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

AMERICAN INDIANS EXCELLENT PARENTS.

Many American Indian tribes seem to have much better success in training their children than white people do, Prof. Leslie A. White, chairman of the Department of Anthropology at the are living all the time. 'Com-University of Michigan, declares,

He has just returned from a sabbatical leave in the Southwest where he has been making studies of the Pueblo Indians during the past 25 years.

The success of the Pueblo Indians, he points out, is the more remarkable since it has been achieved without benefit of books on child care, clinics, and child study clubs.

According to the anthropologist, although these primitive peoples never spank their children, the offspring are remarkably well brought-up just the same.

"I have often been amazed at the difference between young children in Indian villages and many children among ourselves", he says. "Never have I seen an Indian child talk back to his parents or to an elder. They do not scream and go into a tantrum when they are forbidden to do something. They never get fresh. On the contrary, they are very well behaved, obedient and respectful to their parents and to all elders. They may quarrel among themselves but even this is relatively rare."

How to account for this ideal istic behavior among young Indians? Professor White reminds us that "primitive peoples are, as a general rule, very fond of their children. The older children vie with each other for the care of the younger. Indian children are respected as real individuals. and are never embarrassed or humiliated by being made to feel they have been 'bad'. Basking in the emotional security which comes from knowing they are wanted and loved, they never respond with 'spoiled' behavior."

"After that, they are introduced gradually to the daily occupations and the lore and ceremonies of the tribe", Professor White continues. "The little girls learn to take care of the babies, perhaps help with the cooking, and later, to make pottery or to weave baskets, and to make clothing. The boys help their fathers, hunting, herding flocks, or working in the fields.

"From time to time, the parents, grandparents, uncles and aunts teach the children the lore of their tribe. They tell them myths and tales and legends by the dozen. They tell them how the world was made, how there came to be people, and why they have the customs that they have. They teach the children songs and prayers, and what rituals to observe on various occasions.

"In other words, in social affairs as well as in practical affairs, we find the education of the Indian child progressing daily, in a perfectly natural way. As a rule, he hardly realizes that he is being taught something, it comes so gradually.

'Unlike some of his little white brothers, the Indian child is not 'kept in' during recess. Best of all, he is not compelled to study something that is not a part of his life and never will be. Everything that he is taught is a living part of the social life of his community. His teaching is a part of life itself", Professor White explains.

Strong bleaches used in laundering sheets will weaken them, To prevent them from becoming too soiled, change them frequently. Mend the holes and tears before washing. Miss Roach suggests tearing torn sheets down the center lengthwise, seaming the salvaged edges together and

hemming the raw edges. Sheets should be-washed in hot, softened water with plenty of soap. Make sure the soap is thoroughly rinsed out. Don't try to wash too many sheets at one time, cautions Miss Roach: the results won't be as good.

Miss Roach suggests hanging sheets a different way each time you pin them up to dry. This will distribute wear from the clothesline evenly over the sheet. She says sunshine is the best bleach to whiten sheets, so try to hang them on a sunny day. But do not let them whip in a

strong wind or freeze stiff. Avoid an iron that is too hot and never use it to iron creases into sheets. Fold them by hand and try folding them in different places. Most long tears in sheets, says Miss Roach, are crease breaks

SPRING WHEAT

NOT ADVISABLE If you didn't get your winter wheat allotment planted last fall, don't fill in with spring wheat select some other cash crop.

That's advice from Milton Erdman, extension farm crops specialist at Michigain State College. And, he reminds, wheat acreage allotments were based on averages of 1952 and 1953. So there's no worry on that score.

Erdman cited 18 years of tests in Michigan which showed that spring wheat yielded more than 14 bushels less than winter wheat. And spring wheat in Michigan is used as feed because

of our humid climate. Another cash crop would be much more profitable than spring wheat, Erdman concludes.






