His description of how dents in the glacier accumulated sile and soil while hard spots projected and when the glacier rolled over this area and melted the hard projections prodded into the ground and formed our many lakes while the silt and soil were deposited forming the hills north of town as well as Waterford Hill on the south.

An interesting sidelight on how the inhabitation of this village was delayed by a federal government worker saying that there were so many lakes in this county that the land would not be worth anything for farming.

Following the revolutionary war a number of families from New Jersey, including the Vliets, Walters and Hammonds, decided to move westward, came to Michigan, and coming down Waterford Hill liked the looks of the territory so well they decided to settle hereabouts.
