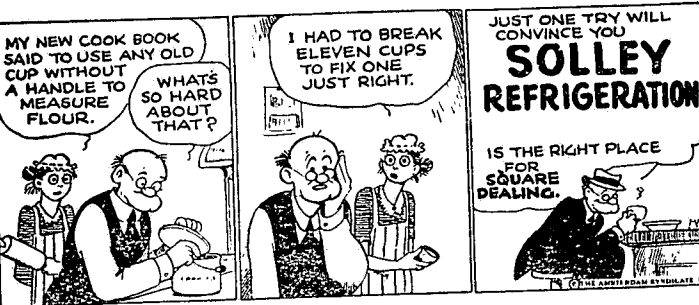

FRESH COMMENDS GOODWILL INDUSTRIES

Commending Goodwill Industries for "exemplifying a spirit of helpfulness and a belief in the rights and the dignity of the individual", President Dwight D. Eisenhower had today urged citizens to observe "Goodwill Week" during the first week in May.

The President said, "In more than one hundred cities in this country and in Canada, the Goodwill Industries provides places of gainful employment for those who cannot work in competitive industry. For many of these people, this employment serves as a steppingstone to better jobs and a more satisfying life. Some 250,000 handicapped persons currently benefit from this program."

Reminding Americans that approximately two million of our people suffer severely disabling physical conditions, the President said that "Goodwill Week" should

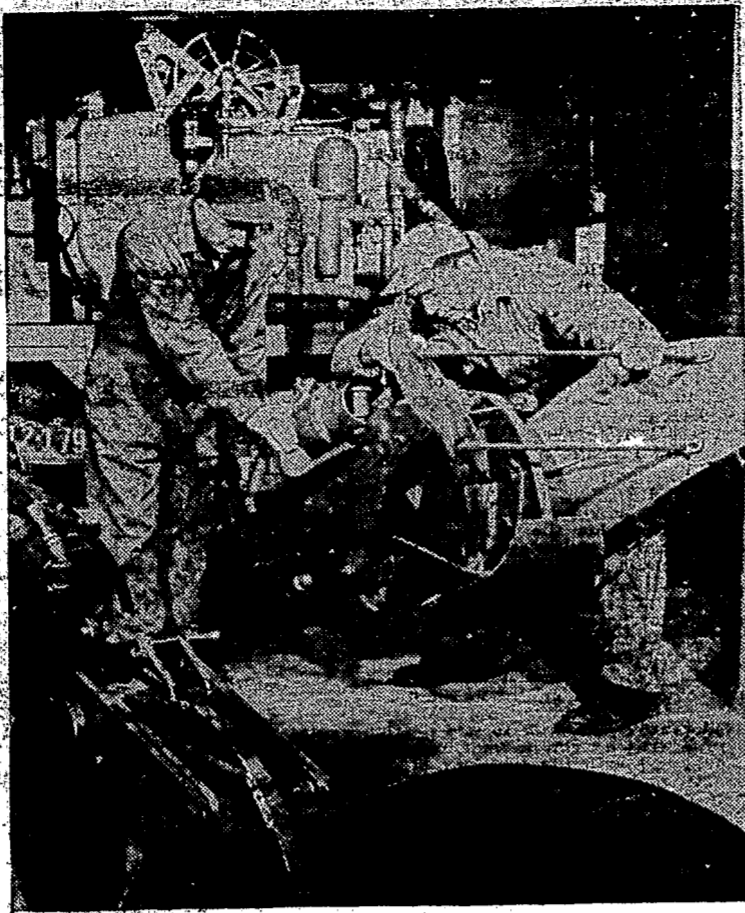
emphasize our responsibility to help such citizens.

Here, where Detroit Goodwill Industries employs nearly 400 handicapped people, plans have been laid to select the handicapped person of the year. The employees themselves will make the selection by ballot.

An award plus an extra week's vacation will be the prize, and Detroit Industry will celebrate the occasion with a dinner and entertainment for all employees on Wednesday, May 4.

A dinner for out-of-town friends and contributors will be given on Tuesday evening, May 3; a general open house with refreshments will be given on Thursday, May 5 and "Youth Day" will be Saturday, May 7. On this day Boy Scout and Girl Scout troops, church youth groups and other boys' and girls' clubs are invited to tour Goodwill Industries. Refreshments and favors will be served free of charge.

U-M POLIO REPORT BRIGHTENS HEALTH FUTURE

The University of Michigan was unquestionably the medical center of the world last week.

Every parent who for the past few years worried all summer long whether his child would be the next polio victim waited for the first official report from Dr. Thomas Francis Jr., U-M professor of epidemiology, on the value of the Salk Polio Vaccine. When the word came, it rang throughout the world. Newsmen went wild, mothers and fathers actually wept and physicians felt as if a boulder had been lifted from their hearts.

"The vaccine works . . . it is safe, effective, and potent." This was the message, and it was as

clear as a swiftly running trout stream.

The meat of the Francis Report on the polio vaccine is found in a few paragraphs at the end. These paragraphs are undoubtedly the most widely quoted in all of scientific literature.

"From these data it is not possible to select a single value giving numerical expression in a complete sense to the effectiveness of vaccine as a total experience. . . . (But) if the results from the observed areas are employed, the vaccine could be considered to have been 60-80 per cent effective against paralytic poliomyelitis."

The Report continued: "There is, however, greater confidence in the results obtained from the strictly controlled study areas."

"On this basis, it may be suggested that vaccination was 80-90 per cent effective against paralytic poliomyelitis." That was it. This meant that

one of the world's most widely known medical experts on epidemic diseases, the University's own Dr. Francis had decided that a child, given the vaccine could expect an excellent protection against paralytic polio.

The 80-80 per cent really means that 8 to 9 youngsters out of every 10 could be inoculated safely and effectively against the dreaded disease.

Now that the Francis Report is medical history, not soon to be forgotten, the future is something to wonder about. The Report nowhere said polio has been licked; it merely stated that paralysis from polio may become a thing of the past.

But like a sudden shift of wind, the frenzied enthusiasm over the report shifted to Washington, D. C. The question now is, "Will there be a black-market in the vaccine?" The problem weighs heavily on the Federal Government, the family physicians, and local health officials.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, having purchased nine million dollars worth of the vaccine in advance as "a calculated risk", has promised to inoculate all children free who participated in the field trials but who received "dummy shots".

The University of Michigan, however, through Dr. Francis and his staff, has done its job. And citizens of Michigan can be very proud.

LAMP SHOULD GIVE ENOUGH LIGHT, CHARM

A table lamp may add charm to your living room, but if it does not give enough light, it does not serve its real purpose.

To remedy this light problem, Evelyn Zwemer, of the home management and child development department at Michigan State College, suggests using the new R-40 "white" light bulb.

She explains that it is more expensive than ordinary bulbs because of an extra coating of powder on the inside and so is worth the extra cost.

This coating makes for greater diffusion of light and often elim-

inates the need for a bowl in the lamp. Miss Zwemer explains that the more light is diffused, the better the quality of light. The "white" light bulb also has less glare when looking at it directly than an ordinary bulb.

To use the new "white" light bulb you may have to remove the metal support for the shade and replace it with a broad harp support. For good lighting the base of table lamps should be 25 inches or more in height and open-top shades should have a bottom diameter of 16 inches.

The new "white" light bulbs are available in 60, 100, and 150 watts and a 50-100-150 watt three-way bulb. They can also be used in pin-to-the-wall lamps and the small floor-type lamps.

time-saver lists the following ingredients: 9 cups sifted all purpose flour or 10 cups sifted cake flour, 1/2 cup double acting baking powder, 1 tablespoon salt, 2 teaspoons cream of tartar, 1/4 cup sugar and 2 cups shortening. Stir the baking powder, salt, cream of tartar and sugar into the flour and sift them three times together. Cut in the fat until the mix is the consistency of cornmeal. Store the master mix in a covered container at room temperature.

To measure the master mix for use pile it lightly into a measuring cup and level it with a spatula. Miss MacDougall recommends using cake flour and an emulsified fat if you use the mix for cake baking. Read the labels on the shortening cans to be sure it is emulsified. Cake flour and this type of fat are musts when making cakes.

Many of the recent commercial cook books give directions for variations of commercial or homemade mixes, says Miss MacDougall.

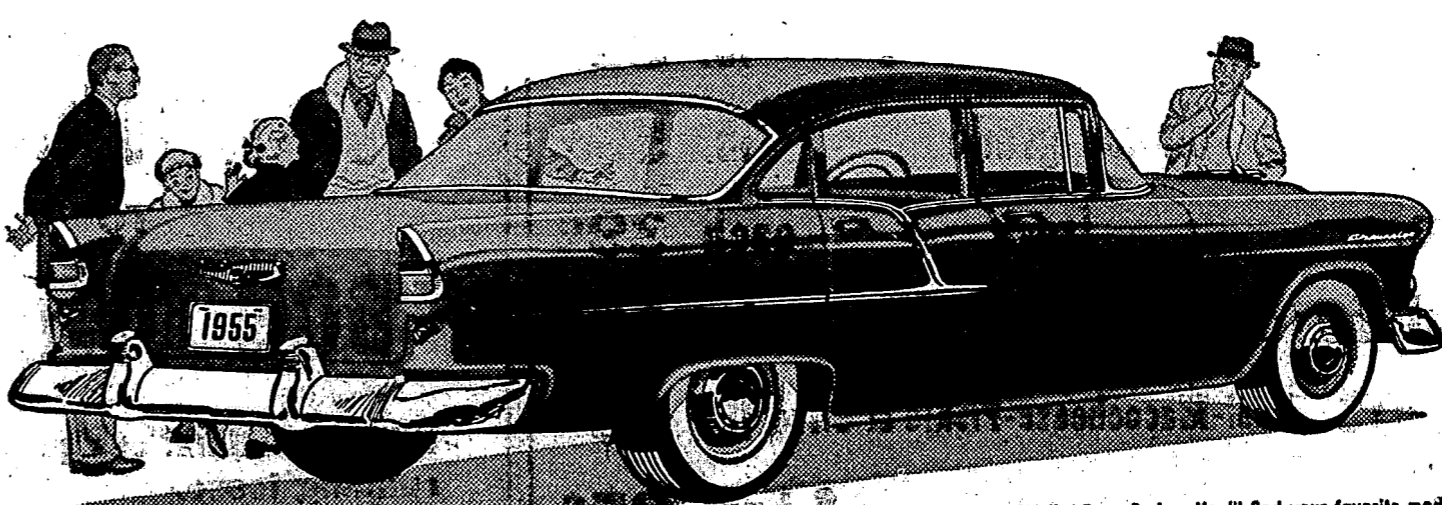
