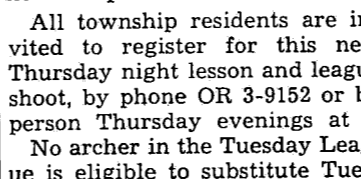
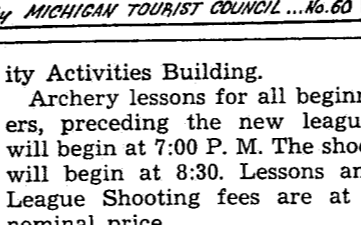
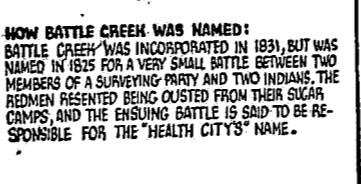
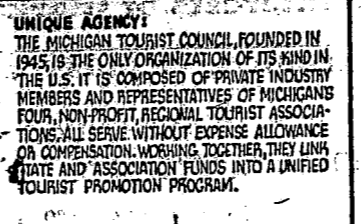

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LEGISLATION TO MODIFY PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Senator Homer Ferguson (R-Mich.) this week introduced legislation to modify the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag by adding the words "under God".

If the Ferguson proposal is adopted, the Pledge would read: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation indivisible under God, with liberty and justice for all."

Sen. Ferguson said inclusion of the words "under God" would highlight one of the real fundamental differences between the free world and the Communist world, which is a belief in God.

"Our nation was founded on a fundamental belief in God and the first and most important reason for the existence of our government is to protect the God-given rights of our citizens. Communism, on the contrary, rejects the very existence of God," the Michigan Senator said.

"Spiritual values are every bit as important to the defense and safety of our nation as military and economic values. America must be defended by spiritual values which exist in the hearts and souls of the American people," he declared.

Sen. Ferguson said adoption of the legislation would give additional meaning and action to the spiritual defense of our nation.

He pointed to the words, "In God We Trust", inscribed over the door to the Senate Chamber in Washington and said, "those words must have a real meaning in the heart of every American." His proposal is identified as Senate Joint Resolution 126 and it was referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee for consideration.

NEWS FROM MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

Care by a physician is the key to successful management of heart diseases. Don't let false fears keep you away from the doctor, the Michigan Department of Health advises. If you should have heart disease, you have a

better chance to live with it successfully today than at any other time in the history of the world.

The old-wives' tale that diagnosis of a heart ailment is a sentence of death has kept many a person away from his doctor when he should have been seeking his advice and help.

Periodic examinations by a physician are recommended by the Department for persons of all ages since heart disease in Michigan is the leading cause of death from the age of 35 on.

The majority of heart attacks aren't fatal. Persons who have one attack may live for many years without a second attack and then die of another cause entirely. The average age at death from heart disease in Michigan is 68 years which is about as long as babies born in the state today can be expected to live. Average life expectancy in Michigan is 66 years for men and 72 for women.

A great deal of progress has been made in reducing deaths from heart disease in children and young adults through the control of simple goiter, immunization against diphtheria and other communicable diseases, treatment of "strep" infections for the prevention of rheumatic fever, treatment to reduce heart deaths from syphilitic origin, and advances in surgical techniques which enable the surgeon to perform delicate operations on the heart that would not have been attempted a few years ago.

Coronary heart diseases, perhaps the most feared of heart ailments by the middle-aged and older person, are much more frequent in men than in women, and much more frequent in the executive type of person than in the laborer or farmer.

Pressures and worry apparently contribute to the development of coronary heart troubles. Learning to relax will help to prevent these conditions. It may be better for the executive who worries to take several short vacations a year rather than one long one, and a short nap after lunch might also help. Those persons who are fortunate enough to take a 15-minute nap after lunch each day seldom develop coronary heart disease.

BLUEGILLS BACKBONE OF ICE FISHING, SAYS U-M NATURALIST

Backbone of Michigan ice fishing, the common bluegill is also a delight for epicureans, according to Karl F. Lagler, chairman of the University of Michigan Department of Fisheries.

Possessing one of the most delicious flavors of Michigan inland fishes, the bluegill is at its best when taken through the ice, Dr. Lagler says. But knowledge of its distribution through winter waters is better known to the sportsman than the scientist, he adds.

He bases this on the fact that most scientific data is gathered in the day and during warm months, and "the hole in our knowledge pertains to night and off-season activities."

Scientists at the U-M and the Institute for Fisheries Research on the U-M campus have found, however, that the fish seem to be gregarious, travelling in compact and slow-moving schools.

It is not uncommon for one man to be getting big catches in his hole while his neighbor goes home empty handed. Best lures are small natural baits, such as grubs and wigglers.

Two other important fish for the winter angler are the yellow perch and black crappie, he continues. "Widespread in fame and distribution", Professor Lagler points out, "the fish are most readily taken on small minnows, the Lake Emerald shiner being the favorite."

These minnows abound in Michigan's Great Lakes waters, and are hearty in cold water,

making good winter bait, but are too tender for summer. He recommends an insulated bait container to prolong the life of live baits and prevent waste.

Smelt and sturgeon also provide game for winter anglers, but the fish are important only in restricted locales, the professor explains. Favorite habitat of sturgeon is the inland waterway, especially near Indian River, while smelt prefer the Crystal Lake area.

"Good kitchens don't just happen, they must be planned", stressed Miss Marjorie Bettsworth, Jackson home economist during Farmers' Week at Michigan State College. Here are some suggestions she gave for planning counter space: Plan for 15 inches by refrigerator (adjacent to open side of door); 36 inches to the right side of sink; 30 inches to the left side of sink bowl; 24 inches beside and within reach of the range; 36 inches for mixing and food preparation.
