### CENSUS BUREAU TO CONDUCT HOUSING VACANCY SURVEY

A national survey to determine the rate of housing vacancies will be conducted beginning in March by the U. S. Census Bureau, according to Supervisor Robert C. Gillespie of the Bureau's District Office at Detroit, which will participate in the collection of the information.

The housing vacancy survey will be carried out in connection with the Census Bureau's Current Population Survey which collects facts on employment and unemployment. Information to be collected about vacant dwelling units encountered in the 25-thousand-family Current Population Survey sample panel includes number of rooms in each unit, rent asked, sales price; whether the dwelling is a single-family or multi-family unit and whether or not it is available for seasonal or year-around occupancy.

The Current Population Survey will be conducted locally and in 229 other areas of the country during the week of March 14-

### Wolves Triumph Over Milford

Tuesday night, the 8th of March, the Clarkston Wolves made it the first win out of three contests with Milford, to start the Regionals. After two earlier games the Wolves started their game against Milford with a slight advantage of having played on the Pontiac floor previously. Through the first three quarters the game was neck and neck. In the middle of the third quarter Milford's high point player, Jim Davidson, fouled out, giving the Clarkston quintet a slight advantage. Clarkston's Leroy Parks set the pace in the third and fourth quarter by hitting eight free throws in a row and making six points from the floor, giving him the high point honors for the Wolves with 14 points. When the gun sounded to end the exciting game, the score read 49 points for Clarkston and 40 for Milford.

Thursday, Clarkston's Wolves will play Marysville for the second of the three tournament games, in the Pontiac High School Gym.

### Goodwill Trucks Here Monday

An emergency call for usable, repairable discards was made today by Goodwill Industries, Michigan's largest employer of handicapped people.

Without the support of householders who are the backbone of the effort, Goodwill Industries cannot help the handicapped to help themselves, cannot give jobs and cannot exist.

"The collection of discards during February was dangerously low if we hope to keep our people steadily employed", said Harold H. McKinnon, Executive Secretary. "We must have a rapid influx of materials."

"Goodwill Industries is very optimistic about the future picture for 1955 and has high hopes of hiring more handicapped people from its waiting list", McKinnon said. "We know that the decline in the flow of material is seasonal, but we feel the public should realize our present needs."

McKinnon asked housewives who would normally begin housecleaning a month from now to get an early start. This would be a lifeline for Goodwill Industries and would pre-rotate the work of spring housecleaning over a longer period of time giving the housewife a break during April and May.

### Gail Wilds Named Homemaker

Gail Wilds has been named the Homemaker of Tomorrow in Clarkston High School.

She received the highest score in a written examination which tested the homemaking aptitude of the senior girls in her graduating class. She will receive a golden award pin, cook books for herself and her school, and she will be entered in competition to name this state's candidate for the title of Betty Crocker American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The national winner in this search conducted among 187,463 young women in 8,040 of the nation's public, private and parochial high schools will be named April 21 at an American table fete in Philadelphia.

Michigan's representative in the national finals will be chosen from 264 school winners in the state. A total of 6,424 Michigan girls participated in this program. A scholarship of 1,500 will be awarded each state winner, and she will receive a trip with her school advisor to Washington, D. C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Philadelphia.

The scholarship of the young woman named All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$5,000. Each girl who took the test received a 24-page homemaking guide and her school will receive a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

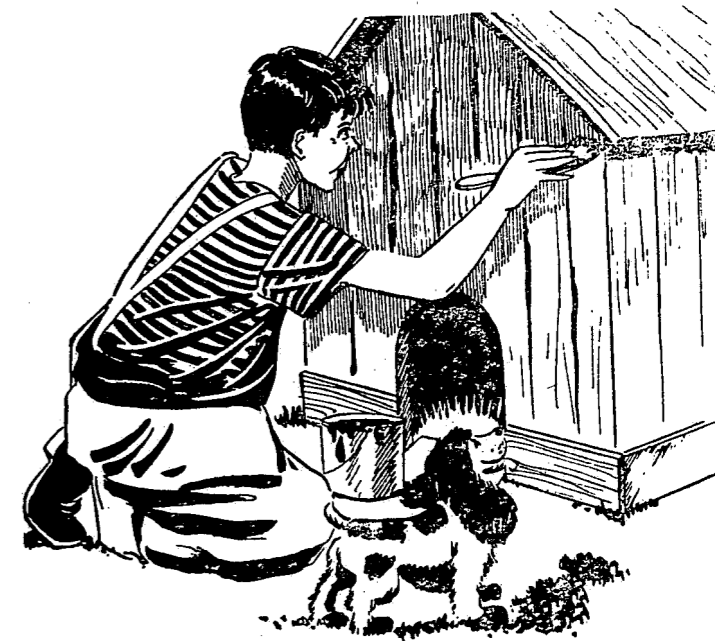

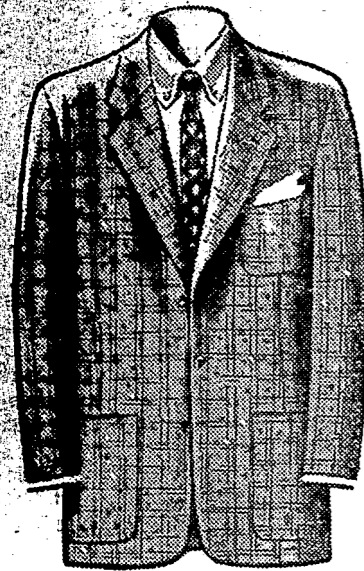

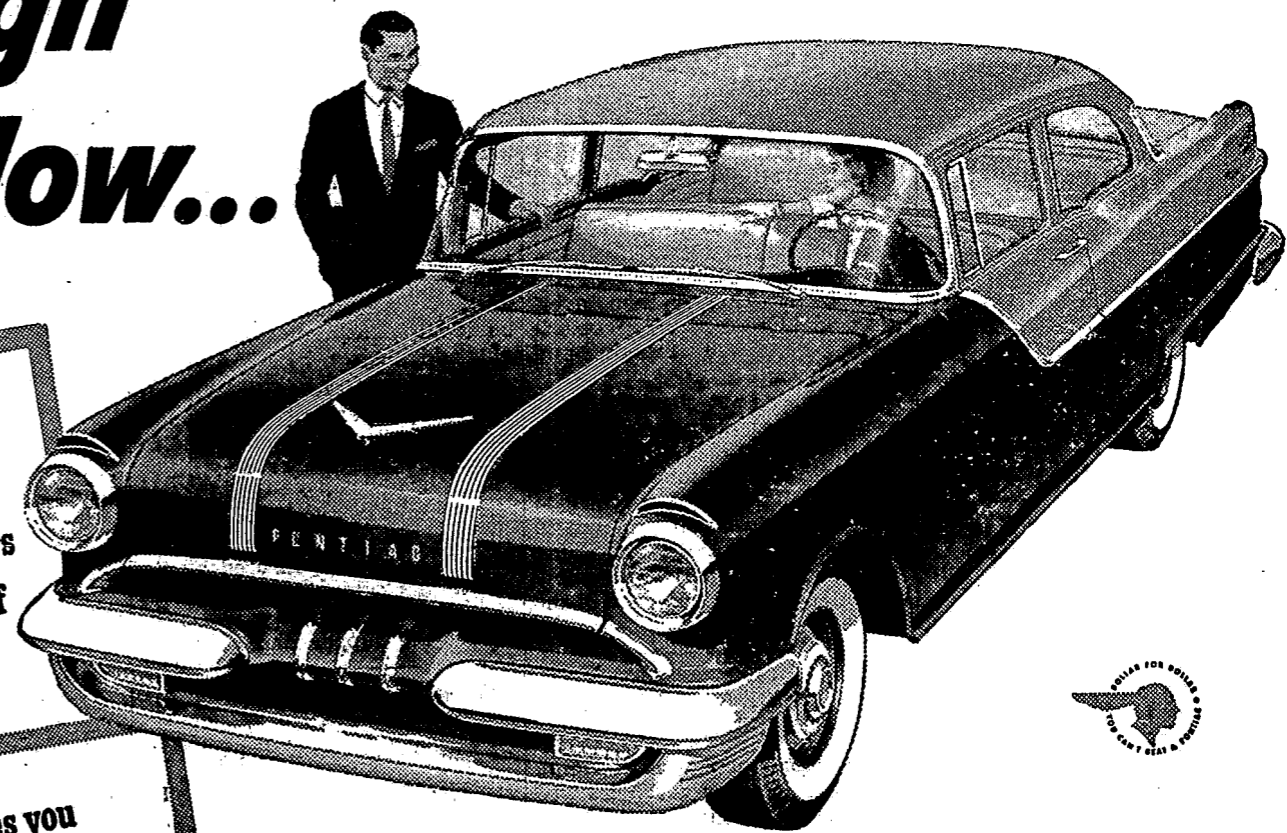

**FUTURE GOALS DISCUSSED BY PLANNING COMMISSION**

Members of four area planning commissions discussed present projects and future goals yesterday in the Oakland County Office Building.

The meeting to initiate closer coordination of governmental planning activities was called by the county planning commission.

Other groups represented were the Detroit City and Detroit Metropolitan Area planning commissions plus the Rochester-Avon-Oakland Area Planning Commission.

T. Ledyard Blakeman, executive director of the Detroit Metropolitan group which includes Oakland County in its surveys, reported first.

Blakeman said its organization will join with Oakland and Detroit in an industrial study aimed at obtaining an overall picture of manufacturing in Michigan's southeast section.

The survey should help guide future industrial development plus providing information needed by established firms, he explained.

The metropolitan commission is formulating a land-use plan in cooperation with local governmental units, said Blakeman.

It attempts to set up a logical plan for laying out residential, industrial, commercial and recreation districts, the director explained.

"We adopted a tentative land-use plan in 1953," he said, "and are now taking sub-sections of it to local agencies for their study and criticism before it is made final."

"When a major part of the plan for Oakland County is completed, it will be submitted to the county plan commission for study and recommendations."

Another study now underway is attempting to decide what are

the "natural communities" in the region. "The design is to plan parks, roads, and other services so they will compliment whole communities without cutting them in pieces."

Other data being gathered on home-to-work car traffic "I think will indicate people would like to live as close to their work as reasonably possible given space and a free housing market."

Plans for this year include starting a survey to blueprint future sewer and water trunklines, said Blakeman.

After Blakeman's report, discussion was held on a proposed plan for highway development worked out for their area by the Rochester-Avon-Oakland group.

County Highway Engineer Robert A. Larson outlined several changes in the plan recommended by the county plan group.

Armin Roemer, assistant director of the Detroit city commission described that city's progress in planning expressways, redevelopment of slum areas, a civic center and public parking garages.

The meeting was directed by J. Robert Swanson, Chairman of the Oakland Plan Commission.
