



Guy H. Hill is a southerner by birth, but a mid-westerner by adoption. His boyhood and youth were spent in North and South Carolina where he earned his bachelor's and master's degrees. His profession, namely teaching and school administration, was also begun in the Carolinas where he taught and administered school for the first fourteen years after graduation from college.

On a General Education Board fellowship to the University of Michigan he completed his residence work for the doctorate in 1931.

Since 1936, Dr. Hill has been devoting his time and energies to teaching, speaking, and promoting wholesome public relations at Michigan State College. He has worked with professional, industrial, business, religious, and educational organizations all over Michigan and in other states. His work with youth, parent-teacher organizations, civic clubs and business and industrial organizations have provided a wealth of experience and friendship which few educators have enjoyed.

His ability to see the humorous side of life and to pass his storie and experiences on to others has brought so many demands for his services that he is today unable to fulfill them.

His title at Michigan State College is Professor of Education and Director of the Office of High School Cooperation.

Next Monday evening the seniors of the Clarkston High School will be addressed by Dr. Guy H. Hill of Michigan State College. This graduating class should feel honored to have such a commencement speaker. Dr. Hill is in great demand and Clarkston is very fortunate in having him come here.
