USE MORE MILK

No mother will deny wanting to protect her family's health. Wanting to help them build and repair bones and teeth, help regulate nerve and muscular action. But do you know the importance of calcium? And the sources of it?

This pointed question comes from Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, county home demonstration agent. Unless you keep constant vigilance over the family's diet, you may be neglecting the all-important mineral—calcium.

It is very difficult to obtain enough calcium without the use of milk or cheese, stresses Mrs. Lawyer. For adults that means 3 cups of milk a day or 2 cups of milk and 1 1/4 ounces of cheese daily. For children the minimum calcium requirement could be had in 3 to 6 cups of milk per day. But both adults and children must supplement the calcium from milk with a serving of green, leafy vegetables 3 or 4 times a week.

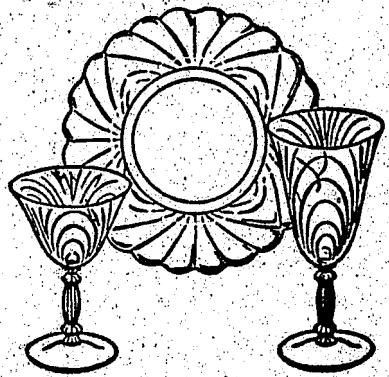

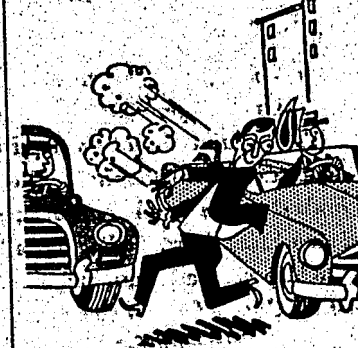

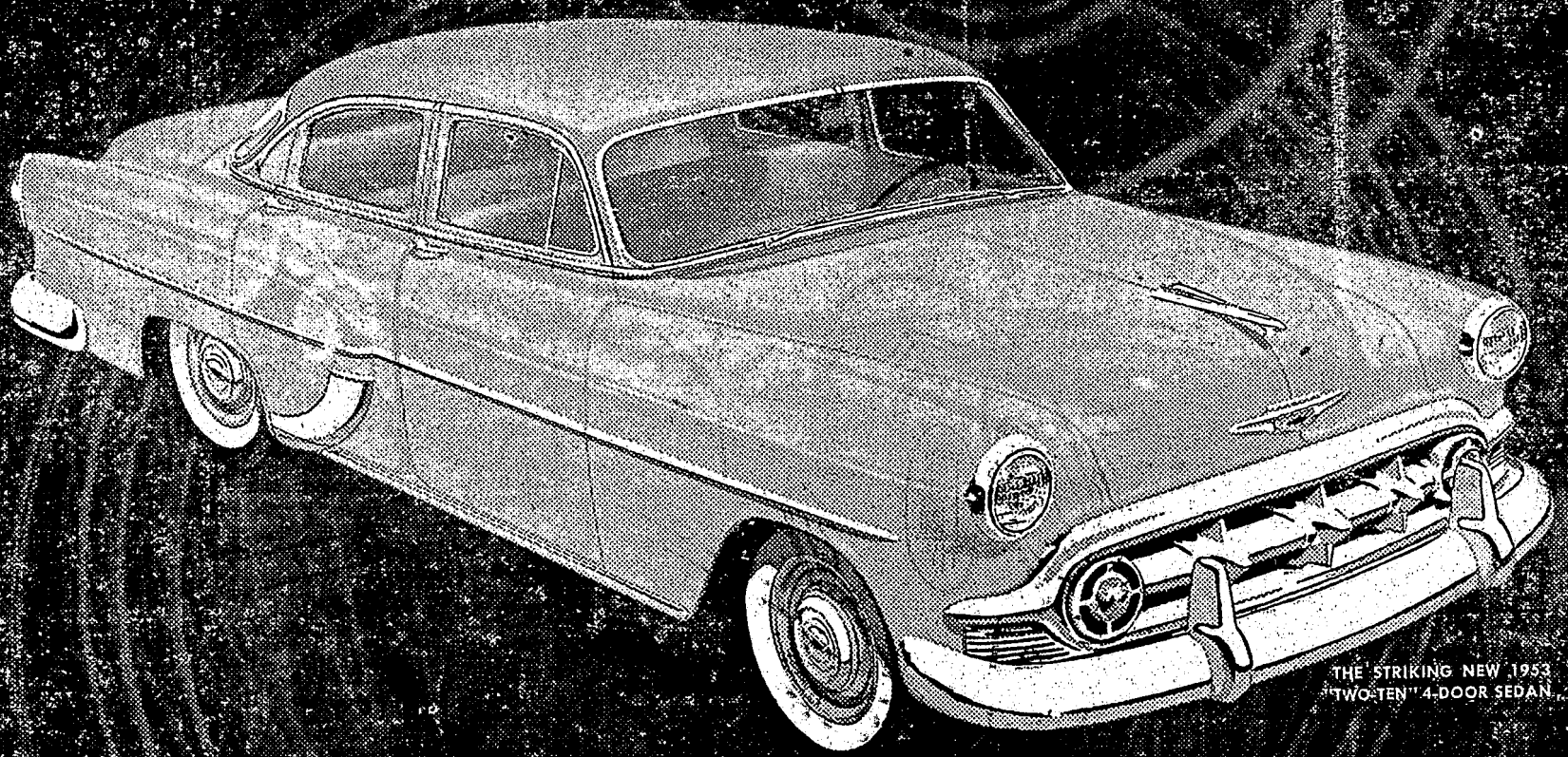

Dark winter woollens are certainly problematical when it comes to keeping them lint-free. I suppose there's no sure way to keep them spic and span, but brushing them with a slightly dampened whisk broom will help.

Most men would cheerfully settle for French fries every night, but the rest of the family generally likes a bit of variety in potatoes. Here are spuds that are different and delicious: Cook potatoes in jackets until done. Peel. Roll in melted vitaminized margarine, then in grated cheese. Broil until nicely toasted.

If it's an off-season for salad greens, occasionally serve a relish tray of celery stuffed with a mixture of blue cheese and real mayonnaise. Also radish roses, carrot sticks, ripe and green olives, scalions or white onion rings.

To remove all of ground meat from the food chopper, finish off with a small quantity of stale bread. Crumbs will carry the remaining meat through and at the same time add a bit of volume.

Use a mild bleach from time to time to keep your white nylon snow fresh. And remember to launder only the white things together for nylon has an affinity for other colors.

Not enough individual salad molds to accommodate your guest list? Use tea-cups instead, filling half full.
