U-M EXPERT GIVES HOT-WEATHER TIPS FOR FISHERMEN

Fish lose their zest for food during hot spells, but since they have to eat to live a fisherman can make his catch by being in the right place at the right time. So says a University of Michigan fisheries expert, Prof. Karl F. Lagler. And he has some hints

to offer about best times and places for making that hot-weather strike.

"Don't switch from one lake or stream to another constantly", he advises, pointing out that it is better to know two lakes extremely well than 10 vaguely. And the most logical times to catch fish during hot weather are near sunrise and sunset and sometime between 10:00 p. m. and 2:00 a. m., he adds.

Once you've decided on time and place the question is, what to offer them? And Professor Lagler has some words here too: When the water is calm give them a topwater lure, working it lazily.

You've got to convince them that this is an easy meal, some

small creature that's hurt and can't get away", he says. And you can use the same strategy after dark, he continues, but wait twice as long before retrieving your lure.

"Fish can be expected to have a hard time seeing in the dark, too, and they'll have to come searching where they heard it fall", he explains.

If you don't have any luck near the surface, try a lure that'll go through shallow cover, and then one that'll plumb the depths. Professor Lagler suggests as a last resort attaching a small, live frog, with a weight, to your line and trolling slowly while it bumps the bottom of the deeper holes.

"Keep alert", he cautions, be-

cause the viciousness of the strikes will amaze you. When a fish does strike, strike back hard! Don't allow slack in your line, and strike hard again, he says, and play your fish carefully. "Once you've landed him watch out for teeth, if he has them, and by all means remember that a lively fish with a face full of hooks is a first class menace flopping around in your boat!"

to apply for their papers before school term begins. By applying for their VA certificates prior to admission, veterans will help to prevent delay in the processing of their papers as it is predicted

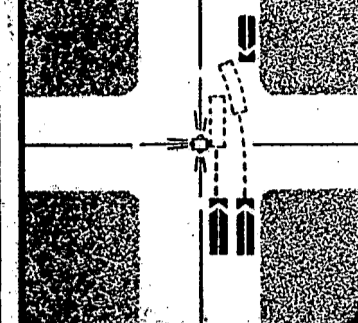

When two cars are facing a red light side by side and it turns green, someone may have to give way because of parked cars just beyond the intersection

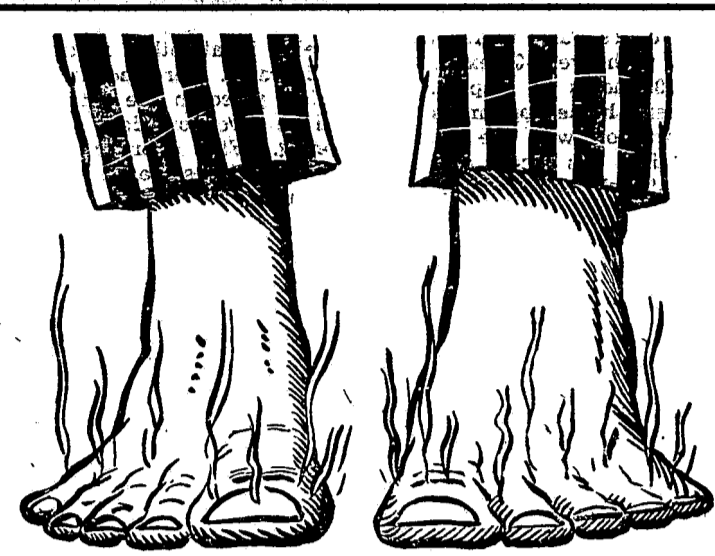
If the driver on the right sprints ahead and cuts in on the car on his left, which is going straight ahead, it's like cheating in a ticket line at a theater.

This is a "World's Fair" of farm machinery with over 300 exhibitors. Over 100 acres of displays in equipment, home appliances, and transportation will be shown. Everything has been arranged for visitors' convenience—free parking, all exhibits free, transportation throughout the area. Oakland County residents are urged to visit the "Centennial

of Farm Mechanization" at East Lansing beginning August 15 through 20.

GOIN' FISHIN'?

When your family announces they are goin' fishing, your cue to get caught up on fish lore. Mrs. Mary A. Hixon, Oakland County home demonstration agent, reminds that fish are very perishable. If fish are not going to be used immediately, they should be wrapped in moisture-proof paper or placed in a tightly covered dish so fishy odors will not develop in all other food in the refrigerator. Store the fish in the coldest place in the refrigerator and be sure you clean it before storing. Fish odor problems on hands or dishes are easily solved. Just rub your hands and dishes well with moistened salt; then rinse with hot water before washing with soap and water. To freeze fish, Mrs. Hixon

warns that they should be wrapped in moisture, vaporproof freezer paper, then in heavy wrapping paper and frozen immediately. Ready-to-cook frozen fish does not need to be thawed before cooking, but you should plan on a little longer cooking time. If an egg and crumb coating is to be added, the fish will have to be thawed, however because fish spoils rapidly, never re-freeze it.

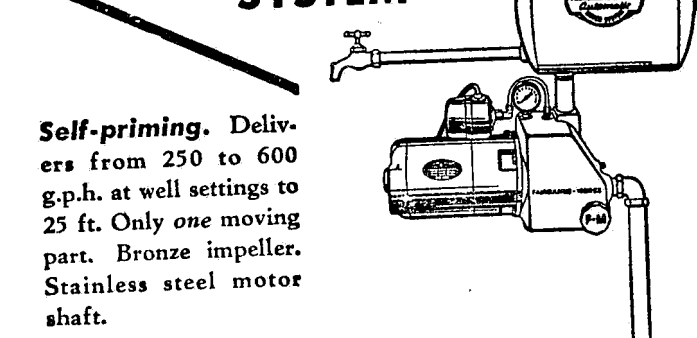

This week's food shopper will find many attractive bargains in the market.

A recent wholesale cut in pork loin prices has made the rib end pork roast one of the best meat-buys again this week. Boston butt has dropped slightly in cost. Wise shoppers will take advantage of special features on both smoked and canned hams for convenient summer meals. Canadian style bacon and No. 1, 2, and 3 grades of bacon the moderately priced for easy sandwiches and quick meals.

Beef continues to be a favorite choice with high demand for hindquarter cuts. Shoppers will find low price tags on the flavorful chuck. Round steak is being featured at better values than it has been for several weeks. Shoppers will find exceptional values in leg and rump roast of veal as well as in the frozen shoulder roll or fresh shoulder roast. Some stores have reduced leg of lamb about 5 cents a pound making it an attractive choice for family or company fare.

Whitefish continues to be one of the favorite fresh water selections, however there is a good supply of lake perch and blue and yellow pickerel.

about the same as a week ago. Fryers are still small in size with most weighing 1 3/4 to 2 1/4 pounds. Stewers are a few cents less per pound.

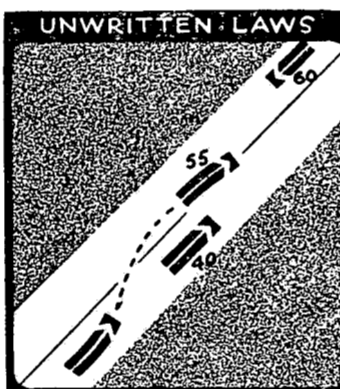
There is a steady increase in the number of small and medium size eggs, but the large still represents the best buy for the customer.

Variety, abundance, and economy best describe the bargains at produce counters this week. Shoppers will find fresh sweet corn tops in value. Yellow summer squash and the Italian varieties are plentiful. Cabbage, tomatoes, green beans and potatoes are other home-grown vegetables in the limelight in quantity, quality, and economy.

Watermelons still hold the spotlight on fruit counters. Overlapping shipments from several states has resulted in a larger than normal supply and low prices for the season. Michigan blueberries are excellent quality and prices are low. A few Michigan peaches and Honey-Rock cantaloupe are in the market, however prices will decrease as the quantity increases within the next few weeks.

Broiled Chicken Burgers make a satisfying luncheon main dish. Cut hamburger buns in half. On each half place a slice of canned jellied cranberry sauce. For six sandwiches, mix 3 cups chopped cooked chicken, two-thirds cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup chopped sweet pickle, salt and pepper. Spread over the cranberry sauce and place under broiler until hot and bubbly.

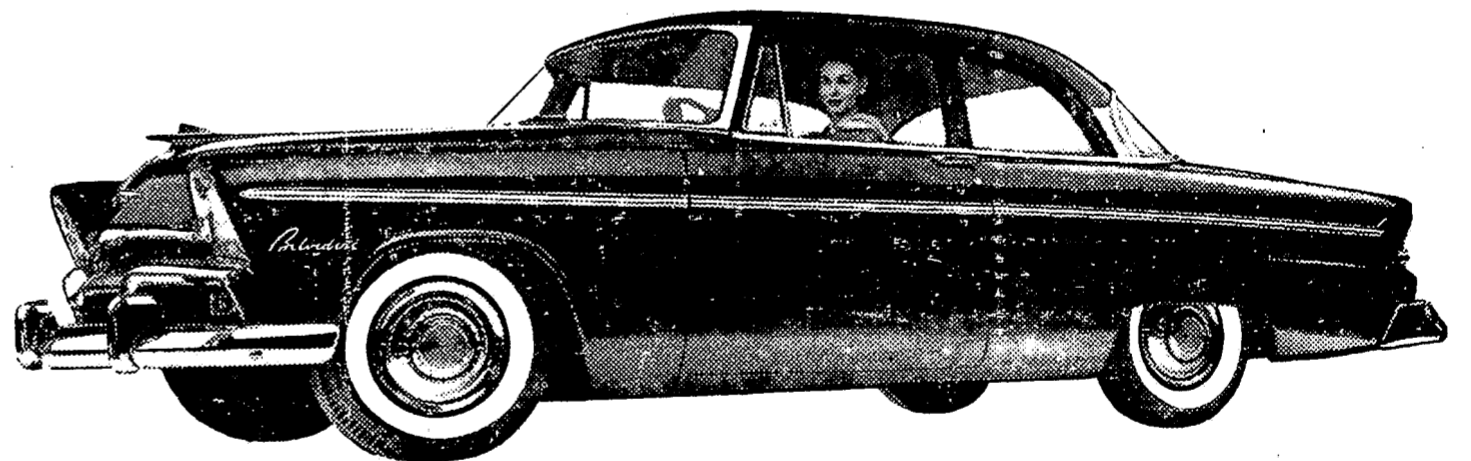

According to County Agricultural Agent Lyle Abel the planting stock offered without charge includes pines, spruces, multi-flora rose, bush honeysuckle, coralberry and others.

Mr. Abel points out that, at the request of the landowners, a farm planner from the Conservation Department will inspect the farm and determine what can be planted to improve the land for wildlife.

The planner's recommendations generally tie in with soil and water conservation practices. Trees and shrubs may be planted on eroded hillsides, in gullies, a long pond or marsh borders or along edges of woodlots.

Qualifying farmers who would

like to take part in the program can get additional information by writing to the Game Division, Michigan Conservation Department, Lansing 13, Michigan.
