Rotary Fellowships are granted without regard to race, creed or citizenship. Chosen from candidates endorsed by Rotary Clubs in their home towns, they must be between 20 and 28 years of age, have a college or university degree, a record of high scholastic standing and a thorough knowledge of the language of the country in which they propose to study.

In the last twelve months, more than three hundred new Rotary Clubs have been organized in 39 countries of Europe, Africa, Asia, the Americas and the Islands of the Pacific. In January, the Rotary Club of Pusan in Korea was readmitted to membership in Rotary International, and Rotarians there and in Seoul, Korea, are actively engaged in distributing to refugees, clothing which has been contributed by Rotary Clubs in the United States, Canada and other countries.

Each year, Rotary International has a great international convention, which is attended by representatives of Rotary Clubs all over the world. The 43rd of these annual conventions will be held in Mexico City, May 25-29.

At this convention, Alan R. Brander of Wallaceburg, Ontario, will be elected to serve as Governor of the 22nd District of Rotary International for the fiscal year 1952-53, succeeding Lloyd C. Megeee of Clarkston, Michigan, presiding officer of the Conference recently held at Chatham.
