#### Fight Polio; Give To Rotarians Meet **March Of Dimes**

The 1953 March of Dimes was launched in Clarkston by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis today as volunteer workers prepared to wipe out the debty incurred by last year's record polio epidemic and to guard Rotarians were present from Ponagainst the expected financial demands of the coming months.

With more persons stricken with infantile paralysis in 1952 than ever before, and with the prospect of a staggering patient care bill, the 3,100 county chapters of the March of Dimes organization were preparing today to match the record polio onslaught with a record 1953 March of Dimes.

In 1952, Mrs. N.-E. Maytag, campaign director said today, the National Foundation had:

1. Supplied more iron lungs and other lifesaving equipment than in the previous three years combined. 2. Met the costs of transporta-

tion, salaries and maintenance for hundreds of recruited polio nurses Spent \$28,000,000 for patient care, a figure over \$5,000,000 more than was ever expended for this

purpose in any one year. 4. Allocated vast sums to scientific research.

5. Awarded more than 200 scholarships and fellowships in its professional education program.

Dimes, like the drive in every other county, must enlist more campaign workers to collect more in contributions than ever before in March of Dimes history.

"In addition to assisting four out of five of the record number of polio patients reported in 1952, we continued to aid 46,000 patients stricken in previous years," the campaign director added. "And all of this at a time when science is poised on the threshold of speechmaking discoveries in the field of the prevention of paralytic polic.

The campaign director said the National Foundation had allocated huge sums in March of Dimes funds to finance field trials in three epidemic areas to test the effectiveness of gamma globulin as a possible preventive of paralytic

"Our hopes were realized and this blood fraction was shown to give marked protection in temporarily immunizing humans against paralysis, even though the real job - the development of a vaccine - still remains.

"It is imperative therefore that the 1953 March of Dimes exceed all past records. For we must press our gains in research while at the same time coping with the surging pattern of polio - a previously experienced."

The campaign will continue through January 31.

PEACE - If each of us has made an outspoken or silent wish for the new year, it probably spelled peace. After two wars and uneasy years since, with the Korean struggle going on with no clear end in sight, with alarming news of threatening uprisings, revolutions, crises, tensions then here, then there, we begin to look for peace as the most universally wished for blessing.

What should make us pause and eflect is that each side of the controversy (a nice, polite work for the war-like struggle which now goes on and cost lives on both sides, tremendous expense for both parties and untold hardships for "innocent bystanders") proclaims to want peace - each on his own

I don't think we have the right to point the finger at Russia and ocuse it of wanting war because it will not agree to our terms; we render what to us is an important different and opposed to each other; the ideals for which each is willing to give his citizens' lives are so far apart that understanding of each other's aims is hardly

possible. To the communist ideology the state is supreme, the spread of its theory as desirable as the teaching of a religion is to a missionary insistence that all their prisoners of war be returned to their homeland. To the western, capitalistic officers. ideology the individual has pref. erence with his rights; the "free enterprise" economical system is By The Way . . . desirable, and a narrowing of the sphere where this system has free play means a threat to our securwar should be free to choose where they will go after release.

and dictated to. An uneasy peace? Yes, but better than war-and maybe possible of attainment. Complete or absolute peace is not of this world. What we can wish for is a relative peace; what we can hope for is a temporary peace; what we can work for is understanding of ourselves, our and others' problems in our society, in our lands, all through the world, and maybe achieve a measure of agreement: not war, but peace.







Dairy farmers with a hard water problem need not worry about its effect on milk production. Cows need plenty of water—their least expensive feed—for milk production, whether its soft or hard.

Scientists at Vinginia Polytechnic Institute conducted tests on water, and Extension dairymen at Michigan State College agree with the results. They picked 12 cows as near alike as possible in age, size, milk production and calving month. All received the same feed ration. Six spent 56 days on soft water, while other six had hard well water. Then the two groups had their hard and soft water switched for another 56 days. The VPI scientists reported that cows drank the same amount of water, ate the same amounts, made equal body gains and produced about the same amounts of milk, whether on hard or soft water.





#### LAN HOME GARDEN NOW

Onganisms that cause fruit and vegetable disease and take away gardening pleasure from some 15 to 20 million home gardeners can be kept in check, notes Edward A. Andrews, Michigan State College extension specialist in plant pathology. Don't plant fruit after fruit and vegetables after vegetables, if possible, but alternate them. Tomatoes, potatoes, pepper plants and eggplants should never follow each other in rotation and, because of verticillium wilt danger, raspberries should never follow any of them.
