Of Interest **To Local Farmers**

Oakland County wheat farmers will go to the polls to vote in a referendum on June 25 to decide whether marketing quotas will be placed on the 1956 wheat crop, says John K. Bray, assistant county agricultural agent. "Any wheat grower who will be subject to marketing quotas is eligible to vote in the referendum. Farmers who have farm wheat allotments of 15 acres or less are eligible to vote if they will have more than 15 acres for harvest as grain in 1956", assures Robert H. Long, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. Quotas must be approved by two-thirds of the voters to go in effect, says Bray. If quotas are approved: Producers who stay within their alloted acreage will be eligible for the full level of price support. Those who don't comply will not be eligible for support and will be subject to marketing penalties on excess wheat if they have more than 15 acres for harvest. Any grower will be allowed to harvest 15 acres per farm without


