room to play in.
