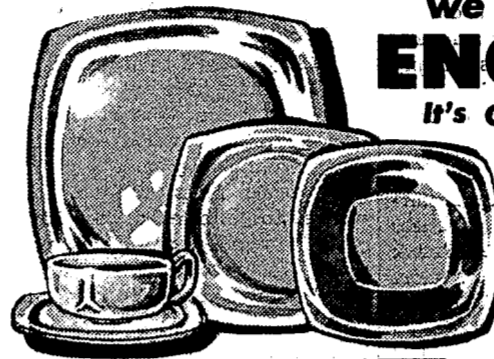

NEW RATES FOR SOCIAL SECURITY

The social security tax rate for persons whose work counts toward old-age and survivors insurance is scheduled to increase on the first of January, Rex A. Atwood, Manager of the Pontiac social security office, reminded employers, employees, and self-employed people today.

This scheduled increase in tax contribution is in accordance with the 1950 amendments to the social security law, and was enacted by Congress in anticipation of future

obligations of the program.

Employees in jobs covered by the law will have 2 percent instead of the present 1 1/2 percent deducted from their pay beginning with the first of January up to earnings of \$3600 a year; their employers will contribute an equal amount.

The new rate will apply to all taxable wages paid after December 31, 1953, regardless of when earned.

The social security tax for the self-employed is scheduled to increase from the present 2 1/2 percent to 3 percent, for the period commencing January 1, 1954. Since the self-employed whose work is covered by the law pay their tax just once yearly at the time of filing their Federal income tax return, they will pay the present 2 1/2 per-

cent social security tax on their 1953 income that counts toward social security. This will be due not later than March 15, 1954. Their first payments at the increased rate of 3 percent will be due March 15, 1955, for the calendar year 1954.

In the meantime the Internal Revenue Service reports that employers will be furnished late this year with income tax withholding tables and Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security

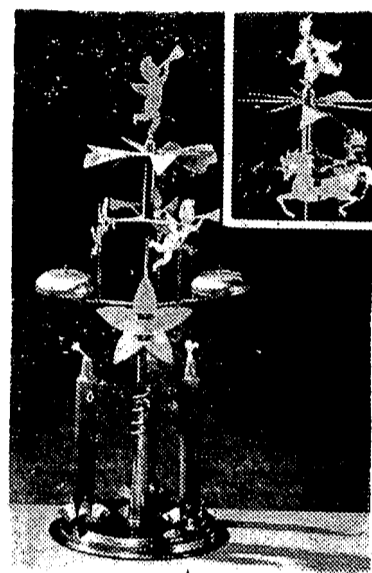
taxes) tables reflecting rates applicable next year.

The next scheduled increase, six years from now, in 1960, will be to 2 1/2 percent for employer and employee, and to 3 1/4 percent for the self-employed.

RAILROADS CARRY HEAVY CHRISTMAS MAIL
The nation's railroads beginning December 1 will carry a mail load that is expected to average nearly a quarter of a billion gift parcels

and greeting cards every day up to Christmas, according to the Michigan Railroads Association. The association estimates that during the 24-day pre-Christmas period, intercity mail—the great bulk of which is transported by

railroad—will aggregate about 6,796,000,000 pieces, filling 56,823,500 mail sacks or 3% over the 1952 holiday season. This is equivalent to delivering an average of one gift package or greeting card each day from De-


ember 1 until Christmas to every person in the United States, Canada and Mexico. To move such a tremendous volume of holiday mail, the American railroads must provide 3,760,162 square feet of mail car space, equal to 62,669 standard-size mail cars that would make up in excess of 5,200 solid mail trains of 12 cars each. To accomplish this the railroads expect to press extra cars into service. In addition, they are prepared to handle thousands of cars of express and freight loaded with Yuletide merchandise, the association said.

The first 10 months of last year saw 11 per cent in deaths, 20 per cent in injuries and 14 per cent in accidents. Mileage for the first nine months of this year, the latest estimate available, totaled 19.7 billion, up 10 per cent from 17.9 billion miles in the same period last year. The death rate of 6.9 per 100 million miles of travel was the same as for the first nine months of 1952.

HOLIDAYS INCREASE SAFETY HAZARDS

Early darkness and snow and ice and crowds of hurrying people are the safety hazards that should make us more careful rather than cutting down on our vigilance, Stielcke emphasizes.

AUTO ACCIDENTS IN STATE HEADED FOR NEW RECORD

With new highs reported for the month of October, traffic injuries and accidents in Michigan during 1953 probably will exceed all previous records. The State Police monthly statistical report shows 184 persons killed during the month, an increase of 22 per cent over 151 in October last year. The death toll was 36 higher than the October average for the years of 1946 to 1952. There were 14,938 injuries. This was a gain of 13 per cent in accidents and 19 per cent in injuries over the same month a year ago. All of the increase in fatalities occurred in rural areas. Most of it was in one-car accidents in which the vehicle either overturned or ran off the roadway. During the first 10 months of this year there were 1,536 traffic deaths, 46,869 injuries and 146,565 accidents. The increase over

ACCOUNT BOOK SAVES MONEY, FRUSTRATION

Good farm records can save you tax money. Besides, good records can eliminate the frustrating work of going through a mass of receipts in order to list your tax deductions assets. Everett M. Elwood, extension agricultural economist at Michigan State College. Elwood points out that mislaying or forgetting a receipt can be costly. If you've had a machinery repair job, for example, that cost you \$15 and you forget to enter it on the tax form, you pay about \$4 extra in taxes. That means for about every dollar you fail to enter on your tax report it costs you an extra 25 to 30 cents in taxes. Elwood urges farmers to start the new year with a Farm Account Book, available at the offices of county agricultural agents. And the agricultural agent will give pointers on using it. Another advantage of the Farm Account Book, says Elwood, is that you can know where your big costs are in addition to crop yields, livestock production and sale



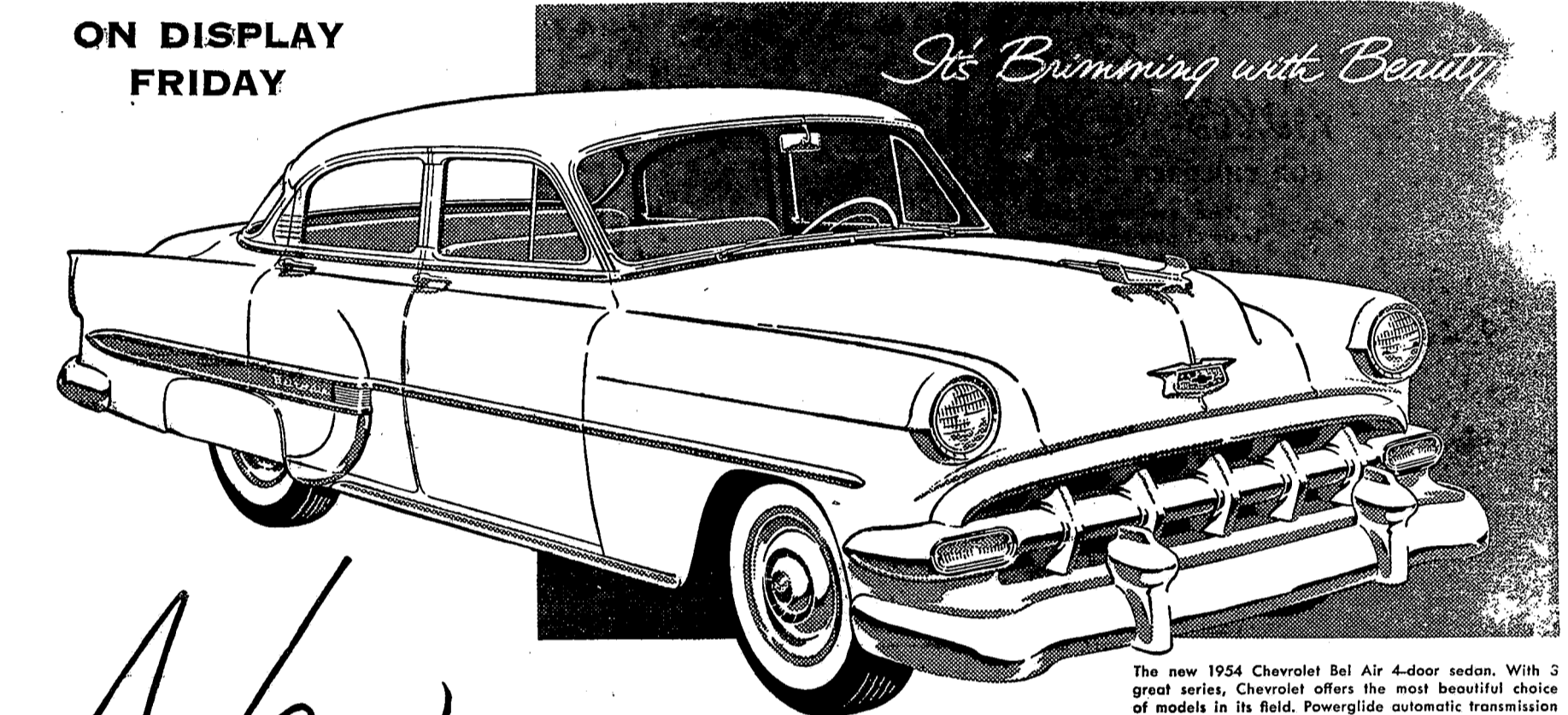

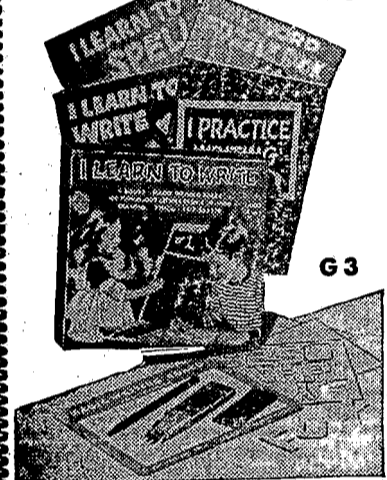
