'As a past Red Cross Examiner of several years standing, and a ling-long swimmer and swimming instructor, I feel qualified to state that any beach as treacherous as the Deer Lake beach should never be opened without the break-offs clearly marked. It was no surprise to me to learn of the drownings, the miracle is that it has not happened before many

Rates Raised On Public Telephones

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company announced that local calls from public telephones in this community will be increased to 10 cents by the end of this

The new rate actually was authorized by the Public Service Commission on June 5. The Michigan Bell Telephone Company, however, was unable to start collecting the dime charge immediately because of the time needed to alter its dial coin telephone equipment.

In changing its dial 'phones to dime operation, Michigan Bell had to retain the nickel slot for toll calls, but make the equipment inoperative for one nickel on local calls. To accomplish this newly-designed coin chute which will operate with either one dime or two nickels has been

installed. Less than two per cent of the company's 1,960,000 telephones are affected by the new charge which involves 20,500 such telephones in Detroit and about 16,500 in outstate communities.

The company said there would be no change in procedure in placing a call from a coin telephone under the new dime rate. Michigan Bell pointed out, however, that one nickel would no longer establish a connection and

that either two nickels or one dime will be required. New black and yellow instrucion cards at all coin telephone locations will remind customers of

the change in rate. The company said that, while the change to dime operation of its coin telephone began on June 26, the entire job would not be completed in some of the small

exchanges until July 3. Besides Michigan, the dime rate is now in effect in New York, Illinois, Washington, California Maryland, Virginia, Indiana, Arizona, and in major cities in 11 other states.





The dry- hot weather we have had has been ideal weather for the build-up of two spotted mite. Mites are almost invisible with the naked eye but can be seen with a hand lens, Another evidence of their presence is a mites are not checked, the leaf becomes entirely yellowed and foliated by mite.

Parathion has given excellent control for mites on foliage. Sometimes two applications are ecessary.

1. BUNT is not readily recognized until the plants are fully headed. Infected heads are abnormal in size or shape with smut balls replacing the wheat kernels. Upon threshing, the smut balls break apart and the spores are spread to healthy kernels. They adhere to the kernels and are planted with them. Germinating at the same time to infect the seedling plants. As the spores of bunt are carried on the outside of the kernel they can be destroyed and the disease controlled by seed treatment with formaldehyde or the more common organic mercury dust and liquid treatments such as Ceresan M.

Field-ripened fruit that is firm and freshly picked is best for your home freezer. Varieties that were found to freeze well in Michigan State College experiments were Premier, Dunlap, Catskill, Senator; Sparkle, and everbearing Gem.

Sort, wash and hull the berries. then drain them thoroughly, Mrs. Lawyer instructed. The more quickly you handle them, the better, she said.

Strawberries may be frozen whole, sliced or crushed. MSC researchers recommend using a sugar sirup rather than dry sugar. Use a 50 percent sirup made with one cup of sugar to one cup of water. Be sure the sirup covers the fruit completely. If a dry sugar pack is made, Mrs. Lawyer said to use one cup of sugar to four cups of fruit.

Mrs. Lawyer makes allowances for individual taste, however. Use less sugar if you prefer, she said, or strawberries can be frozen with no sugar at all for diabetics. No-sugar frozen strawberries do
