## CLARKSTON VARSITY BASKETBALL NEWS

The Clarkston Varsity Basketball team has begun its 1952-53 season with three impressive but very close victories. Under our new head coach, Dom Mauti and his assistant, Ed Hintz, the squad journeyed to Oxford for a thriller. Oxford, with a tall smooth-playing team jumped to an early lead but Clarkston fought back to a 10-all tie at the quarter. We started fast in the second quarter and managed a 32-23 lead at the half and a 45-38 cushion at the three-quarter mark. However Oxford started to roll during the fourth quarter and the combination of deadly accuracy at the free throwline and some questionable officiating by the referees brought the count to 58-57 as the game ended. Tom Bullen was high for Clarkston with 20 points with Chuck Roberts close behind with 15. Oxford's Hamilton, however, took scoring honors for the night with 22 tallies.

Our next basketball game found us playing at Waterford's new gymnasium and again we emerged victorious 50 to 40. Starting with a rush we were able to establish a 16 to 4 lead at the quarter and Coach Mauti kept shifting his lineup after that to keep the game from becoming a rout. Waterford did manage a late rally in the fourth quarter and came within six points of us, but Mauti threw in his starters and was able to win going away. Tom Bullen for Clarkston and Dick Tims of Waterford tied for high point honors with 12 points each (with 10 of Tim's points coming in the last half).

Our third outing finds us at Holly where our team fights its way to a 64-62 decision over a red-hot Holly team that wouldn't quit. Clarkston took a 21 to 18 first quarter lead that was quickly erased as Holly caught fire and pushed to a 32-25 lead midway through the second quarter. Clarkston came pouring back in for 14 points without a return to take a 39 to 32 half time lead.

The third quarter found Holly outscoring us 15 to 8 and taking a 49-47 lead. Clarkston fought back during the fourth quarter and the last minute of play found the score tied at 60 to 60 and at 62 to 62 before Ron Schebor dumped in a short dog shot in the last 7 seconds for the victory. Clarkston scoring was well distributed with all players figuring in the scoring. Tom Bullen was high with 24 for Clarkston while the opposing center, Gmelch gathered 18 for Holly. Next game is at Clarenceville, December 19.

The Junior Varsity so far this year has compiled a record of three victories in three games. Our first game was at Oxford on December 2nd and we emerged victorious 51 to 24. Eddie Dubats was captain for this game and Cascedan was high point man with 11 points. Our team proved to be much more experienced than Oxford which explains the lopsided score.

In our second game we traveled to Waterford and again came out in front 39 to 25. The first half was fairly close due to our inability to sink our free throws but we pulled away in a strong third quarter and coasted to victory. Bob Yahne was our captain for this game and also our high point man with 12.

Simple-treatment curbs
fence pole decay

Weather and insects can cause serious
damage to the fence poles on your farm, espe-
cially if you use poles from your woodlot. These
poles often are full of sapwood, which decays
rapidly. According to the Forestry Department
of Michigan State College, farmers can treat
poles against decay, using a chemical you can
buy in most hardware or drug stores. Several
preservative products are available. One of the
newest tested and found satisfactory is "Penta"
(Pentachlorophenol), the researchers say. If
possible, the poles to be treated should be air
seasoned first for six months. For more infor-
mation call your County Agricultural Agent.

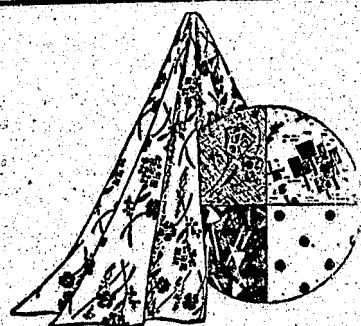

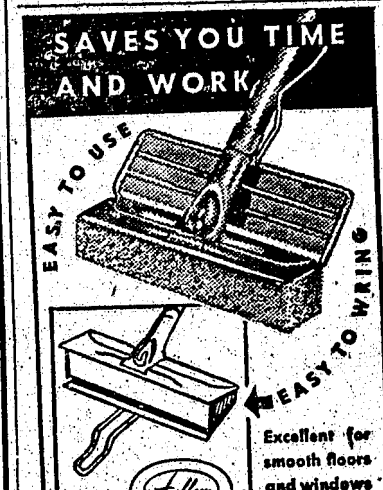

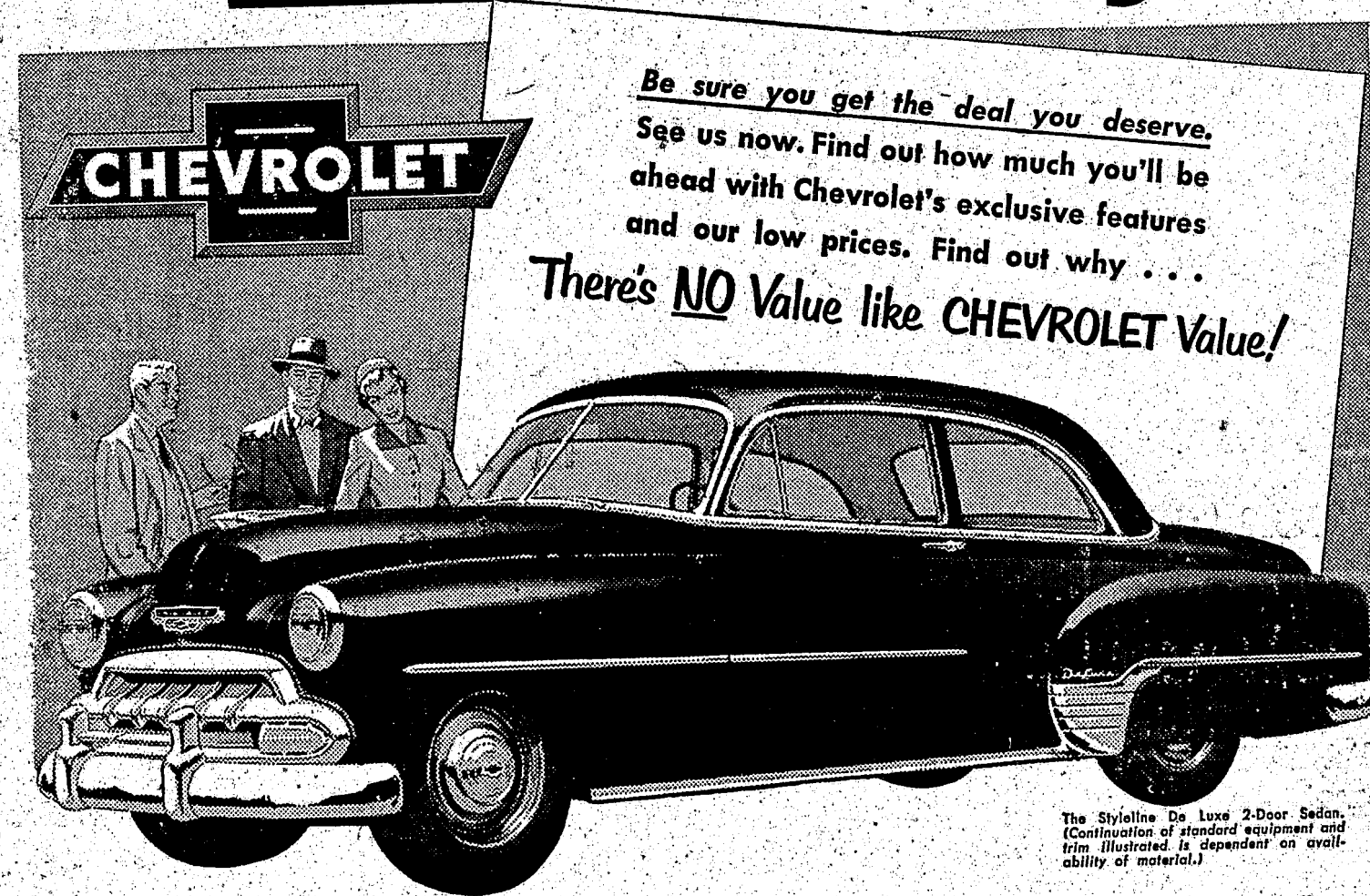
