Long and lithe, with sharp features, the animal sports a rich dark brown fur, found most pleasing in coats for the feminine gender. With mating season in February or March, mink usually are born in litters of from three to eight. Born blind, they don't leave their dens for from six to eight weeks, Dr. Lagler explains.
