#### PROPER TREATMENT OF CHRISTMAS TREES IMPROVES SEASON

It's easy to have a green Christmas - at least where trees are concerned and provided that these forest products get proper treatment - according to two University of Michigan faculty members.

Almost any Christmas tree will stay green and fresh throughout the holiday season of the base is kept in water, servis Prof. Kenneth P. Davis, chairman of the U-M forestry department.

The best way to keep silver clean and untarnished is to use it. :

SPEEDY CLEAN JOB

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But, many homemakers still "save" it for important and festive occasions. During the holiday season, these homemakers are looking for a quick and easy methods for cleaning that tarnished silver.

The electrolytic method is generally satisfactory and speedy, says Lucile Ketchum, Extension home management specialist at Michigan State College. Miss Ketchum cautions, how-

ever, that oxidized silver (with dark decoration) or flatware with hollow handles must not method. For silver which may be safely cleaned by this method, use a large enameled kettle or bright aluminum sheet, foil, or a shallow aluminum utensil

in the bottom. Any aluminum used for this purpose will become coated with a dark deposit. A cooking utensil used for this purpose can be made bright again by cooking acid fruits, such as rhubarb, tomatoes or apples in the utensil. Or the dark deposit may be removed by boiling a weak vinegar solution

in the utensil and rubbing the surface with fine steel wool and soap. To clean the silver, fill the utensil with water enough to

each quart of boiling water ladd 1 teaspoon of salt, 1 teaspoon of baking soda and % Iteaspoon of whiting. Stir with a wooden spoon. Place the silver in the boiling solution so that each piece touches either the

aluminum or another piece of silver. Do not try to do too many pieces at one time. Boil from 30 seconds to 5 minutes depending upon the amount of tarnish. Remove the silver with tongs or two large fonks and place on soft cloth. Add a second lot of silver and repeat. With a clean soft cloth, polish the silver to the desired brilliance. Usually 12 strokes on each surface is satisfactory.

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Harrison, Michigan State College extension soil conservationist and assistant secretary of the State Soil Conservation Comm-Baraga and Gladwin county districts are too new to have annual meetings this year. Harrison explains. The districts, locally operated by the farmer members and their directors, are required by law to choose one or two directors each year to serve threeyear "staggered" terms on the five-man boards. Any district owner or operator of three or more acres can vote. Most counties have nominating committees but nominations may be made at the meetings. Some county districts make the annual soil conservation meeting a big event, with potluck lunches or banquets and speakers, contests, motion picfures and other programs.
