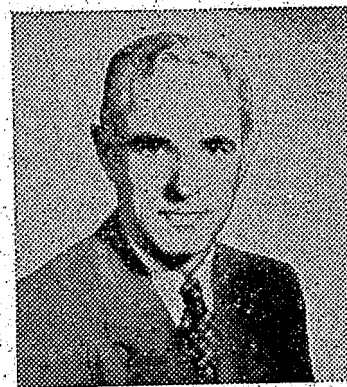

### CLARKSTON DOWN ORTONVILLE 14 - 6

A highly sparked Clarkston eleven avenged their last year's defeat by beating Ortonville 14 - 6. Although the score indicated a close game, Clarkston completely dominated the play, threatening throughout the game.

In the first period Ric Huttenlocher recovered an Ortonville fumble; two plays later, little Harry Devar ran 45 yards for a touchdown. Don Colton kicked the extra point.

Ortonville took advantage of a Clarkston fumble to make the score 7 - 6, but later in the second period, Tom Bullen went 7 yards to reinforce the Wolves' lead. Don Colton again converted to end the scoring at 14 - 6.

Penalties were very costly to the Clarkston team. Two touchdowns, one by Glen Abbott and one by Harry Devar, were called back because of penalties.

The running of Harry Devar and the spinning of Glen Abbott sparked the Clarkston offense, while Bob Summers and Chuck Robertson were the strong men on defense. Summers played middle guard and continually was in the Ortonville backfield.

This was the first game the Clarkston line did any blocking, and this is also the first game Clarkston scored.

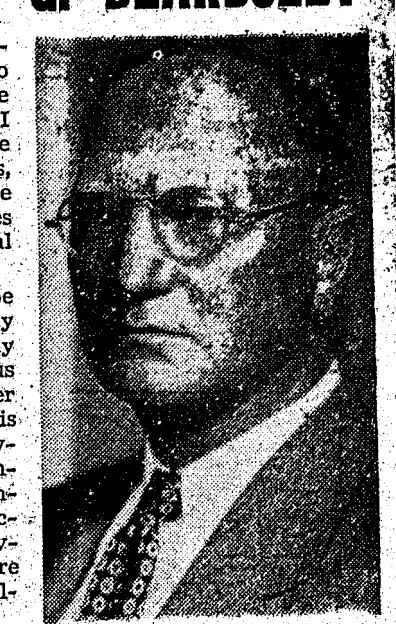

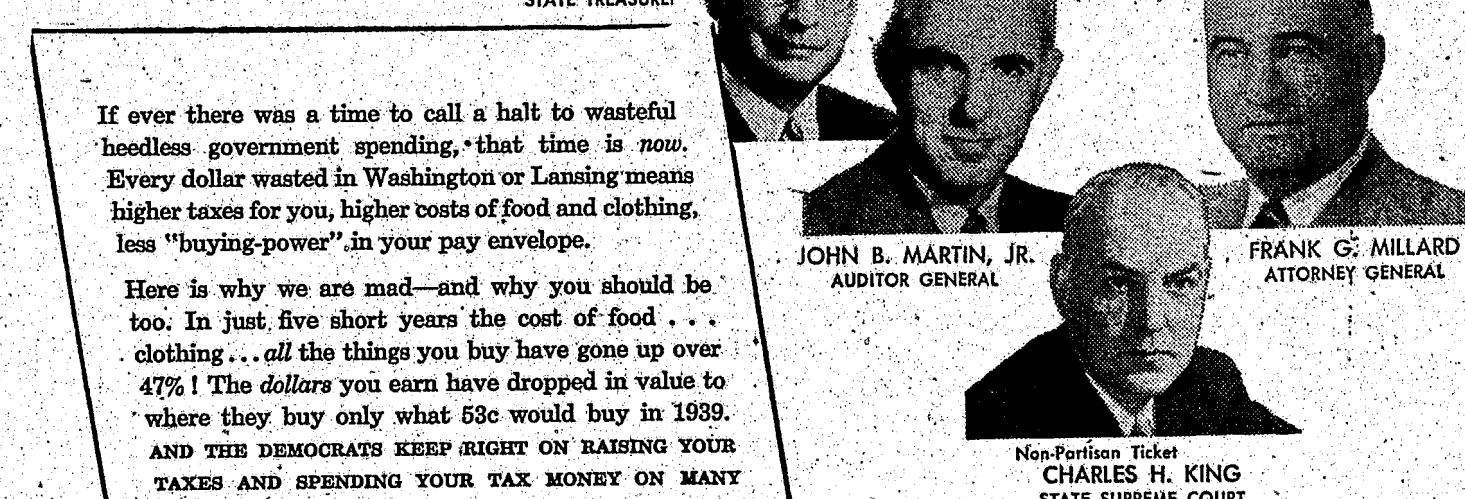
a. Rigid economy in all branches of state government must be insisted upon.

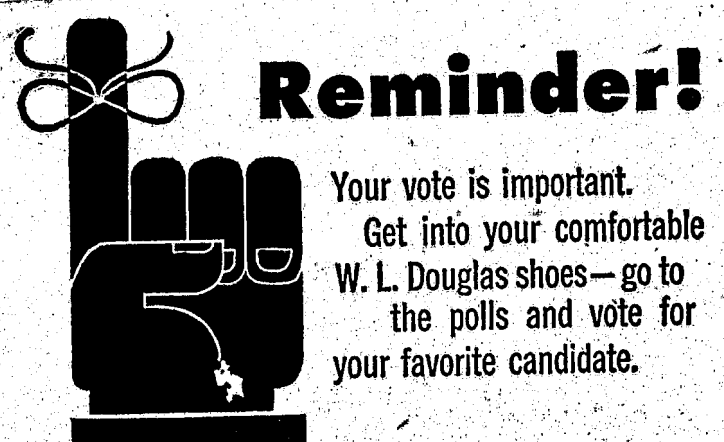

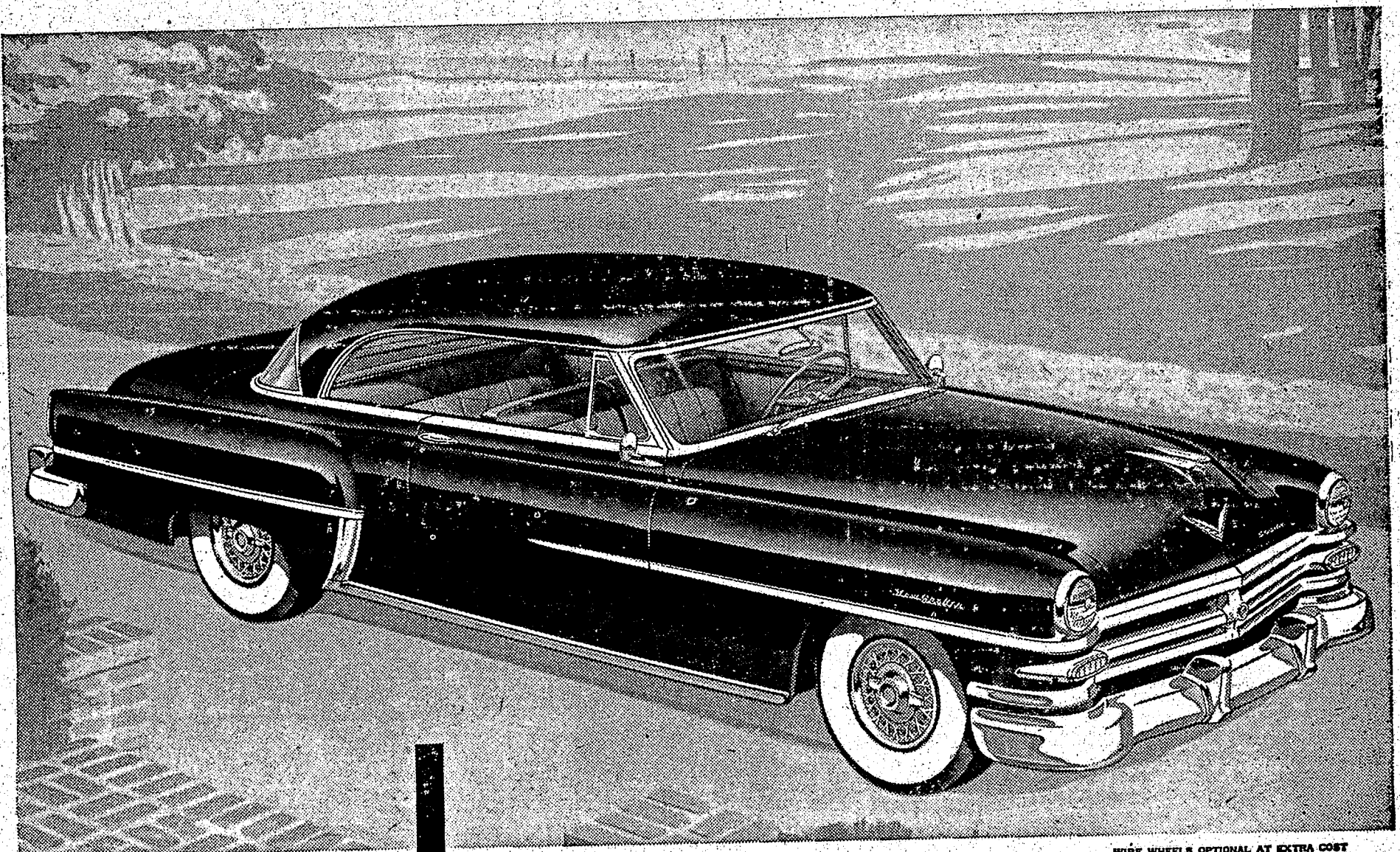

THE REPUBLICAN PARTY presents to the American people as its standard bearer two outstanding leaders of proven ability and accomplishment. In Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Senator Richard M. Nixon.

Without a Republican Congress, however, to support the policies of these leaders, all of their efforts in behalf of the nation would be in vain.

Let there be no repetition of the unfortunate years of the 72nd Congress, 1931-32, when every effort of President Hoover to serve the American people was thwarted and blocked by a Democratic Congress.

AT SAN FRANCISCO on Sept. 9, Gov. Stevenson, Democratic candidate for the Presidency, is reported to have said: "America is threatened as never before."  
Gov. Stevenson also admits that there is a "mess in Washington." No thoughtful American will dispute it, and the responsibility rests entirely on the shoulders of the Democratic Administration.

The threat to America springs largely from a completely mistaken foreign policy and an unscrupulous, spendthrift domestic policy.

Without recognition of Communist Russia in 1933, without the reasonable and sane policy of the Yalta which delivered China to the Russians, without the shameful surrender at Potsdam placing Berlin at the mercy of the Communists, and without the wasteful public spending at home, we would not be suffering from our present troubles.

WHY ELSE ARE WE spending over \$130 billion in two years to re-arm ourselves and our allies? What other reasons are there for depleting our national resources to aid Europe? Why else do we pay taxes beyond all reason? Why else does inflation threaten us with national bankruptcy and ruin? Why else do we have a casualty list in Korea of 120,000?

We are told by Fair Deal spokesmen that we have "never had it so good." What a price to pay for "having it so good?" For wartime prosperity we must sacrifice 100,000 young American boys every week for over 120 weeks.

The awful spectre of war for "having it so good" affects every American family and hangs like a dreaded nightmare over the future of every schoolboy young man in America.

THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR recently has shown that wage-earners in the United States are buying 10 per cent less in goods and services with their money than they did with lower pay in 1932. Does the wage-earner believe that he has "never had it so good?"

The average family income two years ago, after payment of taxes, was \$4,300—a near high national average. Secretary of Labor Maurice Tobin declares. The average family expenditure at the same time amounted to \$4,700.

People were compelled to draw on their savings, increase their debts, or rely on government assistance to cover their expenses, so states Mr. Tobin, Secretary of Labor.

There are 25 townships, 14 cities, 10 villages and 100,000 people in Oakland County. Who among us has not heard of the income tax scandals, post-office jobs for sale, sour loans by the R.P.C., milk coats, deep freezes, influence peddling in the White House, fires and fire-protection in every hotel lobby, stealing of ballot boxes to hide fraud and crime, and now the Caudle episode in the Department of Justice?

The present Attorney General of the United States, heralded as the Administration's clean-up man, sought to persuade members of Congress that the notorious Amerasia Case, which I personally exposed, was a mere incident. Yet that case involved State Department officials in the wartime theft of documents vital to our national security.

THE "MESS IN WASHINGTON" which Stevenson admits exists will not be cleaned up until the people remove the forces in control and elect a Republican Administration supported by a Republican Congress.

The first step in putting a firm foundation under American economy is to stop ever-increasing Federal expenditures. The second step is to substitute expansion of private business for government-financed business. In this way only can we bring about a sound and expanding prosperity.

The Hoover Commission recommendations for economy in government have had and will have my complete support. All legislation will continue to be considered by me on its merits in order to bring justice and equity to all our people.

## Law's Reply

OAKLAND COUNTY voters are indebted to Mr. Dondero for having simplified the issue in the contest between us by taking his stand squarely with the policies of Herbert Hoover in the horrible years 1931 and 1932, when unemployed workers in Michigan were shot while seeking work.

That was the time when, according to Mr. Hoover at page 105 of his recently published memoirs, "many persons left their jobs for the more profitable one of selling apples."

IN VIEW OF MR. DONDERO'S having voted against every bill and appropriation essential in Gen. Eisenhower's plan to face the vague perils of the General may be charitably dismissed as campaign wild.

Reading Mr. Dondero's record, one would not know that Stalin, the Politburo, Chiang Kai Shek and the Kuomintang had had anything to do with Communist advances in Asia. Mr. Dondero blames the blood of our dead and wounded in Korea on none of these, but on F.D.R. and Harry Truman verbally. Mr. Dondero has aided it (1) internally by fighting everything in the past 20 years intended to remove the social injurious and economic insecurity on which Communism feeds and breeds, and (2) externally by opposing all measures that have stopped the growth and spread of Communism in Europe and Asia.

THE ISSUE BETWEEN Mr. Dondero and myself, as I see it, is between a persistent attempt to retreat to the Harding-Coolidge "normalcy" of yesterday and a determination to make the most of the Atomic Age of today and tomorrow.

The issue strikes into the lives and hopes of every family in Oakland County in the U.S.A. and in the world. It is the choice between suicidal isolationism and co-operation with other nations outside the Iron Curtain.

What Mr. Dondero has denied by his votes in Congress year after year is that international co-operation to secure peace must be in two reciprocal parts, military and economic. This path offers the best possibility of winning the peace without the devastation of our industrial centers in the atom and hydrogen bombings of a Third World War.

BOTH THE NEGATIVES of military defense and the positive of economic health and strength must be enough said in time.

Military defense must be strong enough to halt aggressions already launched and to prevent new aggression.

Economic health must be sufficient to immunize peoples against Communist infiltration and subversion by improving their standards of living and the worth, dignity, and security of the individual human being.

Mr. Dondero's whole record in Congress since 1933 shows that he has always been and probably always will be too late with too little.

Down through the years he has fought with his votes against every step in international co-operation.

ON JUNE 25, 1952, only 13 days before Gen. Eisenhower's signing of the Mutual Aid Act, Mr. Dondero voted for the Crawford amendment slanting funds for military assistance to Western European nations which Eisenhower had requested.

Had Mr. Dondero and his kind prevailed, we would long ago have been pitched back into a depression like 1929-32.

NO ONE CAN ACCUSE Mr. Dondero of not working hard at his job. In the 74th (Hoover) Congress dominated by the coalition of reactionary Southern Democrats and Republicans, he was present and voting on nearly every important issue. He voted twice to cut Mutual Security funds in 1951 and again in 1952. In 1952 he voted to cut military aid and Point 4 aid.

In line with the AMA demand he voted against an increase in Old Age and Survivors Insurance payments to the aged, reversing this vote only when the bill was changed to meet the AMA demands.

He voted against adequate public housing.

He voted for the price, wage, and profit formula in the price control section of the Defense Production Act.

HE VOTED TO KILL the Wage Stabilization Board and substitute an unworkable Board without power to adjust wages on an equitable basis. He voted for a request that President Truman issue a Taft-Hartley injunction on the steel workers who had already withheld strike for more than the 80 days provided for in the law.

He voted to turn the \$50 billion in oilfields oil resources over to California, Texas and Louisiana.

He voted against adequate funds to dam the flood of illegal Mexican labor, estimated at more than 700,000. He voted to overrule President Truman's veto of the arbitrary and un-American Walter-McCarthy Immigration bill that discriminates against people of Eastern and Southern Europe.

I AM OPPOSED to Mr. Dondero's position on every one of the issues involved in the above votes. I believe that many of the 25,000 Republicans who voted against him in the 1952 primaries are likewise opposed.

THE PEOPLE of Oakland County and their children are going to have to live with the future. ## Oakland Changing Its Party Lines

BY HAROLD KYLER

THE GOVERNMENT surveyor who in pre-Civil War days wrote an official report that Oakland County was NOT worth giving away might be slightly surprised to see what's happened to those swamps and forests.

There are 25 townships, 14 cities, 10 villages and 100,000 people in Oakland County. They pay taxes on property assessed at \$774,315,000 and show little disposition toward giving any of it away.

There are office hungry Democrats lurking about with high hopes of capturing even more than the few jobs to come their way since 1912 when a Democrat named many by winning out as sheriff. Today's Republicans have waked up to the fact that no longer can they rely upon Oakland Countians to vote like their papies did.

ONCE A great wheat producing area, Oakland still boasts some 4,000 prosperous farms whose fine dairies and modern agricultural methods are a far cry from the old days of the rice logs.

Industry extends the sharp contrast between past and present, with mass production automobile plants, replacing the factories where Oakland's ash, oak and hickory were converted to horse-drawn wagons and carriage.

It is hard now as a congressional district, an offshoot of the old 17th, Gov. Williams signed the law making Oakland the 18th on May 25, 1951.

IN THE LAST election for governor, 56,885 Republicans voted and 47,569 Democrats.

Since Pontiac, population 70,881, and Royal Oak, population 20,966, home mostly Democrats, and these areas are growing, the Democrats are more confident.

GENERALLY, Republicans counter with the argument that as many Republicans as Democrats find Oakland County an attractive place. They expect no drastic change in the conservative attitudes of the district.

They concede Pontiac and Royal Oak Township to the Democrats, but nothing else.

Politicians miss one worry in Oakland. There are no sharp divisions over minority groups. There are no concentrations of large racial groups. In the last election, the Socialist-Labor candidate polled 68 votes, the Socialist-Worker candidate received 32.

But the prohibition candidate took 418 votes.

### The Grist Mill

**HAVE YOUR SOIL TESTED**  
It's a good idea to have your soil tested in the fall so you will have plenty of time to order your fertilizer, thus you will be sure to have it when you need it.

The amounts of phosphorus, pot-

assium and acidity in the soil affect the crops you grow, and only a soil test will give the correct answers on what to do.  
It is important that you follow the correct procedure for a soil test. Here are some suggestions:  
**For Your Garden:**  
Dig seven-inch-deep holes in about 8 locations in the garden, remove a thin slice of soil from one side of each hole. Dry the soil at room temperatures, crush the

soil and mix thoroughly. From the mixture take about a half-pint of soil for the sample. Pack the soil in a paper sack and then in a box or can. Label it with your name and address and mark it "Vegetable Garden", or "Flower Garden", whichever the case may be.  
**For Field Crops:**  
Follow the procedure above, mixing the samples taken from each field. Label the container with Field No., and crop grown on the field. Be sure to keep a map of your fields at home with the corresponding number on it, so you will have the proper recommendations for the field. Don't take your samples from tops of knobs or from low spots where the average condition does not prevail.  
Samples can be mailed or brought to our soil testing laboratory at the Oakland County Extension Office, 1260 West Boulevard, Pontiac. In a separate envelope, gardeners and farmers should send a check or money order for the correct amount. The cost is 35 cents for each sample.
