KITCHEN STORY WILL BE TOLD AT CENTENNIAL

Calling all brides, homemakers with young children, homemakers with teen-age and college-age offspring and homemakers who have reached middle years. The dream kitchen especially suited to you will be exhibited at the Centennial of Farm Mechanization to be held on the Michigan State University campus August 15-20.

A display of modern kitchens from the most spacious to the compact trailer-size has been planned by the College of Home Economics at M. S. U. Evelyn Zwerner, who is in charge of the home economics exhibit, explains that viewers will be able to trace ranges, vacuum cleaners, refrigerators, electric irons and many other appliances from their beginnings a century ago to the most modern, up-to-date time-savers of today.

Besides the series of modern kitchens, three authentic historical kitchens will be on exhibit. One will be the pioneer kitchen of 1855 complete with loom, spinning wheel, pewter containers, fireplace and a 108 year old cast-iron waffle maker.

The second period kitchen will depict life in a town during the year 1855. The kitchen, modeled after the kitchen in Greenfield Village near Detroit, will boast a black, cast-iron coal and wood range. It is about two feet high and gives viewers a chance to compare it to the convenient height of today's ranges and ovens.

The third kitchen will be that of a town family in 1905. The Hoosier kitchen cabinet, the wooden ice box and gas light will bring back childhood memories to the thousands of people who are expected to be on campus for the week-long event of M. S. U.'s Centennial year.

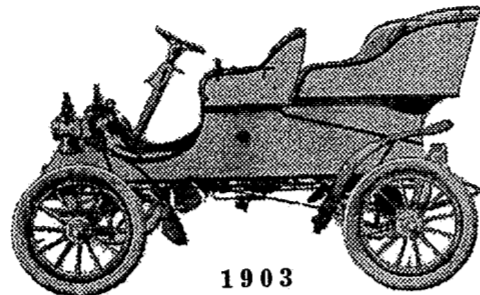

COLLEGE TRAINS WORKERS FOR SMALL PAPERS

A high school graduate from the Clarkston area may have opportunity to train for community newspaper work in a new one-year course at Defiance College, Defiance, Ohio. The college has three linotype machines and presses to be used as "laboratory

equipment" for the journalism class. Practice on the linotype will supplement training in news gathering and writing.

Students will also learn typewriting, accounting and oral and written English. One elective class will be included, such as shorthand, business mathematics or advertising.

An announcement from the college says that many weekly and small daily papers are short of help. The new course is being tailored to their needs, which are different from the metropolitan press. The student will be trained in business, editorial and mechanical departments—an all-around ability needed on the weekly paper.

Some publishers are helping high school graduates pay tuition on condition they work for the home paper a year. If the student later decides to continue in college, all of the year's training will give credit toward a degree. The president of Defiance College, Kevin McCann, is a former publisher of weekly papers in the Chicago area. He is now serving at the White House as an assistant to President Dwight D. Eisenhower. He believes that work on community newspapers should be encouraged as one of the best opportunities for useful employment.

There will be four days of fun, education and meeting women from all over the State of Michigan during the Homemakers' Conference to be held on the Michigan State campus in East Lansing.

Registration at the event will start Tuesday, July 19, and regular classes will be held during the following three days through July 22. The conference is open to any women in the state, advises Mary Hixon, Oakland County home demonstration agent. Featured speakers listed for the four day event includes:

Edwin C. Kemper, special agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, who will discuss "The Challenge to America"; Dr. Cleo Dawson, popular psychologist, who will give advice on "For

Every Problem There's An Answer"; and Dr. David E. Molyneux, First Presbyterian Church in Flint, speaking on "The Challenge of a Hungry World".

Many M. S. U. staff members are included on the program; some will teach classes and others will address the whole group of the 1,300 women planning to attend.

Homemakers' Conference is sponsored by the home economics extension program and by the continuing education service of Michigan State University.

Beginning in July the Current Population survey will cover employment and unemployment during the week containing the 12th of each month.

relating to the week of the 12th would be more typical for the month as a whole and would not be distorted by major holidays such as the 4th of July and Labor Day.

In addition, the change in timing is expected to minimize differences, insofar as these have been caused by different reference dates, between employment estimates based on the Census enumeration of households in the Current Population Survey and those from other sources.

The Current Population Survey will be conducted this month during the week beginning July

18. For summer barbecuing, the smaller broilers, weighing two or three pounds dressed weight, are ideal. Marketing and Consumer Information Agents recommend to allow one-half bird per person, or about one pound, for adults. 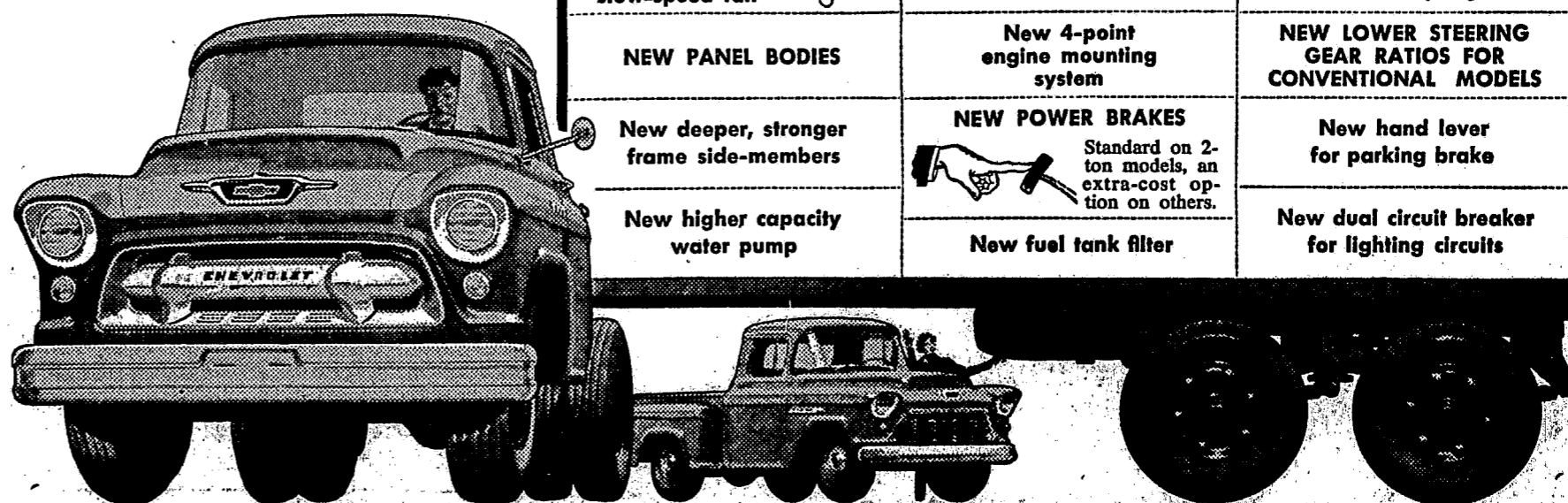



FOOD SCOOP

After-holiday food shoppers will find many attractive price-tags to make meat selection easy. With the 1 to 1 1/2 cent decrease seen this week on the price of frying chickens, penny-wise shoppers can stretch the food dollar for picnics, parties or ordinary family dinners.

Heavy marketings of all cattle have kept both fore and hind quarter cuts easy-on-the-pocket-book. Hot-weather demand has encouraged many markets to feature steaks, but for the best economy such heavy roasts as the chuck and rump still offer the best values.

Because the demand for pork loin roasts has decreased with the rise in temperature, prices have taken a considerable drop. Slab bacon, well known brands of heavier style bacon, and the top quality cuts from lighter hogs are also in the good-buy spotlight.

This is still the best time of the year to add many cuts of veal to your market list. Lamb prices remain fairly steady due to a short supply.

Fresh white fish and trout, and cod and haddock fillets, from cooler waters are in adequate supply and reasonably priced. However, the catch of local lake fish has indicated a seasonal decrease. A few white bass, yellow pickerel and lake perch are available at low cost per serving.

Supplies of most locally grown produce are reported to be about 2 to 3 weeks early this year. Abundant displays of new green cabbage are much in evidence both at the Farmers' Markets and on retail counters. It is also good news to know that prices are dropping rapidly as shipments of such homegrown vegetables as crisp green and yellow wax snap beans, and many var-

ieties of summer squash appear.

The Michigan crop of head lettuce is just beginning to make its appearance and the improved quality and lower cost is noted. The demand for the red hot-house tomatoes has kept the prices high, but now that the first fruit from nearby farms has appeared, competition should cause prices to drop.

Extensive overlapping of potato shipments from several states have caused potato supplies to be very heavy and prices low. The melon family, watermelon and cantaloupe, has the good-buy spot of distinction on fruit counters this week due to drastic decreases in price.

As local supplies of the juicy dark red Bing cherries continue to increase and prices decrease, fruit handlers report that they are the finest Michigan sweet cherries in many seasons. Home-grown blueberries and both red and black raspberries are also beginning to be in ample supply.

Fortunately when lemons are most appreciated for refreshing summer drinks, supplies are most plentiful. Stocks of fresh lemons are very large this year because fewer will go into processing.

REFRIGERATOR CAKE

- 1 tablespoon plain gelatin
- 3/4 cup cold water
- 6 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
- 6 egg whites
- 3/4 cup white syrup
- 1 large angel food cake
- 1 cup whipping cream
- 3/4 cup lemon juice

Soften gelatin in water; combine yolks with sugar, juice and rind. Cook yolk mixture over hot water, but do not boil, until mixture coats spoon. Remove from heat, add gelatin, stirring until dissolved. Beat egg whites until stiff, gradually add syrup while beating. Gradually fold in custard, mix well. Tear cake into small pieces. Grease tube pan and

add layer of cake, then custard. Put into refrigerator over night. Frost or decorate with whipped cream when ready to serve. Serves 16.

STATE ELECTION LAWS BEING CHANGED

Many important changes in the State election laws will be in effect when Michigan voters go to the polls next year.

There no longer will be a separate ballot for the President of the United States. The presidential ballot will be combined with the State ballot for the first time since 1937.

Among other major new provisions of the new election code are the following: All communities now must use written applications from a voter for a ballot. Previously, communities of less than 5,000 population were not required to use written applications.

A majority of the members of the election board must be present at all times, compared with the previous requirement that three be present.

Election inspectors must submit a written application before appointment, stating political affiliation, education, experience and other information.

Challengers must now be registered electors of the city or township in which they act, and candidates cannot act as challengers.

Ballots no longer will be initiated by election inspectors.

County clerks must have their offices open for election purposes all day on election day and to remain open until all returns are in. Copies of all returns must be made available to the press and other interested persons.

Paper ballot precincts are limited in size to 800 registered voters and machine precincts to 1,400, with one machine provided for each 600 registered voters.

Township caucuses must be held on the same day as primary elections.

State party conventions can be held as late as September 1 in 1956.

Anyone circulating election petitions must state his full address, including street and number or rural route.

Absent voters ballots must be voted on voting machines immediately after the polls close and the last voter has cast his ballot.

Votes cast for a deceased candidate shall not be counted.

EDISON LAMPLIGHTERS PERFORM AT SOO LOCKS

A nationally known drum and bugle corps—The Edison Lamplighters of Detroit—will perform as one of the special features of the Soo Locks Centennial Celebration on Saturday, July 16.

The Corps, sponsored by the Thomas A. Edison American Legion Post No. 187, will march in the "All Nations" parade, and will also give a drill exhibition at the Soo High School athletic field. Five-time winner in statewide American Legion competition, the Corps includes 36 playing members, a seven-man color guard and four quartermasters.

Also present will be Larry Stroebel, Post Commander 187; Lyman Wollgast, commander-elect; Rex Hall, director of the Drum and Bugle Corps; Walter Westphal, bugle instructor; Joseph Giralmo, drill master; Carl Dittler, Corps manager; and Byron Bliss, assistant Corps manager.

Organized 23 years ago at the suggestion of the late Alex Dow, former president of the Detroit Edison Company, the Corps has grown to be one of the most active organizations of its kind in the country. It plays about 36 engagements a year, practices twice a week in summer, and holds an indoor practice once each week throughout the winter season.

Last year, besides winning the Michigan championship for the fifth time, the Corps entered

Midwest Legion competition in Ohio and Indiana, and performed at the National Legion Convention in Washington, D. C.

Mrs. Stowe wrote to Michigan Bell:

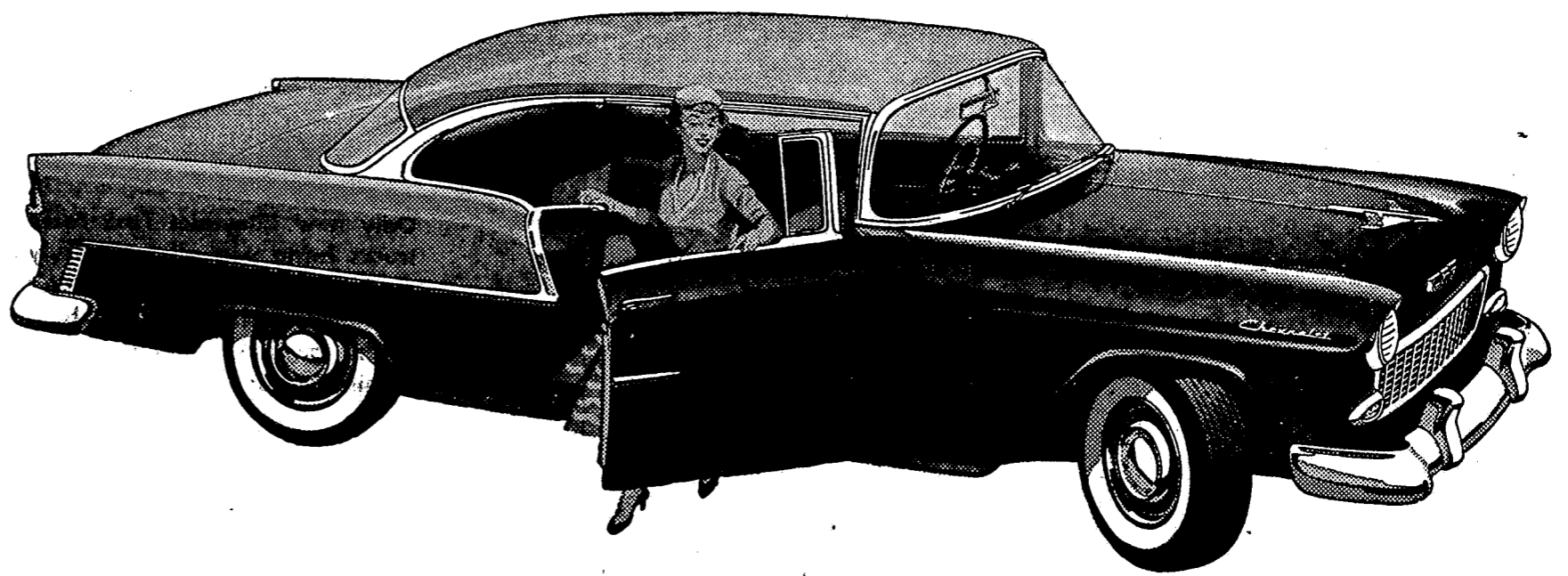

HIGHWAY STUDY ORDERED BY LEGISLATURE

Michigan's first comprehensive highway fiscal study was launched today by the Joint Legislative Committee on Highway Needs. The study was ordered by the Legislature this year to determine the soundness of Michigan's highway, road and street financing, and to provide proposals

for a solid basis of financing in the future.

The study is being directed by Richard M. Zettel, Assistant Director of Transportation and Traffic Engineering of the University of California. Zettel, an economist, has majored in fiscal studies for the past fifteen years. He has served as Director of Research for the Washington

State Tax Commission, the United States Naval Intelligence, and directed both of California's major fiscal studies which resulted in increased revenues.

The fiscal study is following right in the heels of the state-wide engineering study ordered last year. The engineering study is being conducted by 300 engineers on all highway, road and street systems in Michigan and will be completed September 15. It will determine the need, and show where the needs are greatest. The fiscal study, to be completed December 1, is expected to determine how these needs can financially be fulfilled.

The launching of the fiscal study was praised by Senator Haskell Nichols, Chairman of the Michigan Joint Legislative Committee on Highway Needs.

"This is an important forward step for Michigan's overburdened highway, road and street systems. In the past, we suffered for the lack of answers on this whole matter, but the completion of this study will put before us the program we need to financially bring Michigan's systems up to the level necessary for our great

amount of traffic," he said. The move was also heralded by Gerald W. Graves, Executive Director, Michigan Good Roads Federation.

"Michigan's highway, road and street administrators have for years been frustrated by the lack of revenues for building on one hand, and the public demand for better highways, roads and streets on the other," he said. "Upon the completion of this study we should have the answer for financially bringing our road systems up to the level of the need and demand."

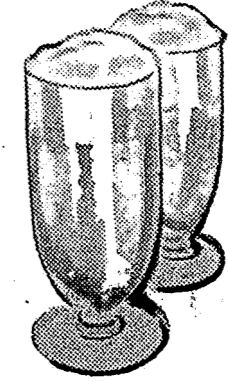
