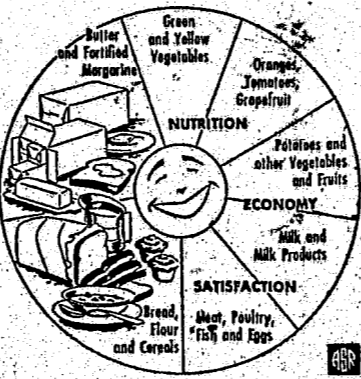

FRUIT AND GARDEN NOTES

TWO-SPOTTED MITE

The dry-hot weather we have had has been ideal weather for the build-up of two-spotted mite. Mites are almost invisible with the naked eye but can be seen with a hand lens. Another evidence of their presence is a yellowing of the leaves, starting first as a slight mottling. If the mites are not checked, the leaf becomes entirely yellowed and then drops off. Peach trees have been known to be entirely defoliated by mite.

CONTROL

Parathion has given excellent control for mites on foliage. Sometimes two applications are necessary.

Certain miticides give good control when used as recommended by the manufacturer.

**DETROIT EDISON SETS UP NEW DEPARTMENT**

Setting up of a new department of The Detroit Edison Company -- to be known as the Nuclear Power Development Department -- has been announced.

Walker L. Cisler, Edison president and general manager, named Harvey A. Wagner, assistant chief engineer of the company's engineering Department, to head the new unit as coordinator. He also announced the appointment of Edward L. Nugent, assistant supervising engineer of Construction Engineering, as assistant coordinator. The assignments are in addition to the appointees' present duties.

Cisler explained that for several years The Detroit Edison Company has been following closely the possibilities of using atomic fuel as a heat source in industry instead of present fuels like gas, petroleum, and coal. More recently, he said, the Dow Chemical Company of Midland and The Detroit Edison Company have been cooperating under a joint contract with the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission. The joint project is aimed at working out a basic engineering design for a nuclear heat power reactor of commercial usefulness.

Cisler emphasized that the project is still in a study stage, with possibilities of a practical application probably some years in the future. He said there are at present no plans for any "atomic power plants" in Michigan.

Function of Edison's new Nuclear Power Development Department will be to coordinate the company's various activities in the joint project. General coordination of the project with AEC, Dow Chemical, and other participants will continue to be the responsibility of consultant Alton P. Donnell, retained because of his extensive background of experience in this field.

**CHILDS FEARS HEAVY TRAFFIC TOLL OVER 4th**

With favorable weather, the volume of traffic on Michigan highways during the Fourth of July holiday period is expected to surpass all previous records and State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs is warning motorists the accident toll could likewise be an all-time high.

"The highest toll for the Fourth of July period in the state was 38 deaths in 1950," Childs said. "The lowest was eight in 1949."

"Last year the holiday came on a mid-week day, eliminating extended weekend trips for most persons. But ten persons were killed on the Fourth and 32 during the previous weekend, the worst weekend of the 1951 summer season."

"This year the Fourth and the weekend are combined into an extended holiday period. On the basis of last year's record we could have a new high fatality toll for the period. But we won't necessarily have a new high record if care and caution are practiced. In fact, there is no reason why the 1952 record cannot be as low — or lower —

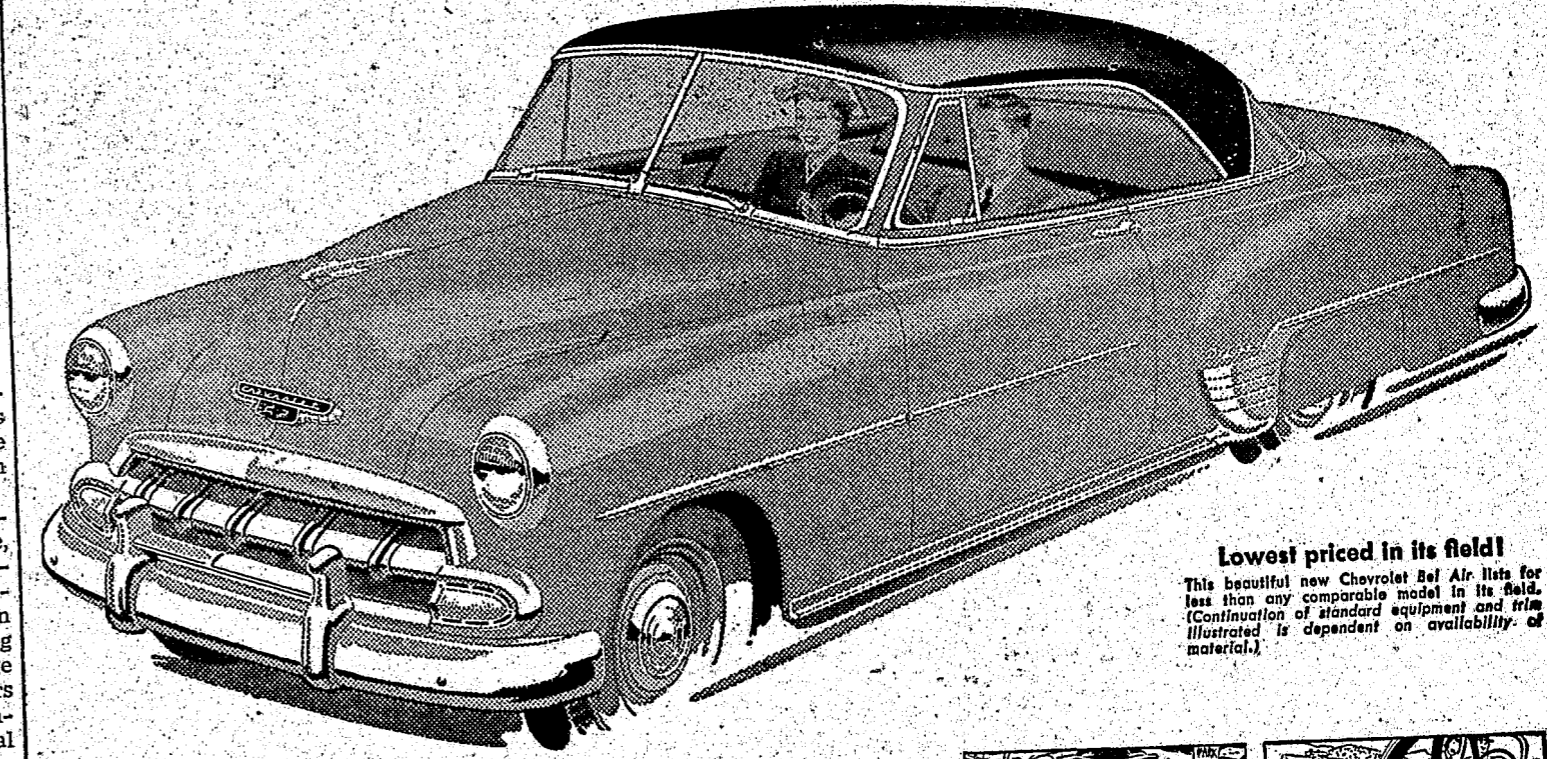
**FRANK GRANGER FILES FOR DRAIN COMMISSIONER**

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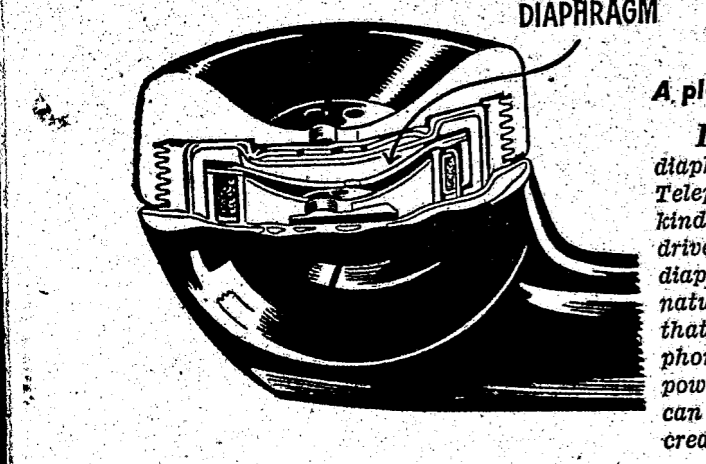

**Colored lights speed culling of cherries**

Colored lights help sorters of fruits and vegetables to detect small but important defects before processing. In a new technique developed in the agricultural engineering department of Michigan State College, plain white, blue and red fluorescent lights were tested. Under blue fluorescent light, sorters spotted defects 10 to 30% more efficiently than under white fluorescent. Under red fluorescent, sorter efficiency increased an average of 64% over white. Red light proved especially effective in culling cherries. For more information, call your County Agricultural Agent.

**HORSES CAN BE "FINGER-PRINTED"**

Horses, as well as human beings, can be "finger-printed". If that's news to you, don't develop an inferior complex because even the drivers at Northville

Downs weren't all "her" to this until this season. Furthermore, soon all the horses at Northville Downs actually will be "finger-printed" as a result of the announcement by the United States Trotting Association of the adoption of a fool-proof system of

identifying harness horses. The U. S. T. A. has embarked on a program that will result in the "chestnuts" or "night eyes" of every harness horse in the country being photographed. The "chestnuts" are horny growths located on the inside of each leg and are as effective as fingerprints in providing positive identification. No two are ever alike. The U. S. T. A. also will photograph front and side views of every horse and will note for the permanent record distinguishing characteristics such as scars, blemishes, imperfections of conformations, etc. Adopting of the new system will protect the public by rendering it impossible for a horse to be "ringed" once his "fingerprints" are on file with the U. S. T. A. However, veteran track officials point out that instances of "ringing" are rare indeed—they discover one in about every 10 years.

### The Grist Mill

**BUNT AND LOOSE SMUT IN WHEAT**

There are two main types of smut which affect winter wheat

in Michigan; bunt (stinking smut) and loose smut. These are fungus diseases with balls or masses of spores forming on the head of the wheat plant in place of wheat kernels.

1. BUNT is not readily recognized until the plants are fully headed. Infected heads are abnormal in size or shape with smut balls replacing the wheat kernels. Upon threshing, the smut balls break apart and the spores are spread to healthy kernels. They adhere to the kernels and are planted with them. Germinating at the same time to infect the seedling plants. As the spores of bunt are carried on the outside of the kernel they can be destroyed and the disease controlled by seed treatment with formaldehyde or the more common organic mercury dust and liquid treatments such as Ceresan M.

2. LOOSE SMUT differs from bunt in that the fungus produces the spores at flowering time. The

spores are blown to the flower parts of healthy heads where they germinate and establish the infection inside the developing kernels of wheat. The infected kernels appear normal and germinate like healthy kernels. The disease is not evident until heading time when black spore masses replace the wheat kernels in the head. To the average farmer the appearance of the disease is rather disconcerting; what may appear to be 10 percent infection by observation, may be one percent by actual count. As loose smut is carried within the seed, chemical seed treatment methods do not offer a means of control. The hot water treatment is effective but is considered impractical except on a small scale. Breeding for resistance seems to be the most practical means of control and much progress has been made.

Regardless of the seed source one can find an occasional head of loose smut in fields of wheat. On the average, however, there will be less loose smut in fields planted to certified seed, than when ordinary seed is used. However, exceptions do occur.

**FREEZING STRAWBERRIES**  
You can rely on your sense of smell to help select good strawberries for freezing, according to Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, county home demonstration agent. Berries with a rich, full strawberry odor are generally good flavored, she said.

Field-ripened fruit that is firm and freshly picked is best for your home freezer. Varieties that were found to freeze well in Michigan State College experiments were Premier, Dunlap, Catskill, Senator, Sparkle, and everbearing Gem.

Sort, wash and hull the berries, then drain them thoroughly, Mrs. Lawyer instructed. The more quickly you handle them, the better, she said.

Strawberries may be frozen whole, sliced or crushed. MSC researchers recommend using a sugar sirup rather than dry sugar. Use a 50 percent sirup made with one cup of sugar to one cup of water. Be sure the sirup covers the fruit completely. If a dry sugar pack is made, Mrs. Lawyer said to use one cup of sugar to four cups of fruit.

Mrs. Lawyer makes allowances for individual taste, however. Use less sugar if you prefer, she said, or strawberries can be frozen with no sugar at all for diabetics. No-sugar frozen strawberries do

lose some flavor and color, she said.

Here are some home freezing tips made by Mrs. Lawyer: Handle small amounts of fruit at a time to prevent bruising; handle the fruit quickly; avoid iron containers to keep better color; use a stainless knife.

Other suggestions for freezing are found in the bulletin Freezing Michigan Foods. This can be obtained free of charge by writing Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, Home Demonstration Agent, 1260 West Boulevard, Pontiac.
