Editors Discuss Two Proposals

On Friday evening of last week League at a dinner meeting at Bloomfield Country Club where they listened to a report on the history of the league and its activities and discussed the reapportionment amendments on the November ballot.

As a result of the discussion the newspapers decided to cooperate with the Citizens League and the Civic Research, Inc., of Pontiac, non-profit, non-partisan organizations devoted to research and education in government, in presenting a series of articles on the amendments. The first of the series follows:

Michigan voters will be asked to decide at the Nov. 4 election which of two proposals they want on reapportionment of the state legislature. Each of the proposals is the result of initiated petitions backed by interested groups. How Oakland County will be affected under the proposals is important to understand, in order to cast an ntelligent ballot.

Proposal No. 2 on the ballot (backed by the C. I. O.) seeks to set up a legislature based on population alone. Proposal No. 3 (backed by the Michigan Committee for a Balanced Legislature) has an area-population concept in creating the legislative body. It is necessary to vote "no" on one amendment and "yes" on the other, depending on the voter's choice.

Under the present state constitution the legislature consists of a Senate of 32 members elected for two year terms, with not more than one senator from a district, and a House of Representatives of not less than 64 nor more than 100 members, chosen for two-year terms, under a complicated "population" procedure.

Since adoption of the state constitution in 1908, the population has shifted tremendously. Since 1913 no reapportioning of the House of Representatives has taken place. The last time the Senate was "rearranged" was in 1925 proposals have been advanced to amend the state constitution and correct some of the evils of reapportionment. From where I sit, so often when there's a difference of opinion it's best to sit right down and work things out (like when our volunteer firemen decided to serve both lemonade and beer at their annual picnic last month). Don't let prejudices "color" your opinion of your neighbor. He'll probably be quite as open-minded as you are.

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NEWS AND COMMENT from CONGRESSAN GEO. DONDERO GOVERNMENT SPENDING

While government spending for the moment goes on unabated, it has become apparent that even the bureaucrats cannot agree concerning future trends in this respect. The President says that more and more spending will be necessary for several years to come, but Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer and Robert C. Turner, the President's new economic adviser, say the war-spending peak is past.

On August 15, the President said military spending would be at the rate of about \$4.4 billion a month, for the rest of the fiscal year ending next June 30.

Spending in the last two months has been actually only about \$3.7 billion a month. But John Steelman, the Presidential assistant, who until lately was also Director of Defense Mobilization, says this is only a temporary lull in spend=

Meanwhile, Robert C. Turner nas announced that, "the time when defense expenditures were rising month after month has come to an end". Secretary Sawyer recently said that "we are near our goal" of defense production. Elsewhere in their statements, they both indicated a belief that government spending soon may taper

Manifestly members of the Trunan administration have their signals mixed on the subject of government spending. But of one thing we may be sure. If spending continues to soar, inflation will be hastened, and we shall hear a call' for higher taxes "to siphon off the excess buying power of the people". If spending tapers off, and the props are thus removed from under our war prosperity then government tax income will decrease, and we shall hear the same call for higher taxes with which to meet costs of govern-

The taxpayers, and that means all of the people, simply cannot win when it comes to getting tax reductions in the face of this kind of thinking on the part of the administration. As matters stand now, it has become evident that taxes are so high that enferprise in some economic areas has become discouraged, with the result that higher rates are yielding less tax income to the govern-

It is fortunate for everybody perhaps, that many of our present high taxes automatically will be suspended, as provided in the tax laws, over the next two or three years. It is doubtful if Congress except in the event of a new world war, would vote to reinstate those high taxes. Let us hope not, any-

One of the reasons cited by those who believe Russia is not likely to start a new world war, at least for a number of years, is the comparative table of steel production in Iron Curtain countries and the countries of the Free

Reliable estimates put Russian steel production for this year at 41,470,000 tons and of all countries behind the Iron Curtain at 55,220,000 tons. American steel production this year, in spite of the steel strike, is estimated at 117,000,000 tons and of all free countries at 211,233,000 tons. The world total for this year is estimated at 266,453,000 tons.

Steel is the one absolutely vital necessity of warfare. It is generally conceded that in the long run th nations which produce the most steel win any war. There is no reason to think that the Kremlin conspirators are unaware of the situation with respect to comparative outputs of steel. And there is small likelihood that the Iron Curtain countries can largely increase their steel output on short notice.
