

Oakland County schools through the agricultural departments are going to offer farmers a soil testing service this year. Agricultural departments at Ortonville, Oxford, Rochester, Milford, Walled Lake and South Lyon will be able to test farm soils for lime beginning March 15. Farmers should contact the agricultural teacher at the above named schools for assistance,

COUNTY LABORATORY OPENS

For a complete analysis on the soil the Oakland County Extension soil testing laboratory will be open for business as of this week, March 7. If you wish a complete analysis of your soil bring your soil samples to 1260 West; Boulevard, the Extension Office, for testing. Not only lime but were Mrs. Donald Steiner, sister phosphorus and potash as well, will be anaylzed. Farmers who have been getting their soil tested for the past three years are giving some excellent reports on results in crop yields, and quality of production when recommendations are followed.

One big saving alone from havng soil tested is complete fertilizer recommendations resulting in seedings saved. Almost as important as lime on fields is phosphate for the production of grasses and legumes. Oakland County farms are generally very low. in phosphate and only medium in potash. For best results, better yields and better quality, test your soils at least once each rotation,

Announces Candidacy

Chief Assistant Oakland County Prosecuting Attorney Frederick Ziem announced today he will seek the prosecutor's office on the Republican ticket in the Septemer primary.

Ziem's announcement was the first made by any candidate for any county Office. He will run for the position held now by Prosecuting Attorney Clyde D. Underwood, who will not be a candidate for re-election.

Born in Detroit, Michigan on March 17, 1916, Ziem has been a resident of Oakland County for 30 years.

He was educated in Pontiac schools, and graduated from Pontiac High School in 1933. From there he went to the University

of Michigan where he played three years of varsity football. He received his Bachelor's degree in 1938, and continued his legal education at University of Michigan Law school. He graduated from law school in 1941, was admitted or sunshine.

The official date and time will oe 11:14 A. M., on Thursday, Mar. 20 according to Hazel M. Losh, assistant professor of astronomy at the University of Michigan.

This is nearly three-fourths of a day earlier than in 1951 when Spring arrived at 5:26 A. M., on March 21. The earlier date is due to the insertion of the extra leap year day in February, Professor

Losh explains. "Days and nights will be equal on March 20 since the sun crosses the equator on that date and will rise and set at the exact east and west points," she declares. "After March 20, the sun will be moving north on the horizon and our hours of daylight will increase until late in June."

The effect of more daylight will be more noticeable in the evening ather than in the early morning. This is because our clocks are on Eastern Standard Time and are actually ahead of the daily motion of the sun across the sky. At twelve moon on our clocks, the sun hasn't actually reached the meridian, This gives us longer afternoons than would be true if our clocks were more in tune with the sun, Professor Losh says.

Along with Spring, March will feature three bright planets, as well as an early evening opportunity to check up on two stars, Arcturus and Spica. Mercury will be in its most

favorable position for observation by the middle of the month, she reports, but will still remain quite low in the western sky. It will reach its highest point on the evening of March 18, just after sunset, when it should be visible about 16 degrees above the true west point.

Almost directly opposite in the eastern sky, Saturn will be rising after sunset and will remain visible all night. A little to the north and left of Saturn, but rising almost at the same hour, is the bright orange star, Arcturus. Rising a little later than Saturn, but directly below it, will be the bright, white star, Spica. Midnight will bring with it the planet Mars, red in color, and brighter than any of the other objects in the March skies. Mars will rise a bit south of the east point.

MEASLES COMMON IN MICHIGAN

Measles is being reported at the trate of 700 cases a week in Michigan, and the state is in for a "Mensles Year", the Michigan Department of Health said today. The disease, one of the mos

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so-called children's diseases, is already reaching "epidemic proportions in some of the southeastern sections of the state and is spreading rapidly to other areas.

Measles is especially dangerous to young children under six years like symptoms in about ten days; of age, and the Michigan Departbe on the alert for cases in their communicable in the three or foilr neighborhood and especially to watch for symptoms in their older children so they will know if the young child is exposed.

If the young child is exposed call your doctor at once.

Because of the threat of complications and even death from measles in younger children, the State Health Department recommends modification of the disease in all children under six years of age, and the prevention of measles warning placard may be placed on in infants and children who are not well and strong. Physicians have a serum

mmune serum globulin modify or prevent measles, but TIME for CRIPPLED CHILDREN success depends upon the parent MARCH 13 - APRIL 13 knowing the approximate time of exposure. To prevent measles, the serum must be given immediately after exposure. To modify measles t must be given on the fifth or sixth day allter exposure.

Modification of measles makes the case light and prevents comolications, but usually results in a lasting immunity to the disease Prevention of the disease gives only temporary protection lasting from two to four weeks.






