## School Fund Over Goal

Announcing \$22,500 over goal, the School Building Fund Campaign at Our Lady of the Lakes, Waterford, Michigan, ended with a final report of \$12,000 on Monday, August 2, and a grand total of \$122,500. Directed by Community Counselling Service of Detroit, the \$100,000 Minimum Goal Campaign officially opened July 13. Almost 175 active volunteer workers made personal door-to-door visits on all parishioners. Headed by Lawrence McCulloch, as general chairman, the program found immediate response among the parishioners.

With the closing of the active phase of the campaign a Continuation Committee has been organized under the chairmanship of John Manser who will be assisted by Frank Zimmerman, Louis Bachnak and Robert Kenny. Functioning throughout the two-year pledge period, all subsequent visits, gifts, and follow-ups will be accomplished by this Committee consisting of chairmen, team captains, and "top notch" volunteer workers from the active phase of the Campaign.

The Business Committee headed by John Foster and George Brinker will continue to function for the next two weeks in giving local businessmen the opportunity to participate in the program.

Reverend F. J. Delaney, Pastor, announced plans to entomb in the cornerstone a listing of all campaign workers in appreciation of the generous support and enthusiastic efforts of the volunteers during the campaign.

## The Grist Mill

Farmers in Oakland County are urged to participate in the election of community committeemen August 12 to 20th. Up to date the township nominating committee has selected the candidates for each of the areas in the county. On or before August 12 eligible farmers will receive ballots from the A. S. C. office, Walter Cook, manager. These ballots will contain the names of the candidates for the community in which the eligible voter resides. He should select five of these candidates as his choice for the three community committeemen and two alternates necessary to carry on A. S. C. programs in his area. All it takes is a couple of minutes of time to mark the ballots and put them in the mail box. This is not too much to ask for the privilege of being an American.

Wheat harvest is well underway on Oakland County farms. In fact by the end of July about 90% of the wheat was in the bin on farms in the county and some farmers had started on the oat crop. Yields of both wheat and oats were reported to be above average by the farmers we have talked to so far. Most farmers further report spring seeding of alfalfa are coming along nicely in spite of recent dry weather.

Master Carroll Hiersch will bring the program to conclusion by playing: Run! Run! by Offavo Pinto; Lullaby by Tansman, and Russian Danse by Tansman.
