year building and site fund levy of 3 mills which was voted by the Clarkston Community School District, Oakland County, Michigan, on September 6, 1951, be rescinded" was approved by 47 yes votes, 16 no votes, 1 blank.

The proposition "Shall the 20 year tax limitation increase of 3 mills, which was voted on September 6, 1951, by the Clarkston Community School District, Oakland County, Michigan, for the purpose of raising money for the building and site sinking fund, be made available during the remaining years from 1955 through 1970 for the purpose of paying operating expenses of the school district" was approved by 51 yes votes, 13 no votes, 1 blank.

The Annual Meeting was called to order at 8:00 P. M., all board members present. The annual report for last year's meeting was read by Walton Robbins, Secretary of the School Board. Ronald Weber, Treasurer of the Board of Education, read the report of the auditor and presented four graphic charts explaining the amount paid, balances on hand, and outstanding indebtedness of the various school building funds. He then presented a diagraphic chart relative to operating income and current expenditures of the last school vear.

The citizens present made a motion to continue the 9½ months school term for the school year 1955-56. The motion was seconded and approved.

The electorate present voted to continue the same depositories as were used the preceding year. namely: The Michigan National Bank, Flint: The Clarkston State Bank, Clarkston; The Community National Bank, Pontiac.

The electorate then voted, at the request of the Board of Education, to change the salaries of the Board members from: president, \$125.00; secretary, \$175.00; treasurer, \$300.00; trustees, \$100.00 each; to: president, \$150.00; secretary, \$175.00; treasurer, \$225.00; trustees, \$125.00 each. President Leak explained the reasons for this request being that the work and responsibilities of the Board members had changed considerably as a result of the growth of the school, and that this was not an increase in Board salaries, but rather a more equitable distribution of the same amount.

Superintendent Greene, at the request of President Leak, then presented a discussion of current legislative enactments and changes in the tax law structures. It was explained that the requested change for the revision of the 3 mill building and site levy to operation was feasible because of changes in the tax laws and new legislation. Further, that by changing the 3 mills, the schools would be able to meet their operating budget for the ensuing years, and that more money would be received from the State as a result of the change.

Mr. Greene also pointed out that all taxes in the state would be higher this year than in the past, due to the Supreme Court ruling that all taxes be levied on the state equalized value rather than the county equalized value. Further, that the school board was making every effort possible to keep taxes at a minimum and had reduced the millage by 41/2 mills. This will not completely offset the 20% increase, but it will reduce it as much as possible and still allow the Board to meet its obligations. No further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Following the annual meeting, the Board of Education called a special meeting for election of officers. It was moved to have the same officers as last year-Keith Leak, President; Walton Robbins, Secretary; Ronald Weber, Treasurer; Kenneth Thayer and R. E. Spohn, Trustees, Motion carried. Meeting adjourned.


"to the letter" by everyone.



There no longer will be a separate ballot for the President of the United States. The presidential ballot wil be combined with the State ballot for the first time since 1937.

There little Vicky Lyn's injuries were treated and Mrs. Stowe took her home.


