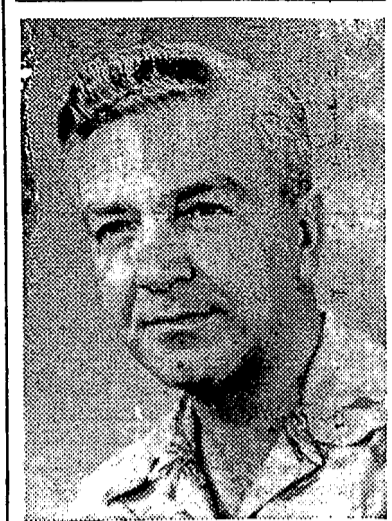
Parcel Post Freight Burdens Taxpayers

A move is now on to increase the size and weight limits on parcel post packages moving between large cities and towns. Already, a bill has been introduced in the U. S. Congress under the sponsorship of certain commercial and mail order shippers. If the shippers succeed resulting post office expansion and increased operating costs would mean that the taxpayer would suffer millions of dollars more in fourth-class mail postage which would be added to the public debt. All taxpayers would pay solely for the benefit of the few who seek below-cost government transportation which has been an "unfair" competition with private transportation services.

Motor truck, parcel carrier, and air freight, and freight forwarder as well as local and highway express services got some of their freight business back and the taxpayer got a break when Congress acted in 1951 to take the heavier shipments out of the mails between first-class post offices. Those who seek to regain cheap transportation in their business operations do so at a time when the national debt is more than 270 billion dollars and the accumulated fourth-class parcel post deficit amounts to more than 1.2 billion dollars.

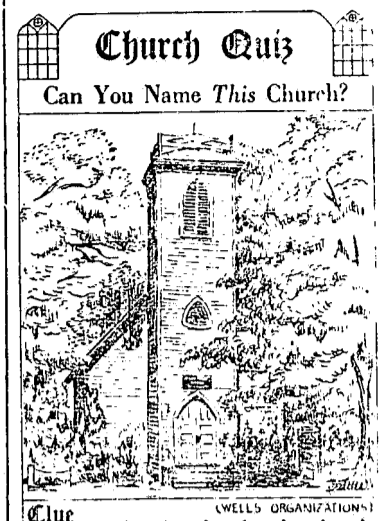

AMERICAN INDIANS EXCELLENT PARENTS

Many American Indian tribes seem to have much better success in training their children than white people do, Prof. Leslie A. White, chairman of the Department of Anthropology at the University of Michigan, declares.

He has just returned from a sabbatical leave in the Southwest where he has been making studies of the Pueblo Indians during the past 25 years.

The success of the Pueblo Indians, he points out, is the more remarkable since it has been achieved without benefit of books on child care, clinics, and child study clubs.

According to the anthropologist, although these primitive peoples never spank their children, the offspring are remarkably well brought-up just the same.

"I have often been amazed at the difference between young children in Indian villages and many children among ourselves", he says. "Never have I seen an Indian child talk back to his parents or to an elder. They do not scream and go into a tantrum when they are forbidden to do something. They never get fresh. On the contrary, they are very well behaved, obedient and respectful to their parents and to all elders. They may quarrel among themselves but even this is relatively rare."

How to account for this idealistic behavior among young Indians? Professor White reminds us that "primitive peoples are, as a general rule, very fond of their children. The older children vie with each other for the care of the younger. Indian children are respected as real individuals, and are never embarrassed or humiliated by being made to feel they have been 'bad'. Basking in the emotional security which comes from knowing they are wanted and loved, they never respond with 'spoiled' behavior."

Pointing up the contrasts between the education of the Indian child and that of the white child, he explains that the children of primitive peoples grow naturally into the life of the community. "They are not sent away to school to prepare them for life. They are living all the time. 'Commencement' for Indian children is when they are taken out of the cradle.

"After that, they are introduced gradually to the daily occupations and the lore and ceremonies of the tribe", Professor White continues. "The little girls learn to take care of the babies, perhaps help with the cooking, and later, to make pottery or to weave baskets, and to make clothing. The boys help their fathers, hunting, herding flocks, or working in the fields.

"From time to time, the parents, grandparents, uncles and aunts teach the children the lore of their tribe. They tell them myths and tales and legends by the dozen. They tell them how the world was made, how there came to be people, and why they have the customs that they have. They teach the children songs and prayers, and what rituals to observe on various occasions.

"In other words, in social affairs as well as in practical affairs, we find the education of the Indian child progressing daily, in a perfectly natural way. As a rule, he hardly realizes that he is being taught something, it comes so gradually.

"Unlike some of his little white brothers, the Indian child is not 'kept in' during recess. Best of all, he is not compelled to study something that is not a part of his life and never will be. Everything that he is taught is a living part of the social life of his community. His teaching is a part of life itself", Professor White explains.

FABRICS CAUSE REVISION OF SEWING PRACTICES

Since the arrival of synthetic fabrics, many homemakers have had to revise some of their sewing practices.

Mrs. Mary A. Hixon, home demonstration agent in Oakland County, points out the wisdom in knowing whether you are working with a blend or a pure synthetic. If it is a blend find out the fiber content. When the fabric contains a greater amount of natural fiber, treat it as a natural fiber; when it has more synthetic content, follow sewing directions for synthetics.

In sewing synthetics, be sure to work with sharp shears and fine silk pins. Ripping the material is not advisable as it may distort the yarns. On smooth, silky fabrics, Mrs. Hixon advises the use of nylon or dacron thread. The new monocord nylon thread called Nymo is very satisfactory, and has a fine appearance in top

stitching. An 11 or 9 needle is better for very fine and sheer fabrics.

When machine stitching, you need less tension and can run the machine at a slower speed. For finely woven fabrics, Mrs. Hixon advocates a shorter stitch, 16 to 20 per inch.

In making draperies or curtains from firmly textured synthetics, Mrs. Hixon suggests using a pinked seam. For sheer light weight fabrics, use a narrow French seam. A good seam allowance is 3/4 to 1 inch rather than the traditional 1/2 to 3/8 inch. These should be trimmed for French seams.

SOCIAL SECURITY AS IT APPLIES TO HOUSEHOLD EMPLOYERS

Social Security information, as it applies to many more household employers since January 1, is given in the new booklet, "Do You Have a Maid?", just issued

under the joint sponsorship of the Internal Revenue Service and the Social Security Administration. It describes the first step to be taken by every employer of domestic help who pays an employee \$50 or more cash wages in a calendar quarter of the year for work in a private household.

Copies of the booklet may be obtained by simply writing, phoning, or visiting the nearest social security office or Internal Revenue office, it was announced

by Rex A. C. Atwood, District Manager of the Social Security Administration, and A. M. Menninger of the Detroit office of the Internal Revenue Service.

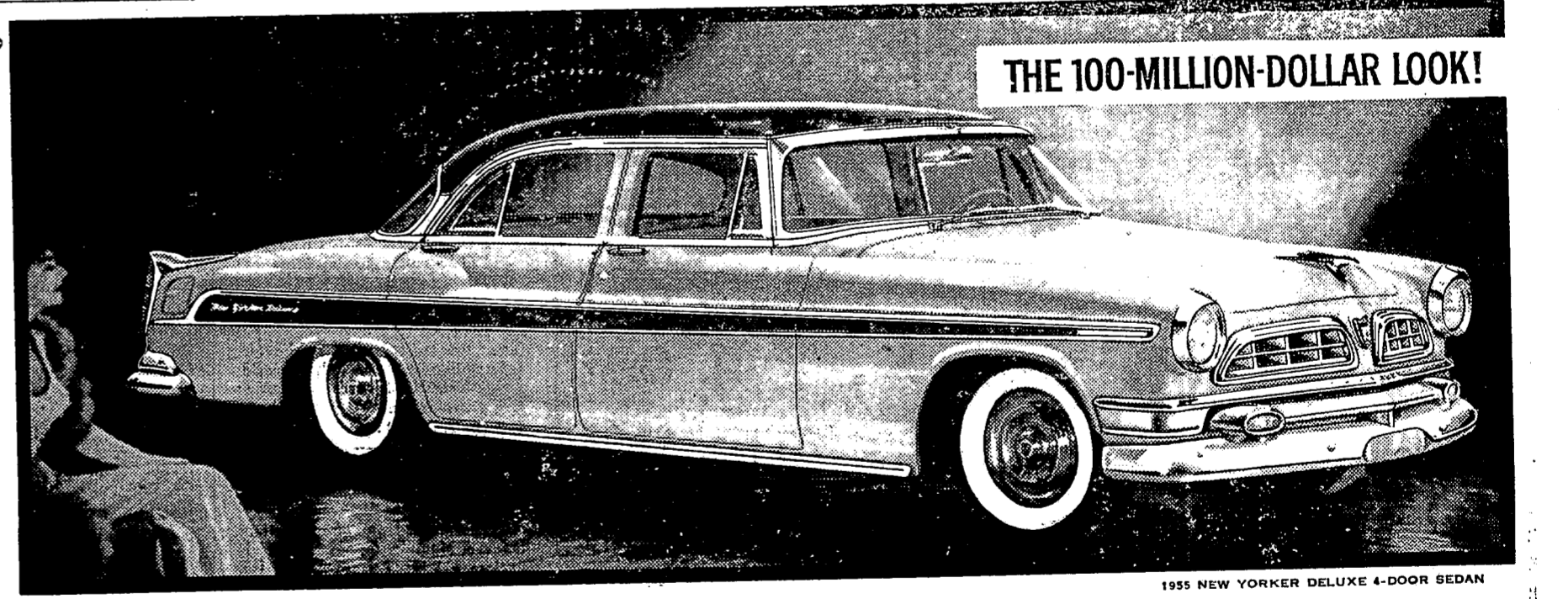
