## Club Sells Tickets For Flower Show

Have you ever wanted to take a trip that would carry you from the northern woods of Michigan to the beautiful Smoky Mountains of the South? Well, you can take such a trip without leaving the City of Detroit if you attend the Michigan Flower and Garden Exhibition at the Michigan State Fair Ground from March 26 through April 3rd.

This year the Chrysler Corporation's exhibit "In and around the Smokies" will be composed of reproductions of such famous places as "Klingman's Dome," "New Found Gap," "Laurel Falls" and many others. A stream and lake will wind through the entire garden and will cross the Appalachian Trail in several places. Stepping stones and a rustic bridge will permit the public to cross the stream in a realistic setting.

According to Jim Fisher, assistant general manager of the Flower Show, there will be a mammoth rose exhibit this year, sponsored by the Detroit Rose Society.

Werner Hoy, general manager of the Flower Show, particularly pointed out that the Coliseum will have 21 outstanding gardens that will be part of the big public participation contest this year. The general public along with professional judges will select the garden winners from this group. Those who cast votes for the garden that is finally judged best of the show plus most accurately estimating the number of flowers used in the entire exhibit will win prizes ranging from a 1955 Plymouth to fountains, summer houses, fireplaces, power garden tools, and lawn mowers down to fertilizers.

There will be many, many more outstanding exhibits everyone will want to see.

## Lenten Service To Feature New Film

The 77-minute film was produced in the latest Eastman color by the Radio and Film Commission of The Methodist Church in cooperation with J. Arthur Rank. This picture was featured in LIFE Magazine.

The new motion picture, "John Wesley" is to be a feature of the Tuesday night Lenten Service at the Clarkston Methodist Church. The film will be shown in the church sanctuary following the co-operative dinner at 6:30, Tuesday, March 22.

While the film is being released only to Methodist Churches during the initial period, the public is invited to see the picture at Clarkston Methodist Church. Those who cannot be present for the dinner, but wish to come for the "John Wesley" picture, should come about 7:15 P. M. An offering will be taken, to defray the cost of the film.

The feature-length film is in the new Eastman color and was produced by the Radio and Film Commission of the Methodist Church in cooperation with J.

Arthur Rank. It brings to the screen for the first time the dynamic and colorful 18th century evangelist and educator.

John Wesley's miraculous rescue from a burning house at the age of five at the beginning of the film, forecasts the dramatic and eventful life which unfolds in this story of a man of slight stature but of impelling influence upon his contemporaries and upon history.

The English clergyman-thought his venture in America as a missionary to the Indians in Georgia colony was a failure which opened the door to the discovery of a religious certainty he had been seeking.

Furthermore, this discovery, in which John Wesley felt his "heart

strangely warmed", led him to face mobs unafraid, and to ride 250,000 miles on horseback, changing the masses of English people from a low state of moral degradation to sturdy and happy uprightness.

His "enthusiasm" was frowned upon by the lethargic leaders of the Church of England of that day but it was this new-found enthusiasm which enabled him to influence so many phases of the life of English-speaking peoples.

His appeal to the common man, his establishment of schools, clinics, lay preaching and societies, finally his sending of supervisors for the movement in the new world after the American revolution—all these make the film one which will be long remembered.

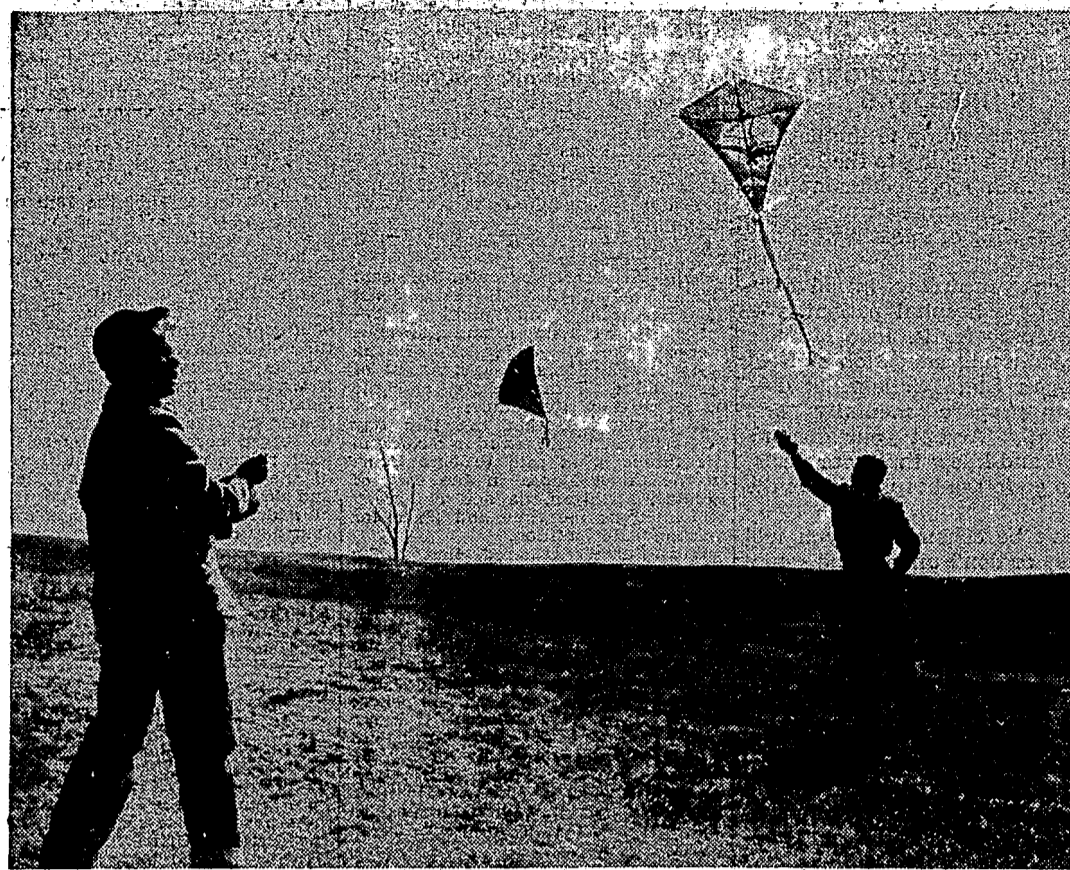

### Use Caution Flying Kites



March winds remind us that today's jet-age youngsters still have at least one thing in common with the children of yesterday—the love of watching the graceful antics of an airborne kite.

But kite-flying now isn't as trouble-free as it was when granddad was a boy. Along with the comforts and pleasures of modern living have come a few drawbacks and hazards which

didn't exist when "back forties" were plentiful.

However, R. P. Douglas, head of the Detroit Edison Company's safety department, has a few simple rules for keeping the fun in and the danger out of kite-flying. Here they are:

1. Always fly kites in open fields—away from overhead wires and away from streets and roads where traffic is an additional hazard.

2. Use a wooden kite frame; wood is a non-conductor of electricity.

3. Use "plain" kite-string; avoid all tinsel wire or cord that has any appearance of being metallic. Metallic cord can carry electricity to your hand and cause painful injury or fatal shock.

4. If the kite does catch on a pole or tree, leave it there. It's too bad to lose it but making a

new kite is fun—and climbing for the old one might result in a fall or electric shock.

5. Never fly your kite during an electrical storm. Ben Franklin used a kite in his experiment with electricity. But he was lucky not to have been killed.

When you're running to raise your kite or keep it in the air, watch your step rather than the kite—it may save you a bad bump or tumble.

"Kite-flying is a great sport for boys and girls everywhere", Douglas said, "and it can be safe if these rules are observed."

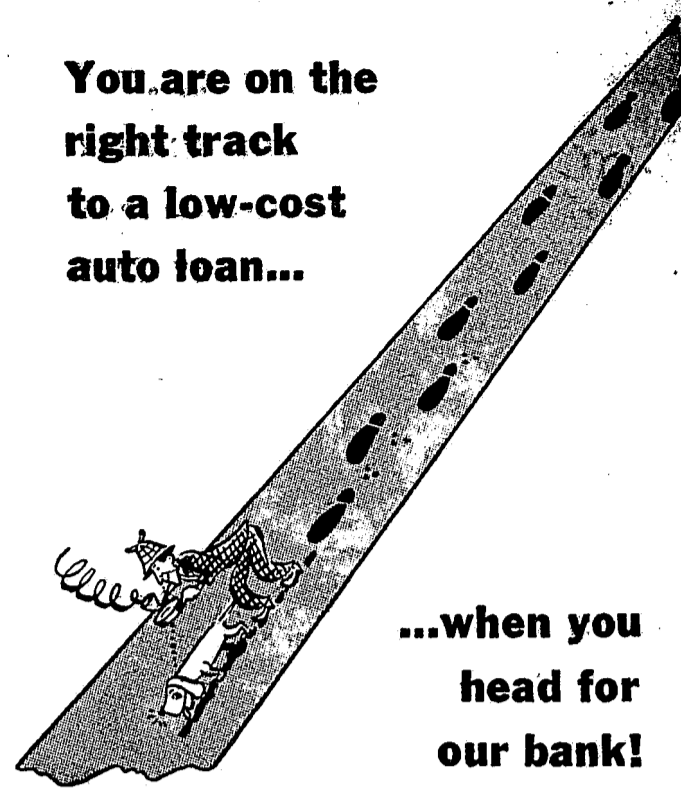

### MAKE PLANS FOR YOUR STAY IN HOSPITAL

When you know in advance, you'll be a hospital patient, you can prepare for it. Jean McHarg of the nursing education staff at Michigan State College, advises you to prepare mentally and physically. Accept your doctor's advice and know that your decision to go to the hospital is for the best.

Don't be ashamed; if you feel uneasy or don't understand something, ask questions. Your nurse is prepared to give you information to put your mind at ease. If your questions pop up before your arrival at the hospital, call them for information.

To prepare yourself physically, be sure you have taken the prescribed medication while waiting to enter the hospital. Get a proper amount of rest and avoid people with colds. Miss McHarg also suggests you do what you can to give yourself a feeling of well-being. For example, if you are a man, have your hair trimmed; if you are a woman, have your hair shampooed and set.

Think carefully of the things you will want to pack to take to the hospital, Miss McHarg suggests. Storage space is usually limited at hospitals so pack systematically. It's a wise idea to make a list of all things you take, in case someone else helps you pack to return home.

Careful preparation to go to the hospital will make hospitalization much more comfortable and easier on all concerned.

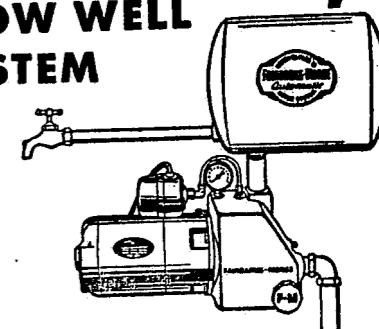
