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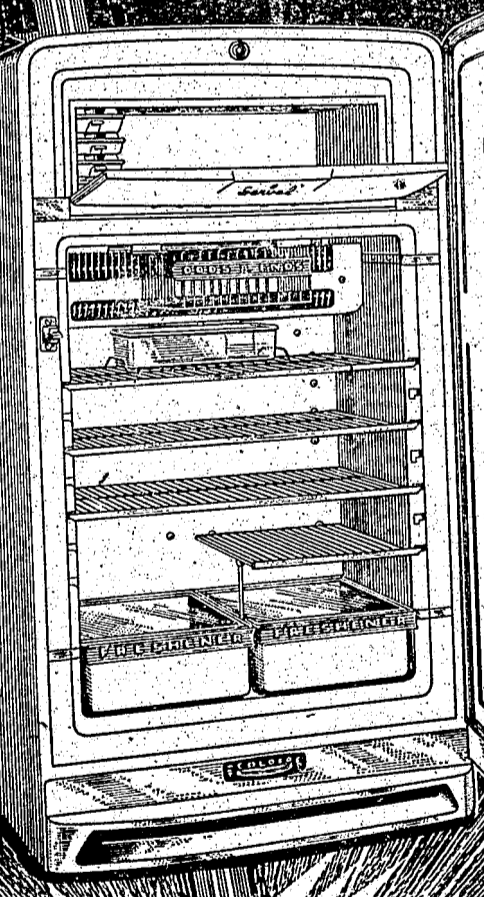

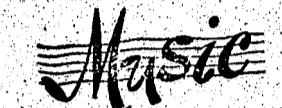

ON CAPITOL HILL NEWS and COMMENT FROM CONGRESSMAN GEORGE A. DONDERO



One of the hottest arguments now in progress in the House of Representatives, more or less behind the scenes, concerns whether Congressional committees shall be permitted to televise their public hearings. Some action to resolve the question seems likely in the near future.

Just now, the best guess as to what that action will be is that the House itself will be called upon, under a new rule, to decide with respect to each committee hearing. No committee chairman apparently wants to take the responsibility, nor do most committee members.

It is a good guess, too, that in adopting a new rule to cover televising and radio broadcasting of committee hearings, the House will attempt to set up some rules of procedure for public hearings. Hearings in executive session would go on as before.

This because it is undeniably in the under 10-acre size class and 78 from 10 to 100 acre size. Seven were over 100 acre size but there were no deaths due to forest fires for the fourth consecutive year.

Eleven more starved deer have been picked up by conservation department field men, making a total of 18 known starvation victims so far this winter. Five others were killed by dogs in the Gladwin district.

Six of the latest starvation losses were in the Mio district, four in Gladwin county and one in Arenac county.

Critical period for deer has started and, depending on the weather, could last as long as early May in the upper peninsula. Reports indicate deer are expected to be in increasing difficulty in the Mio and Gaylord districts.

true that in recent months some witnesses have been subjected to browbeating and abuse by members of investigating committees. It is true also that some witnesses have been guilty of serious breaches of respect and even common courtesy due committees of the nation's governing body.

That in one way or another television and radio will be used to convey to the public the things the public wants to know about the activities of Congressional committees was indicated by what happened in connection with a recent hearing of the House Un-American Activities Committee in Detroit.

A ruling by House Speaker Sam Rayburn prevented televising of that hearing. Rayburn said the House rules provide no authority for televising of committee hearings. But neither do those rules forbid televising.

Some have said Rayburn exceeded his authority and made a ruling of a political nature, calculated to prevent Congressman Charles E. Potter, of Cheboygan, from benefitting politically from televising of the hearing. Potter has been mentioned as a possible Republican candidate for the Senate against Democratic Senator Blair Moody.

At any rate, after each day's hearing, Potter appeared as an individual on television to tell the story of the day's doings. Potter performed a valuable public service in this way. Whether he gained any political benefit is debatable, since he has not yet decided whether he will enter the Republican Senatorial primary.

President Truman continues to call the Korean conflict a "police action" instead of a war. But that is not what other people are calling it.

A few days ago three Pennsylvania judges ruled that it is in fact a war. Their ruling concerned an insurance policy held by a young man killed in the Korean fighting. The policy contained a "war clause", invalidating it in the event the insured died in battle. As a result of the ruling, the insurance company paid no benefits to the dead soldier's mother.

CONSERVATION NEWS

Debris burners tied smokers for the dishonor of starting the most forest fires last year, the conservation department's forest fire service discloses.
Department recently reported a record low 4,495 acres damaged by 669 fires in 1951.
Over 200 of the fires were in the Gladwin and Baldwin districts, but most acres were blackened in the more southern Plainwell and Imley City districts.
Completed summary also shows 246 debris burners and a like number of careless smokers were responsible for nearly 75 percent of the fires which did get started. Smokers alone headed the dishonor roll in past years. Other causes were miscellaneous, 55; railroads, 32; unknown, 29; incendiary, 24; camp fires, 21; lightning, 9; and lumbering, seven.
With about 1,000 less acres burned in 1951 than in 1950, timber damage also dropped, from \$40,691 to \$23,856. Actual suppression costs increased some, from \$24,200 to \$27,167.
Fire hazard period started in mid-March and continued through early November, with department fire fighters putting out 584 fires
