The village of Clarkston was greatly shocked last Sunday at the sudden death of one of its native sons, Manley L. Walter.

Mr. Walter passed away at his home at 20 Buffalo Street. He was born in Clarkston on May 5, 1908, the son of Mrs. Blanche Walter and the late Louis F. Walter.

Mr. Walter was a graduate of the Clarkston High School and graduated in Business Administration from the Ferris Institute. He had been employed by the General Motors for approximately twenty-four years.

Mr. Walter was a member of the Clarkston Methodist Church and very often his singing talent was used in the choir. He enjoyed singing and will be remembered by his beautiful tenor voice. Manley will be greatly missed, not only by his relatives and close friends but by everyone about town who loved him for his genial personality and his keen sense of humor.

He is survived by his wife, Dorothy; one daughter, Susan; two sons, James and Louis; his mother, Mrs. Louis F. Walter and one brother, Ronald, all of Clarkston.

The funeral service was held at the Sharpe Funeral home on Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock with the Reverend Robert M. Atkins officiating. Interment was in Lakeview cemetery.

There were many from out of town who attended the funeral. Some of these were Mrs. Manley Walter's three sisters who flew here from Iowa, Idaho and S. Dakota and her brother and sister-in-law, Dr. and Mrs. Peter Tymman from Detroit. Relatives also came from South Bend, Indiana.

Survivors include one son, Ellis of Ortonville and two daughters, Mrs. Doris Crosby and Mrs. Laura Miller, both of Clarkston; five grandchildren and two sisters, Mrs. Emma Rebtoy of Oxford and Mrs. Hildred Sharpless of Utica.

The funeral service will be held this afternoon, Thursday, at two o'clock at the Sharpe Funeral Home with the Reverend George Halk officiating. Interment will be in Olive Branch cemetery in Holly.

"Safe Driving Day" Wednesday, Dec. 15

Mayor Russell Colton today proclaimed Wednesday, December 15 as "S-D Day"—or "Safe Driving Day"—and pledged the full support of the village government in making the project a success. He urged all citizens to do their utmost to keep Clarkston entirely free of accidents on Dec. 15.

"S-D Day" is sponsored by the President's Action Committee for Traffic Safety in cooperation with various national organizations, and state and local officials. It is a day to demonstrate that traffic accidents can be reduced materially when all motorists and pedestrians do their part.

Following is the Mayor's proclamation: "Whereas the President of the United States has asked all Americans to unite in a nationwide demonstration that traffic accidents can be avoided if all motorists and pedestrians do their part; and

"Whereas, the Governor of our State has asked all of the communities in Michigan to support this worthy effort;

"Now, therefore, as Mayor of the Village of Clarkston, I hereby proclaim Wednesday, December 15th, as 'S-D Day' in this community, and ask all citizens to drive and walk on this day so as to keep the entire 24-hour period free of traffic accidents."

Mayor Colton has designated Frank Green as Director of "S-D Day" activities for Clarkston. Governor G. Mennen Williams has officially proclaimed December 15 as "S-D Day" throughout the State of Michigan. Governors of other states have issued similar proclamations, in support of this nation-wide undertaking, as the result of the appeal of President Eisenhower.

In pledging support for the program, Mayor Colton said: "This is an opportunity for every citizen to join in a common effort against a common enemy: the traffic accident toll. He can help as an individual, and as a member of groups with which he is associated: his church, his P. T. A., his club or fraternal society, his union, his association—and all individuals and organizations can and should participate actively."
