LUTHERANS PARTICIPATE IN MISSIONARY GATHERING

The Christ Lutheran Church of Waterford will participate in the "Advance for Christ" Missionary ingathering being made in the Augustana Lutheran Church of North America, on April 4, 1954, Reverend Arvid E. Anderson, pastor of the congregation has announced.

The ingathering, the first of its kind in the Augustana Church, seeks a minimum of two million dollars for missionary advancement in the United States and Canada and five foreign countries including Africa, Japan, India, South America, and Formosa, together with Hong Kong. The Boards of American and Foreign Missions will share equally in this ingathering.

Arrangements for the program in Christ Lutheran Church, Waterford, are being made by the "Advance for Christ" committee consisting of: Glen Byington, parish director; Mrs. Roy Olson, secretary; Marshall Peckens, publicity chairman; Mrs. Elsie Carter, visitation chairman and Gosta Lindman, Sunday School superintendent.

More than 1,000 Augustana Churches have appointed such committees to spearhead this ingathering at the congregational level.

Central in the entire effort is missionary education which gives attention to the work of the Boards of American and Foreign Missions of the Augustana Church, and the need for more adequate resources to expand their programs.

On April 4th, 54 adults and youth will form 27 teams to contact every home of the Christ Lutheran congregation to "tell the story" of Augustana Missions and receive the 4-month pledges for new missions at home and abroad.

Reverend Constantine Trued of Detroit serves as District Director of the program in the Eastern Michigan District of the Illinois Conference of which Christ Lutheran Church, Waterford, is a constituent.

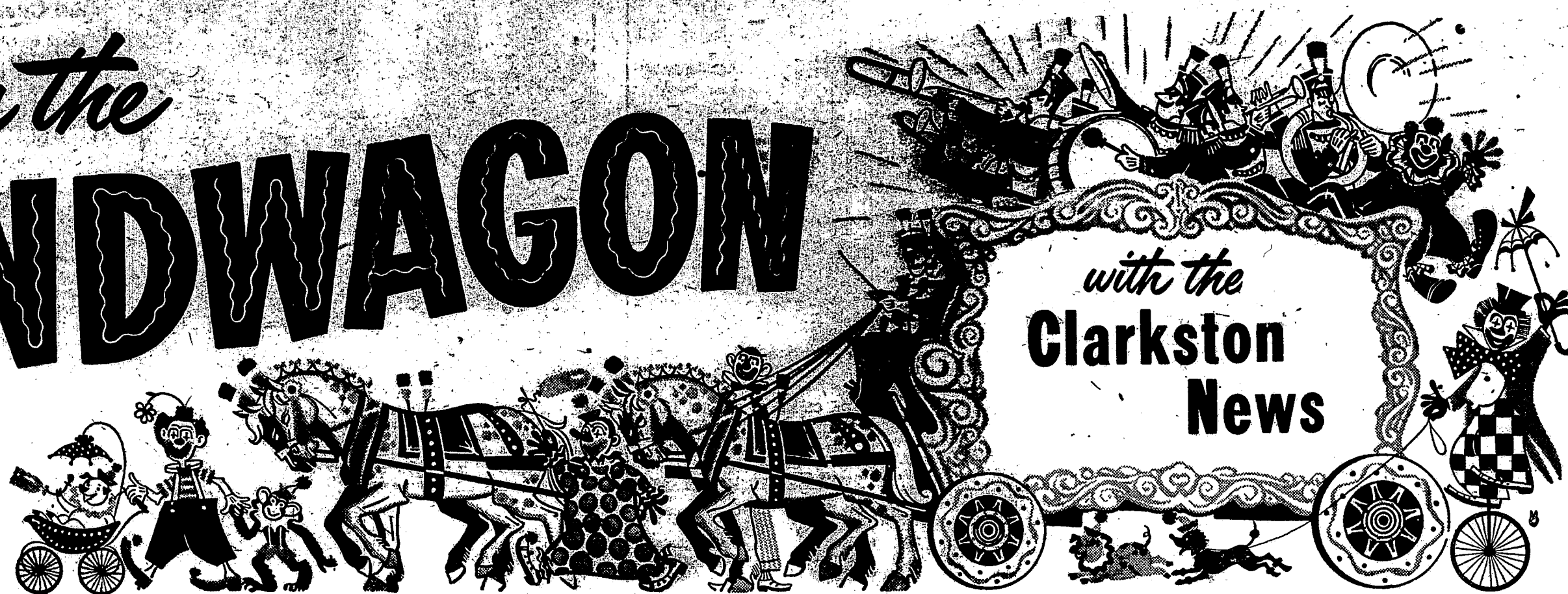


