After that date they must be paid in Pontiac at the County Treasurer's offfice with a 4% penalty and a monthly interest charge of ½ to 1%.

Dog licenses for 1954 may also be purchased at the township Treasurer's office. When applying for a dog license, it is required that evidence of the dog's rabies vaccination within the previous twelve month period be presented,

If licenses are not obtained before March 1, 1954, the fees are doubled.

Good farm records can save you ax money:

Besides, good records can eliminate the frustrating work of going through a mass of receipts in order to hist your tax deductions asserts Everett M. Elwood, extension agricultural economist at Michigan State College.

Elwood points out that mislayng or forgetting a receipt can be costly. If you've had a machinery repair job, for example, that cose you \$15 and you forget to enter it on the tax form, you pay about \$4 extra in taxes.

That means for about every dollar you fail to enter on your tax report it costs you an extra 25 to 30 cents in taxes.

Elwood urges farmers to start the new year with a Farm Account Book, available at the offices of county agricultural agents. And the agricultural agent will give pointers on using it.






