Polio Vaccine Test In Local Schools

Nearly 538 children attending Clarkston district schools will be the Board of the Detroit Edison given the opportunity to participate in the county-wide test of the new polio vaccine this month. Parents of pupils in first, sec-

ond and third grades will be part in the trials. This will include the Clakston, Andersonville and Sashabaw schools, along with 33,000 other children in Oakland County.

> Youngsters whose parents give permission will be injected, some with the new vaccine developed by Dr. Jonas E. Salk of University of Pittsburgh; the others will get a powerless liquid. Doctors who will compile complete records on the vaccinated youngsters hope the new vaccine will give life-long immunity from polio.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, which paid for research on the vaccine with March of Dimes funds, is financing the entire test and is working closely with health officials and the Oakland County Medical Society as well as school authorities. Similar tests will be run. in 11 other Michigan counties and scores of other places across the nation.
