The regular monthly smorgasbord dinner at the Sashabaw Church has been postponed for one week on account of Easter. The dinner will be served on Saturday evening, April 16th, starting at 5:30.

RETAIL SHOPPING SURVEY PLANNED HERE

A 15-man committee was organized in the Oakland County Office Building as the first step toward launching a retail shopping survey aimed at supplying data helpful to Oakland's growth and prosperity.

The men, one from each county elementary school attendance area, were called together by County Planner Roland R. Heiden to work with the plan commission, school superintendents and University of Michigan in the project.

The retail survey is important because "in spelling out of any future land use needs it is necessary to know where the retail trade areas are, why they are there, and where to expect new ones."

The University of Michigan Bureau of Business Research, which offers the survey as a community service, will tabulate and print the data along lines worked out in previous surveys done in 30 smaller communities.

Parents will be asked questions covering their buying habits pertaining to at least 24 types of merchandise, 11 types of stores in the various communities, plus length of residence in the county, place of employment and size and age of the family.

The material is expected to answer such questions as:

Where are the major retail shopping centers in the county and what are the market areas served by them?

Why do people make their purchases where they do? What role do parking and road conditions play in shaping public buying habits? What percentage of Oakland residents work outside the county?

The University will compile the figures and write a report this summer with results available to the plan commission and local units next fall.

Although the data will be analyzed on a county-wide basis, much will pertain to local conditions and a particular community can get a detailed report on its own area written following the main report.

Cost to the county for labor, materials and printing will be \$2,500.

The committee elected Charles Mortensen, manager of the Birmingham Chamber of Commerce, as chairman and Lin Enders of South Lyon, vice-chairman. Superintendent of Clawson Schools Paul Schalm represents the school administrators.

Other committee members are Edward Sawyer, representing Berkeley and Oak Park; Keith Hallman, Clarkston; Philip Thomas, Farmington; John J. Collins, Ferndale; Jack Johnson, Holly; George Richardson, Milford; Richard Prince, Oxford; and Richard McPartlin, Pontiac; Robert Warren, Rochester; Roland Powers, Royal Oak; John Clark, Union Lake and Larry Gilliam, Walled Lake.

From "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy the following passage will be among those read: "The perfect Mind sends forth perfection, for God is Mind. Imperfect mortal mind sends forth its own resemblances, of which the wise man said, 'All is vanity'." (239:29).
