Summerfield has announced that this special three-cent stamp commemorating the centennials of Michigan State College and Pennsylvania State University will go on sale in East Lansing, Mich. on Feb. 12, exactly 100 years after the governor signed the legislative act establishing Michigan Agricultural College. The first such college in the nation, MAC.--now MSC.--became the model for the land-grant colleges set up under the Morrill Act of 1862. 


