### Caution Urged For Holiday Drivers

Accident rates go up when the sun goes down, cautions a University of Michigan traffic authority. This is doubly true of the Christmas holidays when more persons than ever are driving at night and the weather is most apt to be bad, says Prof. John C. Kohl, director of the U-M Traffic Institute.

Here's what he advises for safety:

Take your time. Christmas is sure to come, but, if you're careless, it may never come for you.

Dim your lights when approaching or passing other cars.

Don't walk along highways at night. Dark clothes and general darkness form an accident-producing combination. If you must, carry a light and be sure to walk against traffic.

Don't drink if you're going to drive.

Remember it takes longer to stop on ice and snow and that skidding off the road or into another vehicle under such conditions is amazingly easy.

### FRUIT AND GARDEN NOTES

**HIGH BRUSH AND INTERSECTIONS DON'T MIX**  
No tree or shrub blocking an intersection or drive-way view is worth a smashed fender or a child's life. Blind views should be eliminated and only low-growing varieties of shrubs used along roadways.

More than one-third of all farm mishaps involve motor vehicles. Blind driving, because of trees, shrubs, brush and other growth hiding road crossing approaches and drives, is a big factor in this total. Suburb dwellers and city drivers out for a ride are in danger, also.

Joseph T. Cox, Michigan State College landscape specialist, and David G. Steinicke, MSC safety specialist, agree it is a mistake to plant small evergreens — which grow big — to mark drive entrances, or hedges — which get bushy — too near the entry. Coniferous ornamental shrubbery closer to the house, they say, and stick to low-growing plantings along roads.

Low-growing varieties that can be used include Andorra juniper (Juniperus horizontalis plumosa), bitterweet (Celastrus scandens), Hall's Japanese honeysuckle (Lonicera japonica halliana), and fragrant sumac (Rhus aromatica).

Hedges kept trimmed low enough so they do not hide cars or children are a possibility along roadways.

### College Cost In 1906-10

This week The News reprints an article that appeared in the College Alumni News. This article was headed "Those Were the Days ..." and was an account kept by Felix Garter when he attended Colgate in 1906-10. The article reads — "When I came to Colgate in 1906, Felix Garter '10, made up his mind to keep a scrupulous accounting of what it cost him to go to college. Unlike most of us, he did what he set out to do.

Today these accounts make amazing reading to anyone who has recently paid college expenses, either for himself or for a son or daughter, or intends to. A look at Felix's totals alone shows that all of his expenses his junior (and most costly) year come to less than two-thirds of today's tuition cost. During his freshman year, he spent only one-third of such an amount.

### MR. COLEGATE 1910

Born on a farm at Clarkston, Michigan, Felix taught school for a while after graduating from Colgate, but then took a CPA degree and carried on a successful career in the field of accounting until he died December 30, 1951. It is for his interest in his class that he is best remembered today, however, and for it he was given the title of Mr. Colegate 1910 by his classmates. Among other things he wrote a history of the class' 40th reunion that will be long remembered.

Today the expense account is hard to believe, but it is a true one. Felix came to Colgate on a President's Scholarship and earned spending money by working at the Hamilton National Bank. His total expenses for his freshman year, 1906-07, were \$283.80; sophomore, 107-07, \$416.73 and junior, 1908-09, \$479.35. These totals included even such small items as peanuts, 5 cents and fish hooks, 5 cents.

It would be interesting to most of The News readers if the account could be itemized. The listings show that human nature hasn't changed much in 42 years but costs have.

Along with this item from the college paper sent to The News by Thomas F. Boothby, was a short item in which Mr. Boothby listed a few of the costs when he attended the same college. He says "My freshman year, 1911-12, board was \$3.50 per week and I earned my room rent by doing work around the house where I stayed. Many of the students lived on an allowance of \$1.00 per day from home, and lived very well." In comparison with the cost of college education today it is almost unbelievable.

**INCOME TAX REPORTS**  
Horrors of January! The Oakland County Extension Office is well supplied with Income Tax Instructions Bulletins put out by the Michigan State College Agricultural Economics Department. These bulletins are available free to farmers who desire them. We will mail these bulletins to anyone who wants to drop a card to the Oakland County Extension Service, 1260 West Blvd., Pontiac.

**CONTAINS TIMELY INFORMATION**  
Information in the bulletin gives farmers a lot of clues as to proper procedures in making out Form 1040F and 1040A. All necessary tables and charts are included. Of special interest in the bulletin is the use of Schedule D (another income tax form) which is thoroughly explained.

### ACCOUNT BOOK MATCHES FORM

The new Farmers Account Book, published by Michigan State College, uses Expense and Receipt headings as found on Form 1040F. To save a lot of trouble next year, now is the time to obtain one of these Account Books. Your local bank may have a supply — if not, we would be able to furnish one to you at a very nominal cost from the Oakland County Extension Office.

### LEGION AUXILIARIES PLAY SANTA TO HOSPITALIZED VETS

More than 30,000 members of the Michigan American Legion Auxiliary this year brought a Christmas shopping service to 8,500 hospitalized veterans who were unable to go to stores to do their gift hunting for relations and friends back home.

Repeating a service started six years ago, the auxiliary members set up a shopping center in each of four veterans' Administration hospitals located at Dearborn, Saginaw, Fort Custer, and Iron Mountain, Michigan.

The unique difference between these shopping centers and other stores where Christmas gifts are selected is that veterans don't pay for the gifts they select for members of their families. What they choose is the gift of the auxiliaries. Each veteran is entitled to select three gifts, with a value of \$1.50 to \$3.00 each. After the selections are made, volunteer auxiliary members assigned to each hospital wrap them as gifts and then prepare each package for parcel post. Hospital orderlies and nurses bring veterans bound to wheel chairs and stretchers to the shopping centers.

Under the direction of Mrs. Delmar Landon, department rehabilitation chairman, 3993 Bedford, Detroit, and state auxiliary president, Mrs. Jack Collins, Negeauene, the shopping centers this year received gifts from 450 auxiliary units throughout the state which has exceeded a total cost of \$24,000. Many units began their shopping as early as September to insure delivery of gifts for the December 1 opening of the centers.

**Red Cross News**  
**FOURTH BLOOD NEED**  
Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, is standing by today for assignment of its share of the 2,000,000 pints of blood needed to fight polio in 1953. Dr. Robert W. Kelso of Pleasant Ridge, chapter chairman, announced the local Red Cross unit will make every effort to furnish its share of the quota assigned to the national organization.

Blood will be converted into gamma globulin, a blood derivative, which prevents or retards paralysis from polio. Two cc's of gamma globulin can be taken to protect one child from one to five weeks.

Thus the Red Cross blood program took on its fourth responsibility. The National blood program, only 8 years old, was started after World War II, when doctors used blood and plasma widely to save the lives of men wounded on the battlefield.

Since then, the Red Cross has taken on three other responsibilities: collecting blood for civilian hospital patients, for civil defense, and now for fighting polio.

"We can't do this by ourselves", Dr. Kelso said. "Gamma globulin is found only in blood." "Only you can give that blood."

Value of the gamma globulin in preventing and lightening paralysis from polio was verified this summer; when researchers working under auspices of National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and various research centers worked with thousands of youngsters in Texas and Utah who had been exposed to polio.

Blood raised to fight polio will be turned over to the U. S. Defense Department, which will separate the gamma globulin and (continued on page 12)

### DECEMBER STARS, MOON TO BRIGHTEN CHRISTMAS SCENE

The heavens' glittering array of December stars will be spotlighted this month by the Christmas Eve appearance of the Northern Cross high in the western sky.

Another shining Christmas constellation will be the Giant Hunter, which, according to Hazel M. Losh, University of Michigan associate professor of astronomy, is hard to excel in splendor and beauty.

Close on the heels of Orion, the Hunter, is his dog Canis Major, considered from earliest times one of the dogs he took with him hunting. She points out that on maps the dog is generally pictured as standing on his hind feet watching or springing after Orion's feet.

Two of the sky's brightest planets also will shine during the Christmas season. Venus will be seen in the southwest after sunset and will grow steadily brighter throughout the month. It is a common belief, the astronomist states, that Venus was the original Christmas star. Jupiter will also be seen high in the sky every night.

December will also have a double share of moonlight. In addition to the December 1 full moon, there will be another around midnight, December 30. The interval between full moons is 29 1/2 days so it is easily possible to have two like phases in the same calendar month.

According to Professor Losh, winter had its official beginning at 4:44 p. m., December 21, when the sun entered its winter solstice.


#### SUGGESTIONS FOR CHRISTMAS TELEPHONING



HOW TO DECORATE YOUR HOLIDAY TABLE

Christmas table decorations should be attuned to your table, stresses Elinor Roth of the textiles, clothing and related arts department of Michigan State College. If your table is long, try to have an elongated decoration or else several units down the center. If the table is small, be careful not to have too large a decorative piece. And remember to keep the decorations low enough so people can see over them, she said.

A traditional decoration is evergreen boughs placed dramatically on the table. Miss Roth suggests grouping pine cones on the evergreen and peaking the color scheme up with small red bows placed around on the boughs. She adds a grouping of red candles of varying heights to finish the decoration. Depending on the size of your table, you may want three or four candles, but add interest by having them in graduated lengths.

Miss Roth also suggests using varying lengths of the fat, low candles available now. Use your own table color schemes for a different centerpiece, she suggests. The fat candles, placed among the evergreen branches, will be a low, attractive decoration for a small table, she suggests.

Use some ingenuity and things you can find in your cupboard. Miss Roth concocts a Christmas table piece with salad bowls placed end on end and filled with glittering Christmas balls.

If you have a piece of driftwood, try arranging small Christmas balls around that, and make a background of red candles. You will have an unusual and lovely table, she says.



Now that the rush of the Christmas season is upon us, there are a lot of things crowding into our thoughts. Including such things as gifts and wrappings and goodies to make, and the tree.

Particularly the tree and decorations; that's where one of our chief enemies, fire, can begin its destructive job. We should remind ourselves that Christmas trees and decorations are very inflammable... that this condition is heightened by the drying heat of the furnace or fireplace, which removes humidity from the air. A fir tree, full of resin and pitch, is one of the most combustible objects known. Once ignited, it burns so quickly that it's almost impossible to put the fire out.

The National Board of Underwriters suggests a number of safety rules to observe in order that fires may be prevented:

- 1—Choose a small tree, for it's less of a fire hazard.
- 2—Keep it away from radiators, heaters, fireplaces, open doors or stairways.
- 3—Use flame proof ornaments of glass or metal.
- 4—Decorate the tree with electric lights, with wires in good condition. New lighting sets should have an Underwriters label.
- 5—Put your lighting switch at some distance from the tree. That's safer than crawling under the tree to plug the cord in or out.
- 6—Do not leave tree lights burning when nobody's home.

Yeast rolls with a holiday air contain the season's cranberry filling. Spread the filling on a rectangle of dough (which has risen once) and roll up jelly roll fashion. Cut into individual rolls, let rise until double, and bake. To make the Cranberry Filling, cook 2 cups of cranberries in ½ cup water until skins burst. Mix 1 cup sugar, ¼ cup enriched flour and ½ teaspoon salt. Add to cranberries and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and cool before using. This filling recipe makes about 1½ cups — enough for 2 dozen 3-inch rolls. Serve Cranberry Rolls as a dinner accompaniment or as a breakfast bread.
