Health Survey At County Schools

A countywide survey to determine the immunization status of school children-grades kindergarien through fifth, is being conducted by the Oakland County Health Department according to John D. Monore, M. D., Director of the Oakland County Department of Health. Cooperating with this survey are the various school systems and parent groups.

A letter will be sent home on November 16, with each child, kindergarten through fifth grade. to the parent, requesting the date the child received his last immunization. The survey letter should be returned to the school no later than November 20, with the information completed. Volunteers will tabulate this information so that the percenttage of children. immunized can be determined phroughout the school. In order for a community to be adequately protected, at least 60% of the child population should be immunized. This 60% evenly distributed among various age groups, brings about effective control even though occasional cases may occur.

In 1949 we had 3 cases of diphtheria and no deaths. In 1950 we had 3 cases of diph-

theria and no deaths. In 1951 we had 19 cases of diphtheria and 4 deaths.

In 1952 we had 10 cases of diphtheria and 1 death.

The results of the findings of the survey will be publicized and parents of children who are not adequately immunized will be urged to compete their children's immunization needs.
