How quiet it is in the woods; the trees stand motionless, their branches outlined as gaunt, gnarled arms or as delicate lace against the snowcovered rise of another hill, or against the sky. But the trees do not look dead; the grey of the bank has become a warmer color, and oh-there's an elm with it's buds swelling, and the birches show their catkins, small and tight yet, but it is a promise.

I sit down on a log and scuff the snow away from the ground. A little wintergreen plant lights up against the dark mosses with one precious little bright-red

berry among the glossy leaves. I won't be long now, and the curved shoots of the May apple will unfurl as little umbrellas, and the violets will color the edges of the swamp pulple; the dainty wood anemones are found only when you look for them, but the regal trilliums will show their waxywhite triangular blossoms all among the graceful ferns.

Oh joy-spring isn't far off! hurry back home, and when find the first seed catalogs in my mailbox, I settle down with pencil and paper to make a list of all that I want to grow and plant this year. Let it sonw for a while longer; it gives me time to get ready for the rush of work which comes upon us suddenly when the frost is out of the ground and a group of volunteer assistants. Its everything has to be done at once.

Now the late winter weather is forgotten in the preparation and planning of my work in the gardens and the fields. No impatient idleness, no useless marking time, but active anticipation such as braces, wheel-chairs and of all that spring brings to me



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



669 fires in 1951. Over 200 of the fires were in the Gladwin and Baldwin districts, but most acres were blackened in the more southern Plainwell and Imlay City districts.

Completed summary also shows 246 debris burners and a like number of careless smokers were responsible for nearly 75 percent of the fires which did get started. Smokers alone headed the dishonor roll in past years. Other causes were miscellaneous, 55; railroads, 32; unknown, 29; incendiary, 24; camp fires, 21; light-

ning, 9; and lumbering, seven. With about 1,000 less acres burned in 1951 than in 1950, timber damage also dropped, from \$40,691 to \$23,856. Actual suppression costs increased some, from \$24,200 to
