

LONGER DAYS AND COLDEST OF THE YEAR IN FEBRUARY

Longer and colder days are in store for us in February, according to Associate Prof. Hazel M. Losh of the University of Michigan's astronomy department.

A "lag of the seasons" causes the lowest temperatures of the year to be delayed for several weeks after the date of the winter solstice when the sun reaches the most southerly point in its apparent yearly journey around the earth, says Professor Losh.

"The atmosphere acts like a blanket and holds back some of the heat that falls on its surface and for some time after December 22 the northern hemisphere is losing more heat at night than can be replaced effectively by the sun during the shorter-than-average days," she adds.

The days will lengthen to 11 hours by the end of the month with the most noticeable effect

a one-and-a-half hour longer afternoon, caused by the fact that the sun we set our watches by is a fictitious one assumed to move at a regular rate. The real sun moves erratically and although our watches say noon it has not yet reached the meridian, which put our Standard Time about an hour-and-a-half ahead of the sun and gives us the longer afternoon, Professor Losh explains.

Among the planets Mars remains a first magnitude object in the southwestern sky for about four hours after sunset. On February 26 the crescent moon will pass about four degrees above the planet.

Saturn will be rising around midnight and can be located in the constellation of Libra, with no other really bright objects near it. On February 14 the last quarter moon will pass about six degrees south of and should aid in identifying it, according

to Professor Losh.

The new constellation of the month is Leo, the Lion, rising at about sunset. It can be located by following the "pointer" stars of the Big Dipper in the direction opposite from the North Star. Six stars in the form of a reversed question mark and three stars to the east, or left, of this question mark form the Lion.

The brightest star in Leo is Regulus, marking the dot of the question mark. It is blue-white in color and ranks 12 in order of the brightness of all the stars, sending out one hundred times as much light as our Sun.

Its distance is about 84 light years away so if it were suddenly extinguished tonight we wouldn't know about it until sometime in the middle of the 21st century.

SOIL CONSERVATION ELECTS OFFICERS

John Canfield of New Hudson was elected as a new director and Earl Voorhees was re-elected to the Oakland Soil Conservation District Board of Directors at their annual meeting held at the Clarkston Community Center, Wednesday evening, January 26.

Keith Middleton, chairman of the district, distributed copies of the annual report which listed the outstanding accomplishments of the year: 30,000 trees supplied by the district, 39 acres planted to trees, 63 acres drained, 3 miles

of open ditches, 1125 ft. of tile drained, 2 miles of diversion ditches, 1 pond constructed, 2274 acres mapped, 20 farm maps prepared, 36 farms with woodlot management plans on 737 acres, and 8 acres developed into contour farming. The accomplishments listed are on the farms of cooperators of the district, and the total of farms cooperating is well over 300.

The district has cooperated with federal, state and local agencies to promote the work of soil conservation throughout the area. One of the more spectacular events of the year was the Air Tour held September 1. The seed and fertilizer trails on wheat were of interest to many farmers and the soil conservation exhibit at the County Fair was seen by an estimated audience of 10,000 people.

John Doneth, agricultural economist from Michigan State College, was the feature speaker of the evening; and Mr. Kenneth Brown, assistant superintendent

of Schools, was the toastmaster. Entertainment was furnished by Dick Cairns, the winner of the 4-H Amateur Show.

Arrangements for the program were made by John K. Bray, assistant county agricultural agent. The dinner was served by the Oakland County Farm Bureau Women's group.

Other directors working for the Association include Harold Mitchell of Grand Blanc and Earl Barrett of Milford.

NEW STAMP HONORS MICHIGAN STATE COLLEGE

The new U. S. three-cent postage stamp honoring Michigan State College and Pennsylvania State University which goes on sale Feb. 12 at East Lansing, commemorates the 100 anniversary of each school.

More specifically, the date of the stamp's sale marks the day exactly 100 years ago when the governor signed the legislative act establishing Michigan Agricultural College.

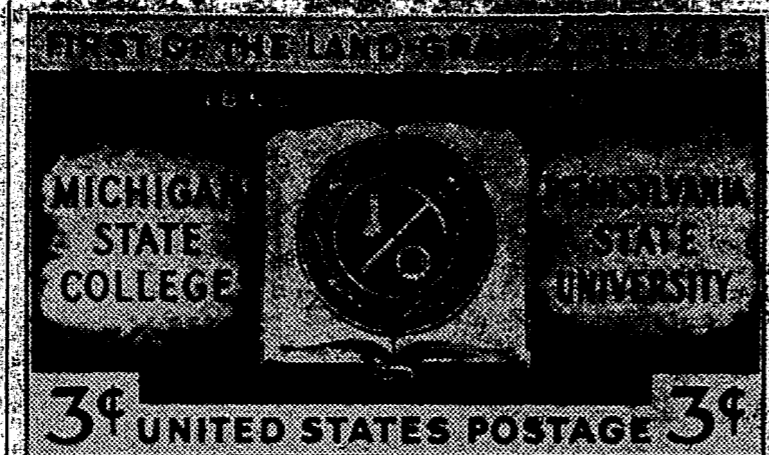
The first such college in the nation, M. A. C., now M. S. C., became the model for the land-grant colleges set up under the Morrill Act of 1862.

Pennsylvania State University established a farmers' high school in 1855 and it was made the Agricultural College of Pennsylvania one month before the Morrill Act was passed.

The land-grant system proposed a new theory in education, that knowledge means progress and progress was meant for all. For the first time, a college was dedicated to serving all the people.

The commemorative stamp to be issued Feb. 12 is conceived as a tribute to the faith the two universities hold to that original dedication.

Formal presentation of the stamp will take place at 10:30 a. m. on Feb. 12 in the lounge



Postmaster General Arthur E. Only one first day sale of the stamp is planned, with East Lansing being designated at the place for the sale and for the application of the first day cancellation mark.

The Stamp will be sold at the East Lansing postoffice starting at 6 a. m. on February 12 and at two points on the Michigan State campus—Kellogg Center and Union Ticket Office—from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.

First day covers, which are special envelopes engraved with commemorative seals, will be sold to the public at the two campus points during the day.

These covers, with the stamp affixed can be mailed from East Lansing with the first day cancellation, reading "first day of issue," on each.

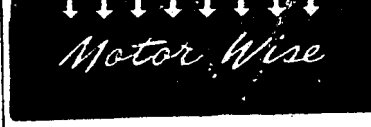

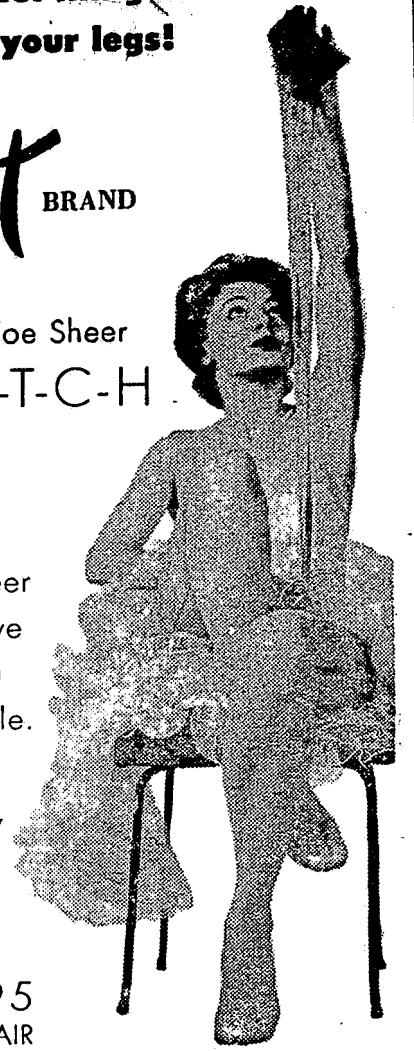

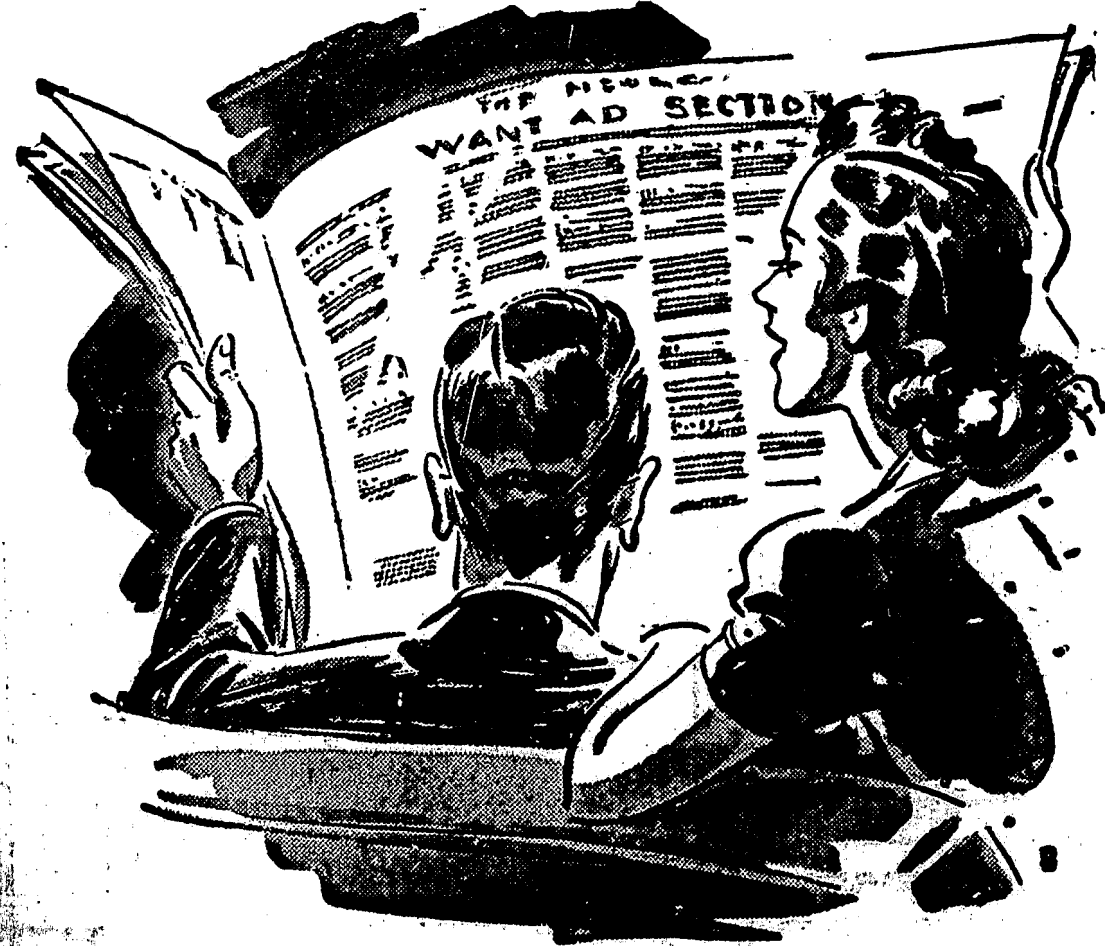
