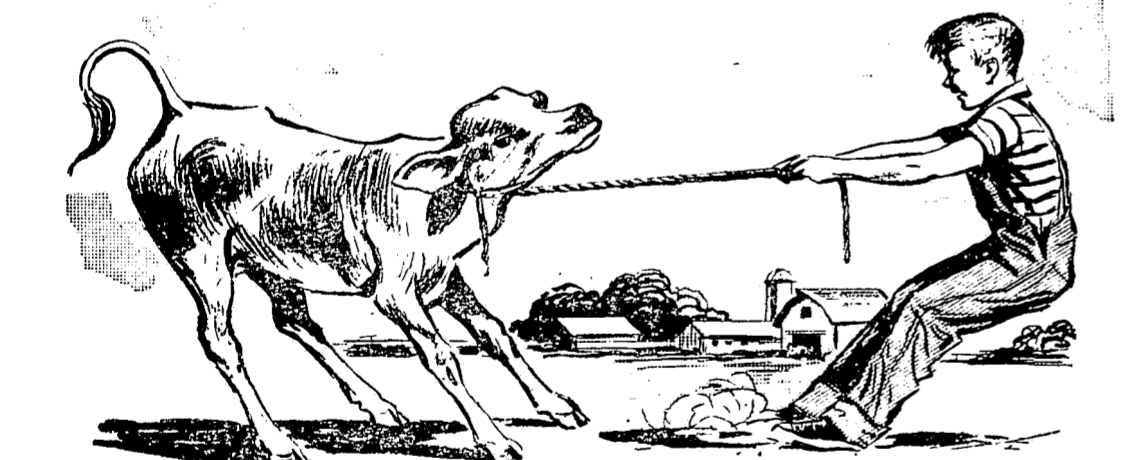

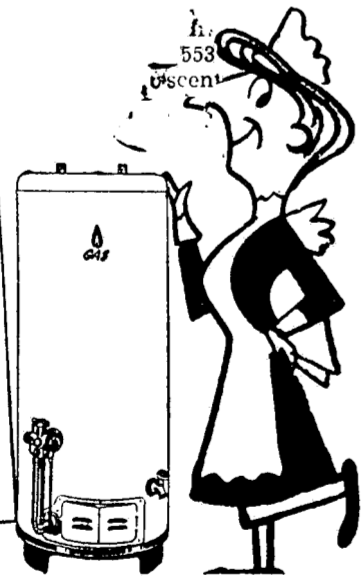

News Liners Bring Fast Results

### "FOOD SCOOP" FOR THE WEEK

A cool kitchen and easily prepared meals are the fashion in most homes this summer.

Three classes of meats are especially suited to summer meals—the variety meats, the so-called cold cuts, and the wide variety of canned meats or meat products. Lucky for the shopper, most of these meats are economically priced.

Good quality veal continues to be a good buy. Supplies are ample. Prices are low with more dollar value found in forequarter cuts like the shoulder roast or frozen veal roll.

More chickens in the market is good news for many families. This means more pan-fried, oven-fried or barbecued chicken to fit the food budget and family appetites.

Outdoor-cooking calls for hamburgers, and ground beef at 33 to 39 cents provides this good eating at a low cost. For economical roasts the beef chuck offers real variety at 39 to 49 cents a pound—depending on the cut.

Watermelon is one of the summer's favorite desserts with the average 30 pound melon being sold whole, halved or quartered at 7 to 10 cents a pound.

Strawberries are becoming more scarce. Bright uniformly red berries are best in flavor. Blue berries and black raspberries are moderately priced.

Small fruits such as apricots, plums, grapes, and nectarines, are lower priced than last week since supplies are increasing.

Summer fashions in vegetables are supplied with crisp, fresh, homegrown varieties. New greep cabbage is one summer salad choice with locally grown green onions, red radishes, and leaf lettuce rating as other favorites at low prices.

Long-white and new red po-

tatoes of good quality are arriving from California. Cucumbers are still plentiful, but there is less corn in the market now that the Florida season is finished.

Due to short supplies, head lettuce prices have moved upward.

There are more green beans this week since they are being produced on nearby farms.

The seasonal rise in egg prices continued with a 2 to 4 cent raise per dozen. Large Grade A eggs still give most-for-your-money.

### NEW POLICY FOR REENLISTMENT

Sgt Doug Haines of the local Air Force Recruiting Station announced that within the next few days a new reenlistment policy will go into effect that should prove to be good news to veterans of all services in the Oakland County area.

The new policy will allow some veterans who have needed skills to reenlist in grade even though they have been separated from the service for more than 90 days. Those veterans will also have the opportunity to select an assignment from a number of bases in the United States and in some cases will have a choice of overseas theaters where they would like to serve.

The plan was devised to increase the procurement of the much needed prior service technician and to assure assignment where skills could be used immediately.

Veterans who possess an occupational specialty classed as needed and who have been out of service since July 1951 will also receive reenlistment grade consideration under the provisions of the program.

In specialties which are classed in the surplus group, reenlistment can be effected with the special provision for re-training in a chosen field which is classed as needed.

Periodically the Recruiting

Station will receive breakdown of skills categorized in order of Air Force needs. The breakdown will encompass all occupational fields and will be listed in six classifications ranging from scarce to surplus.

"The list has already been received at the local Recruiting Station and any veteran desiring information on the new policy is welcome to call at the Recruiting office located at 53 1/2 W. Huron, Pontiac", Sgt Haines said.
